Dr. Callan, of the Callan Veterinary Clinic of Abilene, will vaccinate dogs and cats, over three months old, at this time. Charge for this service will be \$3.50 per animal.

The Ag Dept. is sponsoring this program for the people of Clyde having pets that need vaccinating. This clinic will make it easier to get animals treated and will help protect the community against danger of a rabies outbreak.

If an animal is worth keeping it is worth vaccinating, and the owner will also have the satisfaction of knowing that the pet will not contract or carry this dread disease.

CLYDE — The Bulldogs will host the Hamlin Pied Pipers here in Bulldog Stadium at 8 p. m. Friday.

The Bulldogs had more than the usual number of opening night miscues at Merkel last Friday night, but still managed a 14-7 win against the hard-hitting Badgers. Clyde lost five fumbles and had 12 penalties for 157 yards.

Offensively, the Bulldogs had

16 first downs, 186 yards rushing and 116 passing. Gary Barr scored the opening touchdown on a 4-yard carry and ran for the last two point conversion. Craig Loper hit the middle for six yards and the last touchdown. Barr, Loper and Doug Horner all averaged over 5 yards per carry for the night. Scott Kniffen blocked a punt and Tommy Ross intercepted one pass. Barr and Rick Gilmore recovered fumbles for Clyde.

The defense played well except for one play when Merkel's big fullback went 61 yards for their only touchdown.

Two starters, Mark Henager and Jarrel Hurst received minor injuries, but may be able to see limited action this week against Hamlin. Hamlin will play, as they have the Jones brothers, Milton and Johnny who have been clocked at 10.0 and 9.8 in the 100. They scored 62 and 75-yard touchdowns against a tough Winters team last Friday.

The Pied Piper attack is built around 200-pound fullback Barry McDonald, All Area Candidate, who missed the Winters game due to illness.

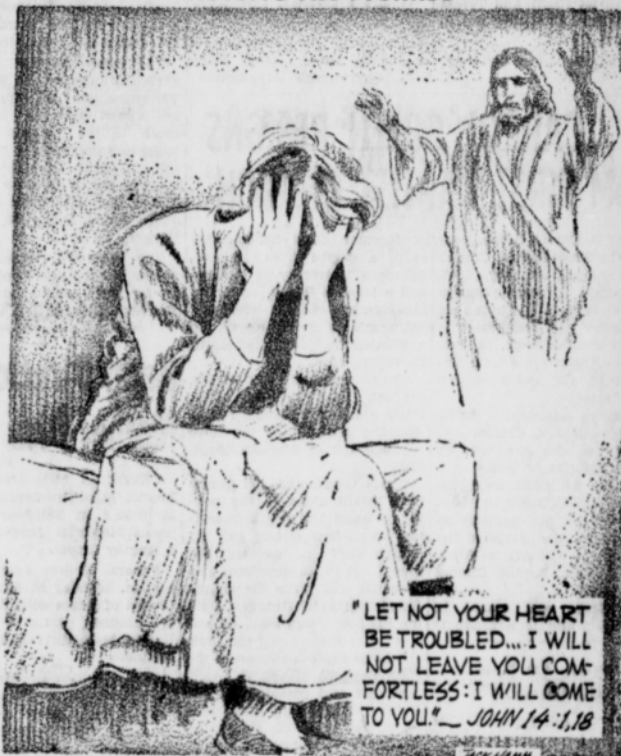

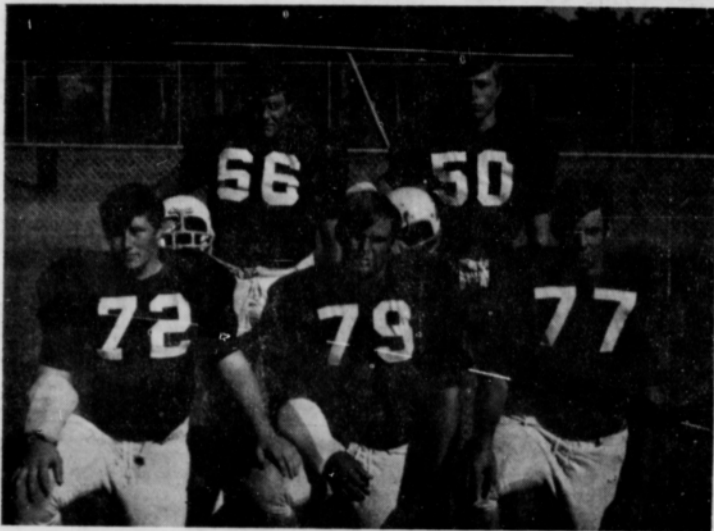

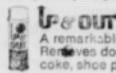

IN TEXAS**

All brands and marks on Tex-  
as livestock must be rerecorded  
with County Clerks after  
August 30, 1971, according to a  
new law passed during the last  
session of the Texas Legislature.  
Producers will be given a six-  
month period, August 30, 1971  
through February 29, 1972, in  
which to register these brands  
and marks and the location on  
the animal which they are cur-  
rently using, after which time  
any unrecorded brand will be  
available for use on a "first-  
come" basis.

The law further states that  
all such brands and marks must  
be recorded every 10 years. Each  
County Clerk records for his  
given county only, so many pro-  
ducers may need to record their  
brands in additional counties if  
their operations are extensive.

The owner shall have the  
right, during this six-month  
period, to file the mark and  
brand now recorded in his name.  
In the event it cannot be de-  
termined from the records who  
first recorded the brand and  
mark in the county, then the  
person who has been using such  
mark and brand the longest  
shall have the right to have  
the brand and mark recorded  
in his name.

It should be noted that it  
is illegal to brand livestock  
without first properly recording  
the brand with the County  
Clerk in the county in which  
the livestock are held.

When the brand or brands  
are recorded, the location on  
the animal on which the brand  
is to be applied must be desig-  
nated. If the brand is to be ap-  
plied to more than one loca-  
tion on the animal, it must be  
so recorded and each additional  
location for the brand on the  
animal shall constitute a sepa-  
rate recording of that brand.

There is no limit to the num-  
ber of brand and/or marks  
which may be recorded in a  
county by a person as long as  
requirements of this law gov-  
erning the recording and re-  
recording of livestock brands  
are met. Minors may have marks  
or brands separate from that  
of the father or guardian, which  
must be recorded or rerecorded  
as provided by the new law.

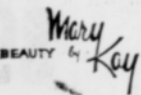
