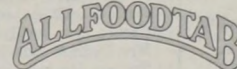

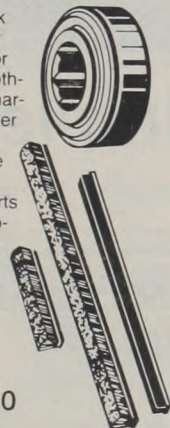

**Crossandra Makes Colorful Contrasts**

The contrast between the crossandra's coral-colored flowers and dark green foliage make it one of the most attractive flowering plants available. And because of its relative heat tolerance, the crossandra holds up well under Texas growing conditions. These two characteristics have made this flowering plant one of the most popular on today's market.

When purchasing a crossandra be sure to examine the foliage and flowers of the plant carefully. Avoid plants which have dropped lower leaves or which appear to have gray or moldy flowers. Well-rounded crossandras with strong, healthy stems can provide long-lasting beauty in the home or office.

Once in its new environment the crossandra requires some basic care:

1. Remove or punch holes through any decorative foil or wrapping on the bottom of the pot. Although it may be attractive, foil wrapping impedes drainage and holds water. This may cause the roots to rot and the plant to deteriorate quickly.
2. Keep the plant out of hot or cold drafts. Excessively hot, dry air from heating ducts and appliances will reduce the keeping quality of the plant.
3. The crossandra cannot tolerate cold or rapidly changing temperatures. Keep the plant where temperatures remain above 60 degrees F., between 70 and 75 degrees is ideal.
4. Place the plant in good light, but not direct sun.
5. The crossandra uses a moderate amount of water and should be checked daily.

Make sure the soil remains moist but be careful not to over-water. When adding water, allow some to run through the root mass and out of the pot.

To be sure you receive a quality crossandra, ask for a Texas product. It's your assurance of a locally grown plant at its peak of freshness.
