Mr. James Alexander, Principal of Clyde High School, has announced that one student at Clyde High School has been named Semifinalist in the 1970-71 National Merit Scholarship Program. The student is Gayl Mikeska, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. J. E. Mikeska Jr., and of Mrs. Ina Mikeska.

The Semifinalists were the highest scorers in their states on the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (NMQT), which was given last February to some 710,000 students in 17,000 schools nationwide. They constitute less than one per cent of the graduating secondary school seniors in the United States.

Semifinalists must advance to Finalist standing to be considered for the Merit Scholarship to be awarded next spring. Semifinalists become Finalists by receiving the endorsement of their schools, substantiating their high NMQT performance on a second examination, and providing information about their achievements and interests.

December Lettings Of Highway Contracts Cancelled

AUSTIN — The Texas Highway Commission today announced cancellation of the regular December lettings of highway contracts throughout the State.

The Commission blamed the contracting moratorium on the recent holdback of part of the Texas apportionment from the Federal Highway Trust Fund.

The action came at a time when highway construction has been at an all-time high in the State due to favorable weather. For the last two months, pay-out for construction completed by Texas contractors has set new records in dollar volume.

Contractors were paid \$42.6 million in July for work completed in June and \$46.3 million in August for work completed in July. The payments represented work on 501 contracts in June and 593 contracts in July.

The Federal Aid Highway act of 1968, as approved by the Congress, provided that the States should receive \$5.4 billion for the 1971 fiscal year apportionment from the Highway Trust Fund. This amount was reduced by the Administration to \$4.5 billion nationally and resulted in a reduction of the Texas share from \$275 million to \$210 million, \$65 million less than expected.

APPLICATION OF CONSERVATION PRACTICES HELPS COUNTY

BAIRD — The application of conservation practices on Great Plains Conservation Program contracts in Callahan County increased this year over the previous three years. A total of \$50,256 were earned on farms and ranches in Callahan County from July 1, 1969 to June 30, 1970 through the Great Plains Program. This federal cost share assistance was earned on 84 contracts with a total of 49,039 acres.

acres, and installation of 30,776 feet of cross fences on pasture and rangeland.

Water and air pollution in Callahan Co. has been reduced greatly by the establishment of permanent grasses on cropland which was susceptible to both wind and water erosion.

Brush control and deferred grazing also have reduced the amount of sediment being carried into county lakes and ponds. The silt which would end up in the lakes if not controlled, is being held in place on farms and ranches where a good grass cover is maintained. The increase in grass production following brush control and deferred grazing not only enables the farmer or rancher to increase his production, but the cover of grass also benefits the city dweller as well by supplying city lakes with clear water and by recharging the ground water pumped by city wells.

Callahan Co. farmers and ranchers earned assistance from the application of the conservation practices which include: seeding or springing 328 acres of cropland to a permanent grass, reseeded 1622 acres of rangeland which had an inadequate grass cover, construction of 70,830 feet of parallel terraces on cropland, installation of 2,930 feet of diversion terraces, control of brush on 3,823

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CONVICTION OR CONVENIENCE?

Jeroboam told the Israelites, "It is too much for you to go up to Jerusalem." (1 Kings 12:28), so he made it convenient for them by setting up an idol in Bethel and one in Dan. It mattered not to him, nor to them, that God had said they must worship in Jerusalem.

People are not much different today. They are still seeking a religion of convenience, not of conviction. Though God commands men to repent (Acts 17:30) many make some kind of a profession and go right on living worldly lives as they always have. They have the unmitigated gall to call this Christianity! They think it is just "too much" to have to quit their worldly ways.

Many men (including many who call themselves preachers) think it is just "too much" to require men to be baptized before they can be saved, but this is just what God says. "The like figure whereunto baptism doth also now save us. Not the putting away of the filth of the flesh, but the answer of a good conscience toward God by the resurrection of Jesus Christ." (1 Pet. 3:21) That ought to settle, except for those who want a religion of convenience rather than conviction.

Who are we to say that God is asking "too much?" Hear the Apostle Paul! "Nay but, O man, who art thou that repliest against God? Shall the thing formed say to him that formed it, Why hast thou formed me thus?" (Rom. 9:20)

Is God asking "too much" to require all the saved to be members one church? Many think this is, indeed, asking "too much!" But, isn't this what the Lord requires? Let us read the scripture, "But now are they many members, yet but one body." (1 Cor. 12:20) This body, Paul declares, is the church (Col. 1:18). "There is one body." (Eph. 4:4) "The church, which is his body." (Eph. 1:23) The church is the body. There is only one body. How many churches did Christ establish? You know the answer to that! That is the one He expects us to be a member of, and the only one He will add us to (Acts 2:47). How about you?
