## Drive Safely On Memorial Day

Trooper L. B. Snider, with the Department of Public Safety says, "in Texas, Memorial Day weekend signals the start of the summertime season for vacation travel". There will be increased dangers to motorists because so many people are anxious to "get away from it all". Each of us should remember that due to heavier traffic, the potential of having a traffic accident on any given holiday weekend is greater than a regular weekend; therefore we should adjust our driving habits for the extra crowded highways this Memorial Day weekend.

All available troopers will be out with emphasis on intoxicated drivers, speeders and other serious violations. Snider suggests that motorists use preventive measures such as being rested and alert, allow safety space with other traffic, using headlights day and night to see and be seen and taking advantage of safety belts. Snider also advised if you consume alcoholic drinks to have a designated nondrinking driver if you must travel. Preventive measures include a pre-trip check of the vehicle and driver. Vehicles should be checked for defective or worn belt, hoses, cooling systems, fluid levels and proper tire air pressure and tread wear.

With Texas motorists driving friendly by using these and other common sense methods, this could be a wonderfully memorable Memorial Day weekend. Remember, drive "Texas Friendly" and enjoy the holiday.

The city was stunned. No warning was given of the approaching danger and tonight the known dead stands at 19.

Floyd Richardson of Amarillo and his balloon, *Cat's Meow* and Robert Pendleton of Amarillo and his balloon, *Sunriz II* will be on the scene around 7 a.m. to give a thrill to residents and visitors alike.

The balloons are about seven stories high when in flight. The demonstration should take about 30 to 45 minutes.

## THEN and NOW!

Monday, May 30, 1994 is a day for all of us to remember. Remember those who have given so much for all of us! What can we give in remembrance or payment to those to whom we are so indebted? We can never give them what they deserve! They who have gone to war for our way of life in the United States can never be honored enough. Without their unselfishness life in the U. S. would not have the quality that we know today. Many gave their all so that we might live in a free society to choose who will govern us, where we will work at to earn our daily bread and to be able to give honor and glory to those who were responsible for this freedom!

What kind of honor and glory can we bestow upon our returned soldiers and those who never returned to their home soil? At least we can give them honor on the one day a year that is set aside for Memorial to them. This year the day is Monday, May 30, Memorial Day.

Senator Phil Gramm reminds us that on June 6, 1994 it will be 50 years since D-Day in World War II. This was the greatest invasion force ever assembled which stood off the French coast as dawn broke on June 6, 1944; nine battleships, 23 cruisers, 104 destroyers and hundreds of troop transports, 5,000 ships bearing 100,000 men.

The naval bombardment that began at 5:50 that morning was the first assault on five beaches code named Utah and Omaha for the Americans to the west, and Sword, Juno and Gold for the British and Canadians to the east.

Another 195,700 sailors fired guns, ferried supplies and cared for the wounded on the ships and landing craft in the English Channel, while 31,000 airmen flew bombing runs and reconnaissance missions.

By the evening of June 6, 1944, Allied power had prevailed all across the Normandy coast. The Americans had yet to surge far enough inland to prevent enemy artillery from hitting the supply depots and unloading points they were building along the beaches, yet more than 100,000 men were ashore, the first of millions who would follow.

"Mid-morning reports painted such a bleak picture of battlefield conditions that Lt. Gen. Omar Bradley considered pulling off the beach and landing the troops elsewhere. Losses had been high--2,500 men killed in action--but if chaos ruled at first, raw courage asserted itself and by day's end, Americans controlled Omaha Beach."

As the sun set on Normandy that Tuesday, few who were fighting the war realized what they had achieved that day: the beginning of the end.

Can we do any less than give a day of thought to those who participated in this awe inspiring fight for the freedom of not only their country but of the whole world? Remember those who fought and died for you on this Memorial Day, 1994.

### Plans Shaping Up For National Trails Day Celebration

There is a lot of activity taking place in Quitauque in preparation for National Trails Day, June 4.

About sixteen committees are at work getting ready for the displays, meals and events that will take place that day.

The nation's largest windssock and kite flying demonstration is a new event for Trails Day. The windssock is 18' in diameter and approximately 120' long. It is anchored with a 4,000 lb. rescue rope.

The owner will also have kites for display and sale, and his plans are to unveil for the first time the nation's largest kite. It will be in the shape of an octopus and be approximately 12 stories tall.

Entries are being received daily on the Quitauque Quest Mountain Bike Race that will begin at 8:00 am.

That night a Concert and Dance featuring McBride and the Ride will begin at 8:00 pm.

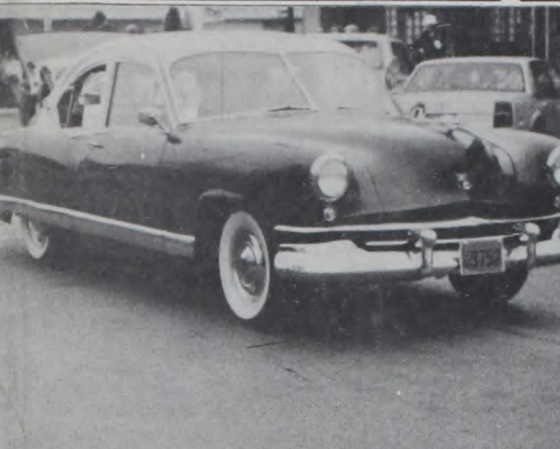

### Property Owners Notified Of Changes in 1994 Values

Texas property owners have the right to be informed of changes in their property's value by local appraisers. On May 20, Briscoe Co. Appraisal District mailed 488 property owner notices of the district's property owners that the notice is NOT a tax bill. "Please do not pay from this notice," Mrs. Fleming said.

She emphasized the importance of the notice and the key any disagreement with the value, exemptions, ownership, and other areas," she said.

The ARB, an independent panel of citizens responsible for reviewing the appraisal district's values, also hears and settles protests from property owners who disagree with any action of the district.

"Take special note of the proposed value for 1994" Mrs. Fleming said. "The notice shows the land's value and any improvement value for the property for the current year." An improvement is a building, structure, fence, or any other fixture to the land. If the notice pertains to personal property (vehicles, business inventory, etc.)

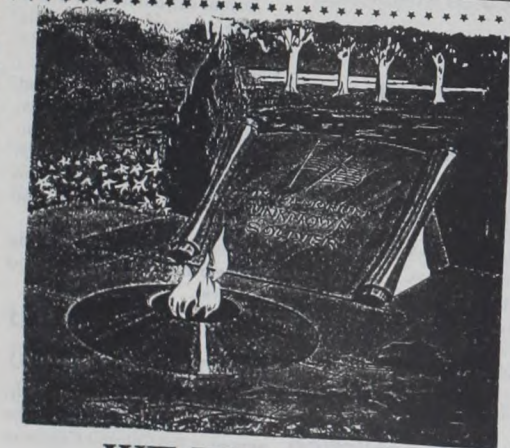

### Emergency Hay Grazing Approved

Briscoe County has been approved to hay and graze 1994 ACR and CU for Pay (set-aside) during the 5-month restricted period from June 1 through October 31, 1994, according to Earlyne Hutsell, Briscoe County ASCS. Participants are authorized to hay and graze these acres through December 31, 1994.

Before haying or grazing, producers are required to come in and designate the acreage and sign a register indicating intended use of the acres. Some restrictions apply, so check with the ASCS office prior to haying or grazing.

A property owner can be liable for additional penalties and interest on a tax bill not paid timely, and is responsible for keeping the district informed of the correct mailing address.
