Quitaque Purchases New Ambulance

The City of Quitaque recently had the privilege of purchasing a new ambulance with a generous donation made to the ambulance fund by the Martha Ann Cogdell Hospital Trust.

The 1983 Ford ambulance was delivered Tuesday, November 22, by Blake Clifton, regional sales representative for Summers Ambulance Sales of Duncanville, Texas.

The ambulance is a one-ton Ford XL chassis with a Collins Crusader 2.5 expanded type body. It is fully equipped with the Texas Medical Package Basic Life Support system and partially equipped with the Advanced Life Support system. Three outside storage compartments and the extended body permit better storage of equipment, thus providing unobstructed

space for patients and patient assessment.

The new ambulance will not be operational until radios and additional equipment are installed. This equipment is on order and should be arriving any day for installation.

When this ambulance is fully equipped and operational, and the EMTs have received more training with some of the new equipment, the Quitaque Ambulance Service should be able to give you better care and assessment when you have a need for the ambulance service.

The present ambulance will be kept operational and used as a backup for the new ambulance.

A personal note of thanks should be given by D. M. Cogdell, jr. and the board of directors of the Martha Ann Cogdell Hospital Trust for making the ambulance purchase possible.

Valley Romps Through Paradise! Meets Knox City Friday Night

Quoting a well-known sports-writer, "Paradise Lost," in the regional play-off at Canadian Saturday night the Patriots romped through Paradise and took a 21-7 victory.

The Paradise Panthers were projected to win. They have averaged 46.7 points, 450 yards offensively, and had wins of 81-0 and 71-0 during the regular season. And in the first play from scrimmage, Valley quarterback Kraig Cox, who was under heavy pressure, threw a pass which went right into the hands of a surprised Paradise end, Arthur Guess. Guess raced to the one-foot line, but Cox stopped him there. On the next play, Keith Huddleston went over for the touchdown with only 21 seconds having ticked off the scoreboard clock, and Paradise held a 7-0 lead.

Valley played without four starters who were out with injuries. Coach Ted Giddens remarked that the bad beginning was typical for the season, but the boys came back with a three-touchdown second quarter to demolish the unbeaten Paradise team who had 12-7 to their credit going into the game. After the TD, the Panthers never threatened again!

A threat was stopped at the Paradise 14 late in the first quarter when Cox had another pass intercepted, but the Pats put together a second-quarter charge that left the Panthers floundering in their wake.

Cox atoned for two early interceptions when he intercepted a Chris Lowery (Paradise quarterback) pass at the Paradise 37 on the first play of the second period.

Seven plays later, Tommy Williams swept right 10 yards for the tying TD with 9:07 left in the half.

With 5:49 remaining before halftime, Valley defensive tackle Lee J. Browning recovered an option pitch at the Paradise 10. On the third down from the eight, fullback Will Williams found a gaping hole in the middle and charged in for the score to give the Patriots a 13-7 lead.

Valley wasn't finished. The Pats went 33 yards to score their third TD after holding Paradise near its own end zone.

Tommy Williams went virtually untouched on yet another sweep for 24 yards and the TD. Valley was cruising, 21-7, with 1:23 left before intermission.

Coach Giddens remarked, "You can't laugh off our offense. When we needed a touchdown, we got it, and when we didn't need a TD, we were using up the clock. And, of course, no one was laughing at the faithful defense." Paradise gained only 106 yards

total offense and in the first half, they had only 47 yards, including a minus-12 yards rushing. Chris Lowrey, who had 1700 yards passing and 29 touchdowns in the regular season, was ineffective all night. He completed only three of 16 passes and had two interceptions, and was limited to minus-three yards by the Valley defense, led by Browning and Larry Bob Clay.

Valley, led by the Williams brothers, shredded the Paradise defense time after time. Tommy Williams, tailback, gained 159 yards on 21 carries, while fullback Will Williams had 100 yards on 17 carries.

Ricky Jeeter made a 14-yard touchdown which was nullified by a holding penalty late in the fourth quarter.

Coach Giddens said, "We were very pleased with the win over Paradise. Anytime you upset a highly-ranked team, it is very sweet. The upset was a result of a tremendous team effort."

"J. Dale Butler played a

terrific game on defense.

"We expect Knox City to be the best team we have seen all year. They have a great deal of speed. The Harris Rating System has them picked over us by seven."

Knox City beat Nazareth 20-6 in their regional play-off. Their halfback, Otis Lockhart, who ran 100 meters in 10.8 seconds in track meets last spring, upset the Nazareth Swifts' hopes as he scored on two long-distance plays to enable the Greyhounds to advance to the quarterfinal round of the playoffs for the second year in a row. Lockhart caught a screen pass from quarterback Wayne Hutchinson, which made the difference in the game. These two are the ones for Valley Patriots and fans to watch in the game between Valley and Knox City.

The game is to be played Friday night in Childress Stadium at 7:30 o'clock.

City of Turkey Receives Grant Of \$220,997 For Water System

Mayor Leroy Stone received a letter this week from Governor Mark White stating that the City of Turkey had been awarded a grant of \$220,997 by the Texas Department of Community Affairs to provide for water system improvements.

A barbecue steak dinner with all the trimmings, prepared by Jerry Landry, Jerry Henderson and others, was served Tuesday night, November 22, at the Bob Wills Cafeteria. Special guests were Mr. and Mrs. Gary Pitner and Linda Allen, all of Amarillo. Pitner and Allen are employed by the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission.

Pitner said there are 24 agencies like theirs in the state. Grants are made on the basis of two categories—cities above 50,000 population and those below that number, of which Turkey is one. A little over one million dollars was granted in the Panhandle this year, Pitner said.

Mayor Stone and Landry met with a 12-member review board in Amarillo in September, and put in an application for the funds. There were 16 applications, but only six of those received grants and the City of Turkey officials felt very lucky that the city received the much-needed funds. It is an outright grant.

Turkey also put in for a grant from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department in August for a softball field. Homer

Hawkins and Hubert Price are in charge of this. \$36,235 was granted, but it is on a 50-50 basis and these men are in charge of raising the necessary funds to match this amount. Part of the work has already been done on this project. A chain link fence has been installed.

Twenty-six persons enjoyed the delicious steak dinner Tuesday night.

Bids for the water improvements will probably go out in January, it was learned.

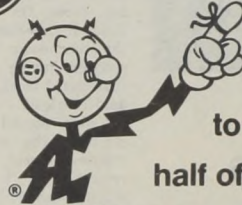

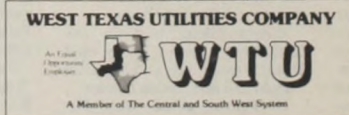

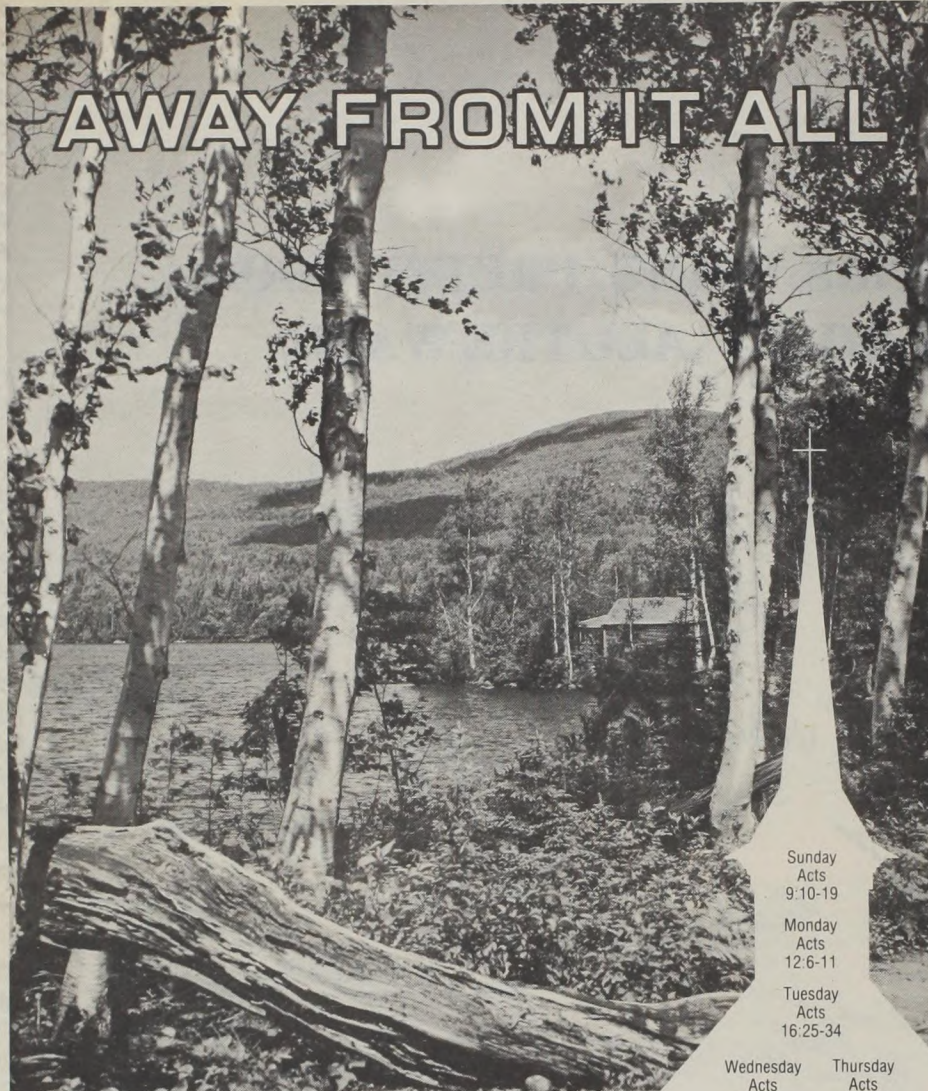
