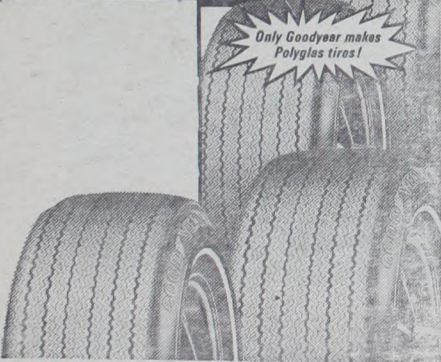



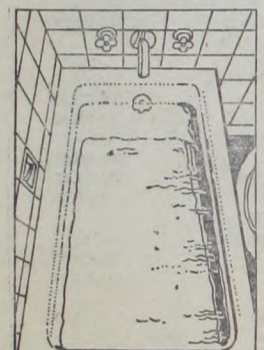

- Home Notes -

Several have requested the recipe for Mock Pecan Pie. Here it is along with the Oatmeal Pie-crust. I think the two go together very well.

OATMEAL PIE CRUST
¾ cup flour
4 tablespoons sugar
¾ teaspoon salt
½ cup fat
¾ cup rolled oats
4 to 5 tablespoons cold water
Mix flour, sugar and salt in a bowl. Mix in fat with a fork until mixture is like cornmeal. Stir in rolled oats. Sprinkle water over mixture and stir with a fork until dough sticks together but is not wet. Shape a ball. Spread a little flour on a flat surface and on a rolling pin. Shape dough with hands to fit a nine-inch pie pan. If you need a baked crust, prick bottom and sides of dough with a fork to keep crust flat. Bake at 425° F (hot oven) for 10 to 12 minutes or until light tan. Cool.

MOCK PECAN PIE
1 cup pinto beans mashed
4 eggs, well beaten
2 cups sugar

½ cup butter
2 teaspoons vanilla
Unbaked pie shell
Mix all ingredients. Pour into unbaked pie shell. Bake at 400° for 30 to 40 minutes.
