School, hospital districts big losers in abolishing tax

The movement to abolish the City of Muleshoe's personal vehicle tax could have serious implications for the local school and hospital districts.

With citizens expressing discontent to Muleshoe's City Council concerning the annual tax on vehicles, problems may be ahead for Muleshoe ISD and Muleshoe Area Hospital District, which also impose a personal auto tax.

The issue of revoking the current personal tax on vehicles was discussed before the City Council Tuesday by numerous concerned taxpayers.

The city stands to lose approximately \$80,000 of 1997 tax revenue if the vehicle tax is repealed. However, the city could recoup the loss by raising taxes on homes.

Muleshoe ISD stands to gain approximately \$243,434 from taxes on vehicles from 1997, according to Bailey County Appraisal District.

School superintendent Bill Moore said that the revenue generated from the tax is vital, but he can't speak for the Trustees, who would have the final say on whether or not to discontinue the tax.

If the tariff is revoked and

the district decides it needs to recover the loss, Moore said the district may be forced to raise property taxes 13 to 15 cents to approximately \$1.40, which is still below the state

As of Thursday afternoon, Moore was unaware of any citizen requesting to speak in front of the board, or requesting that the board examine the tax is-


A third entity in town which taxes personal autos is Muleshoe Area Hospital District, which could possibly have the most to lose if the tax is re-

The hospital stands to gain approximately \$42,392 from 1997 taxes on personal vehicles. According to hospital district director Jim Bone, if the district was to lose the revenue, it have no way to regain the funds since there is a cap on tax rates for homes.

As with the school district, as of Thursday no citizen had contacted nospital officials to speak in front of the board about revoking the tax.

When the Bailey County Appraisal District sends out bills for the tax, all three entities make up the total due. As

Chase ends in crash

A high-speed chase that started near Plainview ended shortly after midnight Friday when a Wyoming man crashed a stolen pickup into a fire hydrant on a downtown Muleshoe street.

Ray Pena, who allegedly assaulted his live-in girlfriend in Lockney and later stole a truck, frequently drove at speeds of more than 100 miles per hour along U.S. Highway 70 with several police officers in pursuit.

Local police placed metal spikes across the road near the YL Highway in an attempt to stop Pena, but the 38-year-old suspect continued more than three miles on the truck's tire rims before running into a fire hydrant at the corner of First Street and Avenue C about 12:30 p.m.

The unemployed Cheyenne, Wyo. man then fled on foot before being captured a short time later in an alley behind the Muleshoe City Hall.

"We're lucky nobody was hurt," Bailey County Sheriff Coy Plott said. "I knew he wasn't going to stop until he crashed or ran out of gas."

Pena was arraigned in district court Friday morning on two counts of fleeing, aggravated assault and unauthorized use of a motor vehicle. He was being held on \$14,000 bail at the Bailey County Jail.

The chase started in Hale County near Plainview, where the suspect also allegedly stole a tank of gas from a convenience store.

Monday, the station held the drawing and the first person they chose happened to be Posadas, who was listening to the program with her children at home.


If Posadas hadn't been listening or she didn't call in the station back in the given time allotment, the radio station would have chosen another name.

Emergency Care attendant course


An emergency care attendant course will be offered by the Lazbuddie Emergency Medical Service at the Lazbuddie School.







The road has been unkind to Muleshoe

The road to the playoffs has been bumpy so far for the Muleshoe Mules.

Muleshoe is looking up in the District 1-3A standings at district co-leaders Tulia and Dimmitt after losing its second-straight road game.

Top-ranked and unbeaten Tulia drilled Muleshoe 63-44 Tuesday, using a trapping 2-3 zone to harrass the Mules into their worst shooting game of the season.

Coupled with a last-second loss at Dimmitt last week, the Mules (16-7 overall, 3-2 in district) find themselves tied for third with Friona and two games out of first place.

Next Tuesday's home game against the Chieftains (16-4) looms just as large for the Mules.

"Every Tuesday night is a big game," Muleshoe coach Ralph Mason said. "If we hope to win the district we're going to have to win out."

The Mules shot a dismal 28 percent from the field against Tulia while absorbing its worst loss of the season.

"Tulia just never allowed us to get into a flow," Mason, after the Mules were surprised






