## April 1, 1991 Deadline For Filing Personal Property Renditions

Carlye Fleming, chief appraiser, Briscoe County Appraisal District, reminds residents that they must file property renditions forms with her office by April 1, 1991.

The legal deadline for renditions is actually March 31, which falls on a Sunday this year. As a result, the 1991 deadline has been moved to the

first working day after March 31. Property owners may receive a 30-day extension, but must file a written request with the appraisal district by April 1, 1991.

A rendition is a report a property owner files each year, listing taxable property he owns or manages as of January 1.

"The law requires certain property owners to file renditions every year," noted Mrs. Fleming.

Anyone who owns or manages income-producing personal property on January 1 must file a rendition statement with the local appraisal district. "Businesses, for instance must report their inventories, furniture and fixtures, machinery and equipment, and other tangible business property on a rendition; in addition individuals who own cars, pickups, travel trailers, mobile homes, boats, etc. must report these items on a rendition. It is to their benefit to do so because chief appraisers use the rendition report to establish the property's fair market value," Mrs. Fleming explained.

When personal property isn't rendered, the chief appraiser is forced, by law, to estimate the value," she added.

The chief appraiser also may require other property owners or managers to render property. If so, she will send a notice and the appropriate rendition form.

While only the above-men-

tioned personal property must be rendered, anyone may voluntarily file a rendition with the appraisal district. Texas law does not require a property owner to render a home or other real property, but they may render it if they so desire.

According to Mrs. Fleming, there are three distinct advantages of filing a rendition (1) You give your opinion of your property's value. If the appraisal district places a higher value for your property, it must notify you in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value before the Appraisal Review Board. (2) You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the correct address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments. (3) You also can file a "Report of Decreased Value," to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation to your property in 1990. The district will look at your prop-

erty before assigning a value in 1991.

Rendition and report of decreased value forms are available at the appraisal district office. The law requires that the property owner provide all information requested on the form. Mrs. Fleming noted that making false statements

or renditions and reports of decreased value is a criminal violation.

Rendition forms and decreased value reports are confidential and not open to public inspection.

## Open House On Correction Officer Jobs

The course will be conducted in Childress on evenings and weekends during June and July. The tuition/fee cost of this course is \$330 per person. The Panhandle Job Training Partnership has funds available to pay this cost for eligible unemployed and low-income persons.

**Harris Announces Relief From Set-Aside Cover Crop Rule For Texas Farmers**

The Texas State ASC Committee today, March 13, exempted Texas from the fifty percent cover crop requirement on Acreage Conservation Reserve (ACR) acres according to Jerry Harris, Chairman of the Texas State ASC Committee.  
 The Food, Agriculture, Conservation and Trade Act of 1990 required that half of the acreage set-aside under the commodity programs be planted to a cover crop. The legislation also allowed for the exemption of those areas determined to be arid by USDA.

The determination to exclude Texas was based on meteorological data that shows the line between non-arid and arid regions running from North Dakota through Texas. All states east of the line are not considered arid and must comply with the fifty percent cover requirement. Most states west of the line are considered arid and do not have to comply with the fifty percent cover requirement.

"Since this line runs through Texas, the Texas State ASC Committee determined to exclude all of the state from the fifty percent cover requirement," Harris said.

Ms. Thomas told that Americans generate more trash than any nation in the world. Americans throw away ten times their weight in trash every year or about one-half ton for

every person. Recycling reduces the amount of waste.

One of the best ways to reduce municipal solid waste is to limit packaging. She said the best type of packaging are refillable and resealable containers. Avoid individually wrapped portions of items and over packaged items. Foods in their natural or raw form have less packaging.

On a diagram poster, she listed three basic steps of recycling are separating, processing, and return to commerce. The type of recycling program a community chooses should be designed to meet community needs and be easy to use.

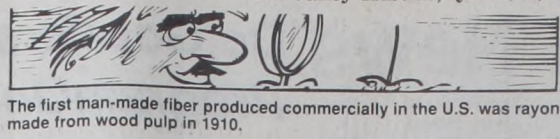
