Annual Ag Day Seminar Scheduled At Memphis

The Second Annual Hall County Agricultural Appreciation Day Seminar and Luncheon will be held Tuesday, August 9th in the Memphis Community Center from 8:30 a.m. until 1:00 p.m. The program is sponsored by the Hall County Extension Service and will offer three continuing education units to all private and non-commercial applicators.

Dr. Robert Lemon, Extension agronomist, will be a featured speaker and will be discussing "Optimum Cotton Management Strategies" including the use of plant growth regulators, harvest aid chemicals, and cotton monitoring techniques. Levon Harmon, Inspector with the Texas Department of Agriculture, will inform producers on the new Federal Worker Protection Laws which will be fully effective in January 1995.

Brent Baucom with the Hall County Soil Conservation Service will present information on the Conservation Reserve Program and how to farm within the guidelines of the CRP program. Emory Boring, Extension Entomologist from Vernon, will discuss current insect situations and outline the proposed Boll Weevil Eradication Program.

All area cotton producers and their spouses are invited to attend the seminar and complimentary luncheon; however, you must **RSVP no later than August 4th** by leaving word at the Hall County Extension Office at 806-259-3015. For more details, contact Hall County Extension Agent Tadd Knight at the phone number mentioned above.

Turkey Public Hearing Concerns TCDP Grant

At the public hearing July 21, 1994, Courtney Sharp with the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission met with the City Council and other interested persons. The meeting was in regard to the submission of the City of Turkey application to the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs for a Texas Community Development Program (TCDP) grant. The meeting allowed for citizen input and an opportunity to discuss the citizen participation plan, the development of local housing and community development needs, the amount of TCDP funding available, all eligible TCDP activities, and the use of past TCDP funds.

Sharp also shared other items that were available for the Council to use in future planning.

In other business, the council unanimously approved resolution no. 072194 to request sealed bids for City property described as Block 5 College Addition.

Donna Pigg made the trip as a sponsor as well as the advisors Darin Martinez and Rick McKay.

Joni Hancock and Krisse Pigg were presented with the Lone Star Degree by state president Scott Pollack. This degree is the highest a member can obtain at the state level.

George Pigg represented the Valley FFA by working for the Courtesy Corp. The primary function of the Courtesy Corp. is to assist in making sure the convention runs smoothly.

Other members of the group acted as delegates for the voting parts of the convention. The delegates helped elect a new state president, Jason Johnson from the Mt. Pleasant FFA chapter. The election of the new state president closed the convention and the group came home on Friday.

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Laura Fields Featured In Amarillo Paper

Laura (Eudy) Fields, daughter of Wilma Jewel and Tom Eudy of Turkey, was featured in the July 21 issue of the Amarillo Daily News. Along with a picture of Laura was also two pictures of her paintings.

Laura, a Claude resident, travels the countryside with her camera, snapping pictures of wildflowers, old houses and barns, cottonwood trees and wildlife, especially turkeys. What she captures on camera, she artistically alters through acrylics on canvas in her home studio on the outskirts of Claude.

Although Fields says she is not a "prolific painter," she has won numerous awards that testify to her proficiency.

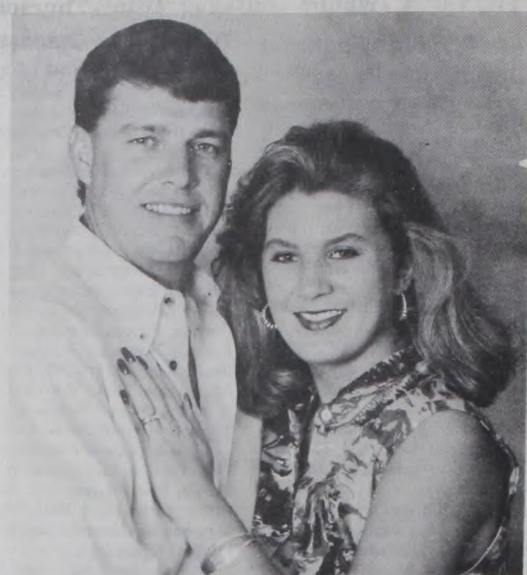

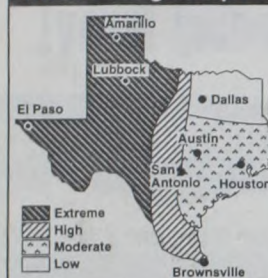

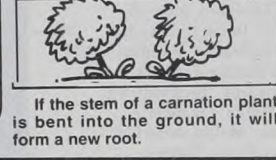

New Price Changes For The 1994-95 Fishing and Hunting License

The license fee on the Temporary (14 day) Resident Sportfishing License has been increased from \$5.00 to \$10.00.

The license fee on the Temporary (5 Day) Non-Resident Fishing License has been raised from \$10.00 to \$20.00 and the fee on the Non-Resident Fishing License has been raised from \$20.00 to \$30.00.

A new "Trophy Redfish Tag" will be included on the following licenses without any additional costs: Resident Combination Hunting and Fishing, Resident Fishing, Special Resident Fishing, Non-Resident Fishing and Fishing Duplicate. This tag will allow the license purchaser to keep one redfish over 28 inches in length provided the tag is properly completed and attached to the tail of the redfish.

A new Muzzleloader Hunting stamp (Fee: 10.00), will be required for those individuals who hunt during the special muzzleloader season from January 7, 1995 through January, 1995. This season will be for antlerless deer only and will be held only in the following counties: Bandera, Brown, Coke, Coleman, Concho, Edwards, Gillespie, Ition, Kendall, Kerr, Kimble, Kinney (north of US HWY 90), Menard, McCulloch, Mills, Real, Runnels, San Saba, Schleicher, Sutton, Sterling, Tom Green, and Uvalde (north of US HWY 90). This stamp will not be required for those hunters using muzzleloaders during the "general" deer hunting season.

TURKEY- QUITAQUE ISD

Turkey-Quitaque Independent School District announced its policy for providing free and reduced price meals for children served under the National School Lunch and Breakfast Program. Each school has a copy of the policy, which may be reviewed by any interested party.

The household size and income criteria identified below will be used to determine eligibility for free and reduced price benefits. Children from households whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced price meals. Foster children that are the legal responsibility of a welfare agency or court may also be eligible for benefits regardless of the income of the household with whom they reside. Eligibility for the foster child is based on the child's income.

Application forms will be distributed to all students the first day of school with a letter informing households of the availability of free and reduced price meals for their children. Applications also are available at the principal's office in each school. To apply for free and reduced price meals, households must fill out the application and return it to the school. Applications may be submitted anytime during the school year. The information households provide on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and verification of data. Applications may be verified by the school officials at any time during the school year.

For school officials to determine eligibility for free and reduced price benefits, households receiving food stamps or AFDC only have to list their child's name, food stamp or AFDC case number and an adult household member must sign the application. Households who do not list a food stamp or AFDC case number must list the names of all household members, the amount and source of the income received by each household member, how often the person received it and the social security number of either the primary wage earner responsible for the care of the child or the social security number of the adult household member who signs the application. If neither household member has a social security number, the household member must indicate that a social security number is not available. The application must be signed by an adult household member.

Under the provisions of the free and reduced price meal policy school officials will review applications and determine eligibility. Parents or guardians dissatisfied with the ruling of the official may wish to discuss the decision with reviewing official on an informal basis. Parents wishing to make a formal appeal for a hearing on the decision may make a request either orally or in writing to Valley School, Jerry Smith, Supt., P.O. Box 397, Turkey, TX 79261 or call (806) 455-1411.

Households that list a food stamp or AFDC case number must report when the household no longer received these benefits. Other households approved for benefits based on income information must report increases in household income of over \$50 per month or \$600 per year and decreases in household size. Also, if a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size increases, the household should contact the school. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for benefits if the household's income falls at or below the levels shown above.

In the operation of child feeding programs administered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, sex, national origin, age or handicap. If any member of a household believes they have been discriminated against, they should write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

The Bugs Are Back

The bugs are back. And they're in a buzz.

Even if you dread that familiar summer scenario, there is little you can do to prevent a run-in with one of the many vicious, venom carrying insects that invade every pool party, picnic, baseball game and barbecue.

Repellent will keep mosquitoes at bay, but the only way to avoid the sting of a harmful flying insect like a wasp or honeybee is to stay a safe distance away," says Dr. Robert Fromm, Jr., Director of Emergency Services at the Methodist Hospital in Houston.

Dr. Fromm says swatting at them with your hand may just stir them up, so it's best to just move away as fast as you can. "If you should disrupt a nest or beehive, run!" says Dr. Fromm.

Certain flying insects, like the honeybee, can sting just once, but several will strike several times and that means more poison penetrating your skin.

"Nausea, vomiting, shortness of breath, weakness and generalized swelling usually mean a lot of venom has been secreted into the skin" says Dr. Fromm. "If you notice those symptoms, it's time to see a doctor."

If you are stung by a honeybee, the bee will leave its stinger stuck in your skin along with a small sack which contains venom. Don't squeeze it! Dr. Fromm advises gently scraping it off the skin so the venom will not penetrate.

All insect stings will likely produce some localized swelling, redness of the skin, pain and an itching sensation. "The best way to treat most stings is to apply ice for the swelling and a lotion or cream to relieve the itching," says Dr. Fromm, "but try to resist the urge to scratch the affected area since that often causes an infection."

One more thing, interestingly enough, the smell of some fragrances and trash is a magnet for most stinging insects.
