# **CSWC Board To Elect** Director October 15

An election for a director to Soil and Water Conservation scheduled Thursday, October 15 at the Briscoe Coop Gin Office announced C. L. Sutton, chairman of the board. The election will be held at 8:30

State law decrees that to be eligible to vote in a soil and water conservation district director's election, a person must own agricultural land within the district where the election is being held. The person must also live in a county all or any part of which is in the district and the voter must be 18 years old.

Legal qualifications state that a candidate for the office of a soil and water conservation district director must own land in the zone he represents, be 18 years of age and be actively engaged in farming or ranching. He must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district. Soil and water conservation district dir-

# WTU Refunds **Promised To**

West Texas Utilities Co. customers will receive another fuel cost refund this month.

Customers

The refund, requested by the Company, was approved by the Public Utility Commission of Texas and will total about \$4.6 million. This includes actual over-collections of fuel costs from December 1986 through July 1987, plus

The refunds will be credited to customer bills. A typical residential customer will receive a little more than \$7. This is the sixth refund made to WTU retail customers since the summer of 1985.

The fuel rates charged to customers have been adjusted with every refund, but the price of natural gas, WTU's main power plant boiler fuel during the period, has continued to decline.

Meanwhile, WTU is expecting a decision by the PUC in November regarding the Company's request to increase its base rates. A hearing in the case ended September 16 and a final order from the three-member PUC is expected in time to apply any rate change on December bills.

The Company had requested an increase to add \$50.3 million in annual revenues, which would bring the new coal-fired Oklaunion Power Station into the rate base.

#### OPEN LETTER TO THE TAXPAYERS OF THE CITY OF QUITAQUE

This letter is written on behalf of the Quitaque City Council to address the Issue of the tax rate increase adopted by the council and the petition being circulated to call for a rollback election. The City must have \$37,493.01 to fund the budget that has been approved by the city council. There are two ways for the city to raise rates charged for services. The following chart compares the effect the two methods would have on tax payers.

Column A shows the value of real and personal property.

Column B shows what will happen if the rollback election passes. (\$.18 tax rate plus \$10.00 per month service fee increase)
Column C shows the amount due using the \$.43 tax rate adopted by the


