

Emergency Farm Loans Are Being Accepted By FmHA

Applications for emerg-ency farm loans for losses caused by adverse weather are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration office located in Floydada, FmHA County Supervisor Becky Via said today.

Briscoe County is one of Briscoe County is one of many in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Richard E. Lyng as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the flooding and severe storms. Ms. Via said farmers may

be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," Ms. Via said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Continued On Page 2

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until February 26, 1990 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in proces-sing and possible over into the new farming season," Ms. Via said.

It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U. S. citizens and to farming partnerships,

should report their marriages even if the marriages will not change their benefits. Often other changes may be needed such as changes may be needed such as change of address, change of names on social security records, and changing the names on checks they receive. Changing the address

important even for beneficiaries with direct deposit because the social security administration must mail notices to all beneficiaries several times a year

beneficiaries several times a year. A name change should be reflected on the social security card. The beneficiary must complete an application for the card and provide proof of the name change, such as a marriage license or marriage certificate. People with medicare may also

need to show the new name on that card. All records should show the same name

Another good reason to report the marriage is to find out when, and if, a beneficiary can qualify for benefits on the new sp

social security record. If more social security record. If more money can be paid on the basis of the marriage, the beneficiary will be told when to apply. There is usually a one year wait before the beneficiary can receive benefits on the new rouse's record the new spouse's record.

Some benefits do not end with marriage. A widow or widower over 60 (or a disabled widow or widower 50 or older) will not lose his or her benefits with remar-riage. A person receiving benefits as a disabled child, a divorced spouse, a parent, or a widow, or widower receiving benefits based on having child in care, will have benefits end unless the marriage is to carting other social ecourity to certain other social security beneficiaries.

Questions about marriage and Questions about marriage and benefits can be answered by contacting social security by phone, mail, or in person. Beneficiaries should have their claim number with them if they call or visit the office. For best service, contact social security after the first week of the month.
