**Lubbock Bicycle Club Sponsors Quitaque Quest**

The Quitaque Quest... sponsored by Lubbock Bicycle Club, is being described as "the ride of the year...more exciting than imaginable...more fun and laughs than ever before!!!" This two-day bicycle tour is scheduled to begin at the Allsup's store in Quitaque Saturday morning, May 22.

The riders will begin their 60 mile trek on Saturday by heading west to the intersection of SH 86 and SH 256. They will then turn back to the east and proceed on SH 256 to SH 70. The tour loops southward into Turkey and back to Quitaque where the bicyclists will spend the night at Caprock Canyons State Park.

Sunday's ride takes the tour from Caprock Canyons through Quitaque to Flomot by way of FM 1065 and back to Quitaque on FM 599. The second day covers about 35 miles.

Forty riders and support vehicles and personnel are expected to participate. Quitaque Chamber representatives will be on hand at 9:30 a.m. to welcome the Quitaque Quest to Quitaque and Caprock Canyons State Park.

**Tax Pamphlet Available at Appraisal Office**

Carlye Fleming, chief appraiser for the Briscoe County Appraisal District, offers area property owners a 1993 pamphlet called *Texas Property Taxes: Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies and Responsibilities* to help them save on their property taxes.

Published by the State Comptroller's Office in Austin, the "Remedies" pamphlet explains how the property tax system in Texas operates and offers suggestions for possible tax savings.

"Appraisal district staff can offer more information about special land appraisal, tax reductions and exemptions," Fleming said.

The chief appraiser pointed out though that over-65 homeowners do not need to reapply for the exemption this year if they received the exemption and tax ceiling last year. Only those who became 65 during 1992 and those who have never had the exemption and tax ceiling must apply in 1993.

The pamphlet also describes other exemptions available, such as those for disabled veterans, other disabled persons and senior citizens.

"A tax freeze, or ceiling, on a residence homestead for total school taxes is a benefit for homeowners who were 65 or older on January 1 of this year," Fleming said.

"I urge all property owners in the Briscoe County Appraisal District to read the pamphlet and learn about all possible property tax relief," Fleming said. "Remember, taxpayers must file all applications with the appraisal office by April 30 and any protest by May 31 of this year."

The pamphlets are available in the appraisal district office.

**Chamber Offers Help To New Businesses**

### Three Seminars Scheduled For Women Farmers

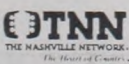

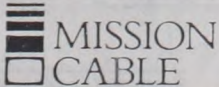

Gwen Clardy used to tune out her high school track coach. Now that she's in college, the freshman sprinter has learned to listen and digest everything UT-Arlington track coach Monte Stratton has to say.

So far, Clardy has discovered Stratton's words to be prophetic. Before the season, Stratton told Clardy she had the tools to go places, but only with the necessary hard work would she get there.

In last weekend's UTA Invitational, hard work helped Clardy become a provisional qualifier for the NCAA championships in the 100 and 200 meters. She won the 100 in 11.44

seconds and finished second in the 200 in 23.65.

Both times established UTA records and were the exclamation points Clardy needed to become one of the top sprinters in the Southland Conference.

"In high school, I really didn't listen to my coach," the 5-foot-4, 116-pounder from Plainview said. "But now I listen a lot more, and I take everything serious."

Since Clardy has the rest of this season and three more years remaining at UTA, Stratton is anticipating some more shining moments from his pupil.

"We're fairly confident that her provisional time in the 100 will hold up and get her a trip to the NCAA meet" Stratton said.
