Firemen To Display Fireworks Turkey To Host Annual Cookout

The Turkey Volunteer Fire Department will once again host their annual July 4th Hamburger Cookout and Fireworks Display Wednesday, July 4th beginning at 7 p.m. at the City Park.

Volunteer emergency personnel will be cooking and serving barbecued hamburgers with all the trimmings and the ladies will serve up homemade ice cream to cool citizens off before the largest display of fireworks in the history of the celebration begins at dusk.

A drawing will be held for a RCA VCR during the celebration.

Live music will be provided by local entertainers.

The Hall County Centennial Committee will be on hand to join in the fun and festivities. They have matched the City of Turkey expenditures for the fireworks, which means a bigger and better display. They promise to have plenty of Hall County Centennial, and Hall County Proud souvenirs on hand for sale.

The public is urged to attend and support local emergency volunteers, as they host this annual fun filled fund raiser.

Mayor Conner To Call Special Election

In a regular meeting of the Quitaque City Council on May 7, 1990, in a unanimous vote by members of the City Council, Mayor Elgin Conner ordered a special election to be held on August 11, 1990, for the citizens of Quitaque to vote on two (2) sales tax issues.

The first issue is an optional sales tax of one-half percent to reduce property taxes. Revenues generated by this tax will directly reduce ad valorem taxes paid by property owners in the City. Revenues from this tax can be used for any legal purpose, as long as it is budgeted for expenditures, just like any other City revenue.

The second issue is a new sales tax made available to Cit-

izens by Senate Bill 971 passed in the 71st Legislature. This bill allows a City to levy a one-half percent sales tax to fund an industrial development corporation appointed by the City Council. This Board will run the industrial corporation and administer the sales tax revenues. Revenues collected from this tax can only be used for economic and industrial development.

Both sales tax issues will be presented to the registered voters of the City of Quitaque in a special election on August 11, 1990, and must be passed by a majority of the qualified voters voting in this election.

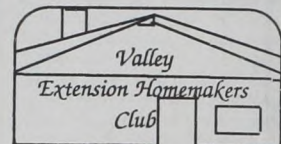
