SHERMAN — Technical Sergeant Rupert G. Brown, son of Mr. and Mrs. Rupert Brown of Colerain, N. C., is a member of the Perrin AFB unit that has been selected as the best aircraft maintenance organization in the U. S. Air Force.

Sgt. Brown is a security police supervisor with the 4780th Air Defense Wing, winner of the 1969 Daedalian Maintenance Trophy.

It marks the first time an Aerospace Defence Command (ADC) unit has won the stiff Air Force-wide competition for the annual award which was established by the Order of Daedallians, an organization founded by World War I pilots.

Wing personnel were cited for outstanding performance in supporting aircraft, including F-102 Delta Dagger fighter-interceptors, used in tarring ADC aircrews who help protect the United States against aerial attack.

CLYDE — Funeral services for William L. Jennings Jr. of Clyde, were held at 3 p. m. Wednesday in the Cherry Heights Baptist Church, with Rev. Glen Ward officiating. Burial was in the Cottonwood Cemetery, under direction of North Funeral Home. Masons were pallbearers.

## NEW CLYDE LAKE WITHIN THREE FEET OF SPILLWAY

CLYDE — The new Clyde City Lake, located on Pecan Bayou about 7 miles south of town, now contains about 5,000 acre feet of water. It's capacity is 5,700 acre feet. The many recent rains have really come at the proper time, and have

filled the lake to within three feet of the spillway.

Dedication ceremonies for the lake have been planned for Saturday, June 20, reported M. M. Tabor, City Councilman. Officials of the Soil Conservation Service, and Rep. Omar Burleson will be on hand for the ceremonies.

The lake will supply water for Clyde, as well as a recreation area. Plans for the lake include a 42-acre park on the west side, with a sand beach for swimming, beach houses, picnic tables, camping areas, boat ramps and docks.

## SUMMER BAND CAMP AT ABILENE CHRISTIAN, JULY 5-17

ABILENE — Band directors from Stanton, Brownfield, Hamlin, Clyde and Abilene have been named faculty members for the first annual summer band camp at Abilene Christian College, according to Charles Traylor, ACC assistant professor of music and band director.

The camp is scheduled July 5-17 in Leonard Burford Music Center at the college. "The band camp is open to all interested bandmen who will be between seventh graders and high school seniors in the 1970-71 school year," said Traylor.

Included on the band camp faculty will be George Walker of Stanton, Fred Smith of Brownfield, Tim Jones of Hamlin, Bobby Brooks of Clyde, Bill Spencer of Mann Junior High in Abilene and Warren Thaxton of Cooper High School in

Abilene.

Four members of the ACC music faculty and four ACC band students will teach in the band camp. Jimmy Mauldin, ACC junior from Clyde, will teach the drum major class. ACC twirlers Sue Churchill of Dallas, Chris Nowell of Lovington, N. M., and Karen Roemer of Port Lavaca will teach the twirling class.

Camp tuition is \$30 for the two-week camp. Room and board (36 meals and lodging for 13 nights) for out of town students will be \$55. Reservation fees of \$30 for tuition only students and \$40 for tuition and rooming students are due June 20 to Traylor.

Instruction will be provided in all band instruments, music theory and music interpretation, as well as twirling and drum majoring.

## SPECIAL PROGRAMS PROVIDE EMPLOYMENT FOR LOCAL YOUTH

BAIRD — Baird Schools are participating in the Neighborhood Youth Corps and the Work-Study Program this summer.

The NYC program is funded through the Federal Government and provides employment and training for students. Seven Baird students are enrolled in

this program, and are employed at the school, the Chamber of Commerce office, and School Tax Office.

The Work-Study program is available through the Texas Education Agency and provides 12 weeks summer employment for boys pre-enrolled in Vocational Agriculture for the following year.

Eighty per cent of this program's cost is through Federal funds with the local employer contributing the other twenty per cent.

Three of the boys on this program are employed at Shady Oaks Recreation Center, with John Wright serving as supervisor. They are Barry Holder, Russell Whitehead and Andy Sublett, Manuel Gonzales and Wayne Fiedler are employed by the City of Baird, with Conley Pruitt as supervisor. Mike Tollett is employed at the County Courthouse, supervised by Co. Judge A. E. Dyer Jr.

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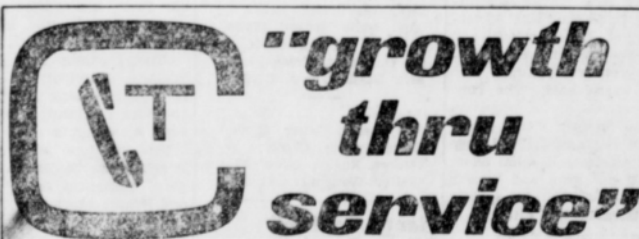

## FORT GRIFFIN FANDANGLE SCHEDULED FOR JUNE 18-20, 25-27

ALBANY — In Albany, a town of 2,000, dwells one of the most ambitious and successful community projects in the United States. Called the Fort Griffin Fandangle, it is a giant outdoor spectacle, an historical musical production presented in its own amphitheatre, carved from a hillside in a pasture donated by a local rancher. With a cast of 300 local men, women and children, the show depicts the early pioneer history of Albany and nearby Fort Griffin.

The Fandangle is written, directed, lighted, costumed, sung and danced by Albany people making it the only known "People's Theatre" in the United States.

This year the Fandangle will be presented June 18-20, 25-27 at 8:45 D.S.T. The Parade will be June 25th at 6 p. m. Barbecue will be served each evening on the Court House Lawn. As the audience gathers in the prairie theatre, a 1600 all reserved seat amphitheatre one mile west of Albany, a steam callopo will entertain with

Fandangle songs. The callopo was built by an Albany man from old oil field pipes, a steam boiler and a piano keyboard and was encased in a beautiful red and gold circus type frame. The only musical instrument in Texas that has to be checked by the State boiler inspector, the callopo can be heard for seven miles on a clear day.

This year the Fandangle is more of a community effort than ever. Robert Nail, creator, writer, director and producer of 30 years of Fandangle, died in November, 1968. A team consisting of Director James Ball, composer of many Fandangle songs and lifetime working associate of Nail, music director Alice Reynolds, co-creator with Nail, choreographer Marge Bray Albany's dancing instructor and a dancer in the first Fandangle, Technical Engineer John King, recent Texas Tech graduate and former grade school mike boy, and old and new members of the Fandangle cast presented a preview of the 1970 show on April 24th at the Fort Griffin Fandangle Membership Party. The performance was enthusiastically praised by the press and by the most critical of critics, the folks who love the Fandangle most, people who live in Albany, Texas.

A. grade, to be collected at the point of first processing or sale, and to elect members for a fifteen man commodity producers board to administer proceeds of such assessment for purposes of promotion, research, education, and disease and insect control designed to encourage the production, marketing, and use of turkeys.

The referendum and election will be held by mail ballot furnished to all eligible voters not later than fifteen days prior to election date. Ballots must be mailed to the polling place at P. O. Box 3929, Bryan, Texas 77801, before midnight on the election date.

For purpose of this referendum, a turkey producer is defined as a person, firm, or corporation having actual ownership of turkeys during production. All persons in this category are eligible to vote in the referendum and election, since they would be required to pay the proposed assessment.

Any person qualified to vote in this referendum and election may place his name in nomination for election to the proposed commodity producers board by application to the above organization signed by himself and ten other persons eligible to vote in the referendum. Such application must be filed at least 30 days prior to the election date.

Any person qualified to vote in this referendum who does not receive a ballot prior to July 12, 1970, may obtain one at his local County Agent's office. 22-3-c

**-- RACISM AND TEXAS --**

**By Sterling Tucker**  
Brown County, Texas, where I grew up, was as "Southern" in its attitude as any county in Alabama or Mississippi. There was racism there, but we didn't call it that. We didn't call it anything at all, we never even thought about it. There was a "nigger town" where all the "niggers" lived. They could come up town to shop or to work but they had to leave before dark. They were not allowed to go in movie theaters, barber shops or restaurants. Some restaurants might serve them order "to go." In public places there were "colored restrooms" and "colored waiting rooms." There were signs everywhere reading "whites only." Negroes were not considered for jobs of responsibility or authority or even hold jobs of a technical nature. Negroes did manual labor and menial tasks; jobs with no future and little pay. I often heard the expression "nigger work" used to describe a dirty, hard and unpleasant job. And segregation was total, in schools, churches, and all social events. All this we took for granted, but it was racism, naked and ugly, cruel and unjust, racism.

In a few short years, ten or twelve, all that has changed. I

don't say that prejudice and racism no longer exists in Texas. Of course they do and they will as long as the world is populated with human beings. But that brutal, repressive, insulting type of racism is gone, and a just inter-graduation has been achieved. And it was achieved without riots, protest marches, federal troops, violent confrontations or bloodshed. Texas underwent a peaceful transition in race relations, not a violent revolution. What was the difference between the race relations in Texas and those in Mississippi and Alabama? Why did we have a non-violent transition and they a violent revolution? The people of Texas can take most of the credit themselves. I think. The people looked into their hearts, saw what they were doing wrong and changed. The "whites only" signs came down and the inter-graduation began. The leaders of the churches and our newspaper editors are due some credit too. They didn't fight inter-graduation. Perhaps some of them did not vehemently support the idea or mix in the races, but they did not vehemently oppose it either. Our state leaders can take a lot of credit also, especially our Governors. Most of us are followers. We elect people to lead us, then we follow their lead. That is the nature of humans. We in Texas were very fortunate to have men like Price Daniel and John Connally to lead us through most of that transitional period. Their wise leadership helped to save us from a violent and disgraceful confrontation of the races such as they had in other parts of the South.

Now we are faced with another tumultuous and potentially dangerous time. Some have called 1970 "the year of the Chicano." There is a lot of unrest and discontent among the Mexican-Americans of Texas. The rumblings of that discontent were heard in Abilene

not long ago. The situation was handled with a minimum of inconvenience and embarrassment to all concerned. Some other cities, such as Crystal City, were not so lucky. The Mexican-Americans are well organized, well financed and well led. Brilliant and respectable men like Mark Smith are eager to carry the Chicano banner into legal battle. The "Chicano", the Mexican-Americans have made it very clear that they no longer will be "second class citizens." And certainly there should not be any second class citizens: no group left outside the main stream of our everyday life. I feel sure the people of Texas will show the same wisdom and compassion they have shown in the past in dealing with problems of human relations. I think we can count on the churches and newspaper to help avoid widespread violence. I can only hope that our State leaders can rise to the occasion, also, and give the people of Texas the wise and mature leadership we so badly need and deserve.
