## Soil Conservation Saves In Many Ways

Farmers are a breed of hard-working innovators. Farmers bring new meaning to the saying, "Necessity is the Mother of Invention." When there seems to be no way out, farmers have come through with more production and less expense. Now is the time when farmers need to be alert to every opportunity to save money in their farming operation.

Soil is the heart and blood of a farming operation. We cannot afford to lose this precious commodity. A common way of conserving soil on sloping land is terraces. The expense of building terraces is a good investment; however, terraces become worn down and repair money is hard to come by. This is why a 40" strip of weeping lovegrass planted on top of your terraces is such a good investment. This strip can

be seeded with a modified whirlwind seeder, using plywood or tin. The spacing can be narrowed to 40" to 80".

The grass not only serves as a windbreak for growing crops, such as tender young cotton, but this is a good way to insure that your terraces stay intact. Soil which is blown or washed in a field is trapped in the top of the terrace by the grass strip. The land requirements, using this kind of system, are minimal. For example, in a 100-acre field which has 30,000 feet of terraces, these grass strips would take up only about two acres. Cost of seed and seeding would be about \$1.00 an acre.

**ENFORCEMENT OF SEAT BELT LAW STARTS DEC. 1**

Department of Public Safety enforcement of the new Texas safety belt law begins on Sunday, December 1, 1985. The law, expected to save hundreds of lives a year in Texas by encouraging more motorists to buckle up, took effect September 1. Drivers and front-seat passengers of cars and trucks up to three-quarter ton capacity will be subject to fines of \$25 to \$50 for violations committed on or after December 1.

"Informal observations by DPS troopers indicate that two-thirds of Texas motorists are already complying with this law," said Colonel Jim Adams, DPS director. "Those motorists who are not observing this statute are risking losing their lives or being seriously injured in a vehicle accident, and soon they'll also be facing the prospect of paying a fine for their oversight."

Adams said that in most instances, troopers will be check-

ing for compliance with the safety belt law during routine traffic violator contacts. However, he pointed out that troopers will have the option of stopping motorists if the officers have probable cause to believe the law is being violated.

"The possibility of paying a fine for failing to use a safety belt should increase the incentive for observing this law, but much greater consequences could be involved for motorists who don't use this proven, lifesaving device," Adams said. "What value can be placed on the loss of a human life or a long-term, serious injury resulting from a crash in which a safety belt could have made the difference?"

The new law did not change the child safety seat statute, which provides that children under two years of age must be secured in a federally-approved child safety seat system when they are riding in a passenger car or light truck (3/4 ton capacity and less). Children from two to four years of age must be secured by a safety belt or safety seat system when riding in a car or light truck.

The only persons exempted from the safety belt law are U. S. Postal Service employees while performing their carrier duties and motorists who possess a written statement from a licensed doctor stating that the person cannot wear a safety belt for medical reasons.

## Cotton Farmers Urged To Check Moisture of Seed for Planting

Cotton harvesting is moving into full swing from San Angelo and Big Spring northward across the South Plains. The crop is reported to be stripping and ginning well, says a cotton specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

But he cautioned producers who are catching seed for planting next season to check their seed moisture carefully before taking it to the delinters.

"There have been reports of problems with seed that is to be delinted and used as planting seed," said Dr. James R. Supak, Extension cotton agronomist. In many instances, the seed moisture content is still too high, he explained.

Dr. Supak noted that to avoid damage during delinting, the seed moisture content must be below 10 percent, preferably seven to eight percent. "They've been getting quite a bit in the 12 to 15 percent seed moisture range, and that's too high for delinting," he added.

The high moisture content can cause the seed to go through a natural heating process which damages seed quality during storage in modules, or it can result in damage to the seed during the delinting process, he said.

The Extension specialist said a good way to check seed moisture, if the field is ready to strip, is to walk through the field and bite down on seeds collected from various parts of the field. "If you hear the seed coat crack when you bite it, the seeds are dry enough to be processed. If the seed is soft and just mashes down without a distinct crack, the moisture content is still too high," he said.

Also, most delinting plant operators have moisture meters and are willing to check the moisture content of seed cotton in the module or even before harvest as a customer service.

If you want the seed for planting and it is still too moist, the best thing is to delay harvest for a few more days, Dr. Supak advised.

"We do have a hard freeze in the weather forecast," he said. That, followed by a few days of

open, dry weather should finish the drying process, he noted.

"We think this (high seed moisture) is just a short term problem," Dr. Supak said. "We are in that time when the fiber and bur are dry enough to harvest, but the seed is still too green to process."

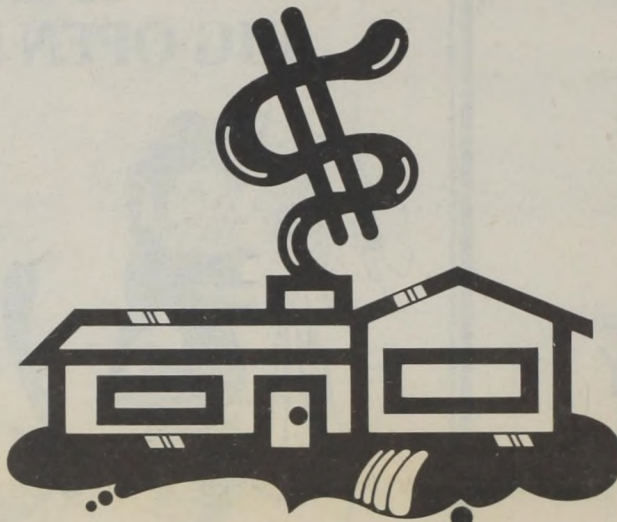

## TIPS FOR HOMEOWNERS

**Choosing a Tape Rule**  
How can you tell if a tape rule will do a top job for you? Here are some things the experts say you should look for:



• **Blade Graphics:** Extract three feet of blade, lay it on the floor and see how easy it is to read as you look down on it from standing position. Also examine graphics quality—graduation line uniformity of length and thickness, dark print of good contrast, for example.

• **Blade Retraction:** Pull blade out several feet and allow it to retract under control of forefinger under blade. Return should be positive, but not overpowering.

• **Blade Lock:** Pull blade out two feet and apply lock. Allow rule case to hang down while holding blade tip; blade should not slip.

• **Blade Hook:** the blade hook should be free to move to allow both inside and outside measurements to be taken. Blade corners near the hook should not be sharp.

• **Belt Clip:** Test belt clip secureness by trying to rotate it from its assembled position.
