Mixed Softball Tournament Set For July 22-24

The Second Annual Valley Mixed Softball Tournament will be held July 22-23-24 in the Quitaque City Park. It will be a double elimination tournament. and five men and five women must be in the lineup at the same time. Alternating positions is a must. If a woman catches, a man must pitch, woman at first base, man at second, etc.

Entry deadline is Wednesday, July 20, at 8:00 p.m.

Brackets will be out Thursday, July 21, at 8:00 p.m.

Rosters must be turned in prior to the first game and are frozen for the remainder of the tournament. Individuals are limited to one team in the tournament. Rosters are limited to fourteen players.

Game time is forfeit time. Lineups must be in the hands of the official scorekeeper five minutes before the start of the game. Official time will be kept by the official scorer.

Teams must hit their own ball, which must be blue dot.

Home team will be determined by a coin flip at home plate prior to the start of every game. There will be a fifty-five minute time limit on all games, excluding the

championship game.

The run rule will be fifteen in four, ten in five. No practice will be allowed during the game.

There will be no infield practice. Three warm-up pitches will be permitted prior to the first pitch. Coaches are responsible for the conduct of their players.

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

Computer Classes To Be Offered At Valley

The 1983-84 school year will see an addition to its already existing curriculum at Valley School. For the first time ever, computer training will become a part of the curriculum to which part of the curriculum to which every student graduating from Valley will be introduced. Begin-ning with the next school year, computer literacy will be taught in one of the junior high grades. Computer literacy gives a student a minimal level of knowledge and skills concerning computer technology and usage and will prepare students for more advanced study.

A course in computer pro-gramming will be offered for credit as a high school course. Computer programming is fun-damental to communicating with and controlling the computer. The high school course will be offered to students above the tenth grade who have sufficient background in math. In addition to the other two courses, word


