Hall County Commissioners Begin Draft Of County-wide 911 Mapping

 Hall County Commissioners Court met in regular session on Monday, November 13, with County Judge Kenneth Dale presiding. Commissioners Larry D. Maddox, Joe N. Berry, Buddy Logsdon and U. F. Coker, Jr. were present.
 The Commissioners passed an order authorizing the County Treasurer to change the pay periods to semi-monthly, on the 15th of each month and the last day of each month for all employees effective January 1, 1996.
 Steve Smith, Supervisor with the Texas Department of Transportation was present with a Hall County map describing the ditch cleaning the department was doing. He stated there was plenty of dirt that they will haul to various places where needed in the county.

He presented a temporary agreement for each commissioner to sign allowing the state to work on county and private property.
 After canvassing the November 7, 1996 Constitutional Amendment Election, the commissioners ordered the County Clerk to certify to the Election returns and mail the tabulations to the Secretary of State.
 Hall county votes on the Appraisal District board were case in the following order: U. F. Coker, Jr., 736 and Tom Cope 736 votes.
 The 911 map was distributed to each Commissioner along with the forms to be filled out. Commissioner Larry D. Maddox was appointed to go with the PRPC map representative over the county roads in Precinct No. 1 starting Monday, November 20, 1995. The county roads will be designated by numbers, according to the law.

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Allen Honored for TXMHMR Volunteer

Woodrow W. (Woody) Allen of Kerrville has been named the 1995 Mary Holdsworth Butt Award recipient by the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation (TXMHMR). The award is given annually to an individual who serves in a voluntary leadership capacity either at the community or statewide level.

Allen has worked on behalf of Texans with mental disabilities since 1967 when he was appointed one of the trustees of the board to form Central Plains Center for Mental Health, Mental Retardation and Substance Abuse in Plainview. The center opened in 1969. He was elected board chairman in 1967 and served on the board until 1992.

Allen helped guide the Central Plains center through a period of tremendous growth. By the time he retired from the board in 1992, the center offered a complete range of inpatient and outpatient services for persons with mental illnesses, mental retardation or drug addiction. That year, the center honored Allen by renaming a substance abuse treatment facility the W.W. Allen Center for Treatment of Alcohol and Drug Abuse.

In 1976, Allen was instrumental in founding the Texas Council of Community MHMR Centers, which has worked to improve services offered by the centers.

Ann K. Utley, TXMHMR board chair, said, "Woody Allen exemplifies the spirit of volunteerism. His tireless dedication to community mental health, mental retardation and substance abuse services has made a difference for Texans."

Mr. Allen is a former Quitaque resident.

Paying for College includes a step-by-step guide on applying for financial aid, charts for estimating future college costs and monthly payments, and information comparing different lenders participating

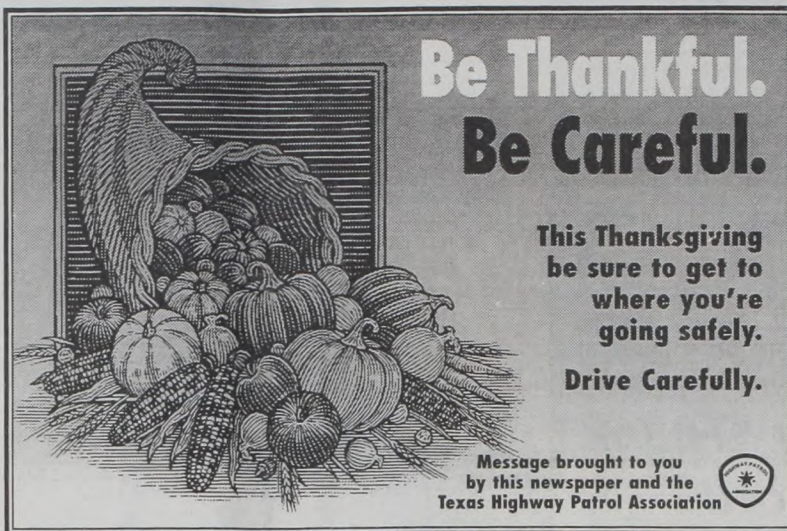
in federal student loan programs. Some lenders, for example, offer flexible repayment plans and interest rate reductions for borrowers who develop regular on-time repayment habits. (Banks that sell their loans to Sallie Mae, for instance, reduce interest rates by two percentage points to Stafford loan borrowers who make their first scheduled 48 payments on time. For borrowers who pay electronically -- through automatic deductions from their savings or checking accounts -- the rate is discounted another quarter percentage point.) Such benefits mean cheaper student loans, reducing overall borrowing costs by hundreds, even thousands of dollars.

Thanksgiving-1943-1789

A day of Public thanksgiving is of great antiquity. It probably had its origin in the sentiment expressed by the adage "he is ungrateful who expresses his thanks when all witnesses have departed." Ingratitude is one of the worst vices, and fortunately for America there are few of its citizens whose hearts are ungrateful.

The devout Pilgrim fathers avoided the implication of the adage quoted by establishing a day of public Thanksgiving; a day when the autumnal season is at its height and the harvests of all of our people have been gathered; a day when we realize the fruits of honest toil, faithful endeavor, and sublime devotion to the task at hand.

Divine providence has looked with special favor on us during the past year, notwithstanding the sorrows caused by the scourge of war. There is none among us so rich but that he owes something to society. Let him be thankful that he has the opportunity to acknowledge the debt and pay a portion of it. There is none among us so poor but that he has something to be thankful for. This is a time when every citizen can give public expression of thanks to God for manifold privileges which we have enjoyed.

NOW THEREFORE, I Coke Stevenson, Governor of the State of Texas do hereby proclaim Thursday, November 25, 1943 as

Thanksgiving Day
 and a legal holiday in Texas, and I invite the citizens of Texas to observe this holiday in such manner as will show our appreciation for the bountiful blessings which are ours. I especially urge that the United States and Texas flags be displayed in public places and on public buildings to signify our gratefulness for the privilege of living in this land of freedom and opportunity.

FIRST THANKSGIVING PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, it is the duty of all nations to acknowledge the providence of the Almighty God, to obey His will, to be grateful for His benefits, and humbly to implore His protection, aid and favors...NOW THEREFORE, I do recommend and assign Thursday, the 26th day of November next, to be devoted by the people of these States to the service of that great and glorious Being, who is the Beneficent Author of all the good that was, that is, or that will be; that we may then all unite in rendering unto Him our sincere and humble thanks for His kind care and protection of the people of this country, and for all the great and various favors which He has been pleased to confer upon us.

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Turkey Trivia: How much Does Your Bird Weigh?

If the Pilgrims had gone hunting for a turkey as big as a large dog, turkey might not have become the meat of choice for traditional Thanksgiving meals today.

The world's heaviest turkey on record weighed 86 pounds--about the size of a large German Shepherd.

The turkey hens consumed now are traditionally raised to 14 to 16 weeks of age and a live weight of 14 to 18 pounds.

The toms are raised to 18 to 22 weeks of age, a live weight of 30 pounds and a dressed weight of 14 pounds and up.

The average American eats about 18.3 pounds of turkey each year. The sandwich is America's favorite way to eat turkey.

Turkey has one-third to one-half fewer calories and fat than other deli meat options and generally costs less. It is low in calories, cholesterol and saturated fats.

It is a high source of protein and polyunsaturated fats.

Domesticated turkeys don't fly, but wild turkeys do. The domesticated turkeys have larger breastbone and breast meat which defeats their attempt to become airborne.

Most of the turkeys are white broadbreasted turkeys, not the traditional brown or golden birds seen in many holiday decorations.
