Beginner Marketing Training Available

Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), with the Business Division of the Tulia Chamber of Commerce and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service is providing a Cotton and Grain Marketing technique training at the Swisher County Memorial Building, Thursday, April 7, 1994.

The course is to look at all the marketing options available on the market today. Dr. Jackie Smith with Dr. Carl Anderson of the Texas A&M University System will instruct the training. These men are some of the leading experts on marketing in the State of Texas.

"Due to agriculture becoming more and more capital intensive and with profit margin falling, a break even price must be budgeted and obtained. The days of selling as harvested is over. Plans on selling your crop in the fall starts in the spring. Marketing determines if there is a loss or a profit," says FmHA County Supervisor, Ross W. James.

The meeting is available for all farmers in Swisher and Briscoe County. There is a registration fee which will include the noon meal and materials. The deadline for registration is Tuesday, April 5, 1994. To register you can either contact the Swisher or Briscoe County Extension Agents or the FmHA office at 806/995-2318.

"The government payments are becoming less and less with the farmers only avenue for profit being the markets. Unless we understand how and what the market is, our profits will decline," said Ross W. James.

National Enduro Race Held In Turkey March 26

 Last week-end Turkey reassembled a mini Bob Wills Day. Two hundred motorcycle racers and their families arrived in town to participate in the National Enduro Race sponsored by The Past Enduro Association.

The majority of the riders reside in the Amarillo-Lubbock area, but participants from California and Massachusetts and other states were also present.

On Saturday, 55 riders entered the Turkey Gran Prix. In this event the riders raced through the streets of Turkey. The winner was Michael Wilson of Amarillo.

While talking to George McMahan of Lubbock, who has held several offices in the association, including president, I learned that this was the second annual Enduro meeting in Turkey. They started meeting in Turkey when Cody Bell made his ranch available for part of the race course. The Compress yard was also part of the course.

Each participant, including children who raced on small motorcycles, paid a \$50 entry fee.

The cross country race was 105 miles long over much rough terrain and level ground. Speed and endurance are necessary for this race. Each racer is timed. Steve Hatch of Ithaca, New York won first overall at the Turkey National Enduro Race.

Chm Deeds of Amarillo is the Competition Chairman. He was in Turkey several times prior to the race to set up the track and getting everything organized.

All the visitors I talked to said it was a very organized and well-run contest. They were especially appreciative of the hospitality that was shown them. They asked that I express their appreciation to the Turkey Fire Department, Cody Bell, the people at the hotel, Hubert Price for furnishing the hay to use on their track and the friendly people of Turkey. They are looking forward to their third Turkey Enduro Race next year.

By late Sunday afternoon all the fancy mobile homes, expensive pick-ups and the many costly motorcycles had departed for their own homes. The Enduro Association was only here a few days but they definitely contributed to the economy of our community.

Under the new program, FmHA will try to find persons in those categories who are interested in farming and can qualify for FmHA farm ownership loans. The agency is prepared to sell or lease to them a farm held in its inventory or make a loan for purchase of land on the open market.

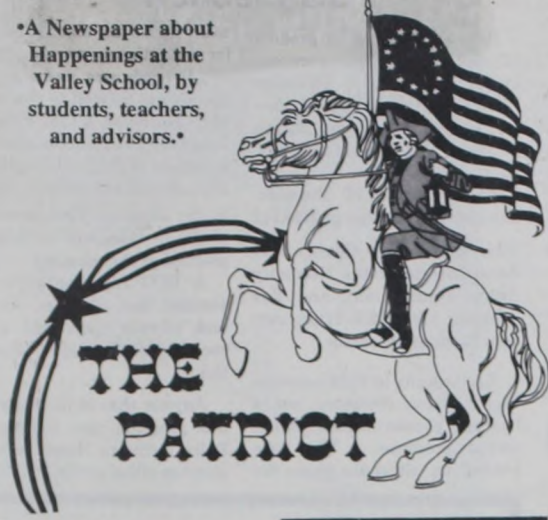

The cookbook emphasizes all the many different options for acting positively with regard to diet and cancer risk reduction. Each recipe lists gram of fat and calories per serving. Good sources of fiber and vitamins A and C are also noted.

COMPUTER NEWS & NOTES

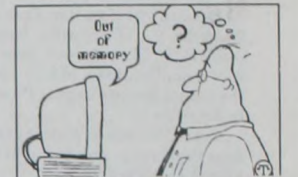

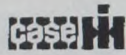

Lt. Dennis Coker Honored

Lt. Robert Dennis Coker of Turkey, listed as missing in action on the China Theatre of War, was honored at the Childress Army Air Field last Saturday, December 4, when Colonel John W. White, commanding officer, awarded to Mrs. U. F. Coker, mother of the missing officer, the Air Medal of the Army Air Forces.

The presentation was made at impressive ceremonies outside the headquarters building of the big Childress bombardier-navigation school. Three flights of cadets were standing the formal retreat as the CAAF commanding officer presented the Air Medal to Mrs. Coker.

U. F. Coker, father of the flier, stood by his wife as Col. White presented the Air Medal.

Prior to the actual presentation of the medal, the citation for Lt. Coker was read by Lt. L. B. Messersmith, assistant adjutant at CAAF. It was as follows:

"The Air Medal is hereby awarded to the following named officer for meritorious achievement by participating in more than twenty-five operational flights in unarmed, heavily overloaded transport airplanes through the combat zones of Upper Assam, Burma, and Southwest China where enemy attack was probable and expected.

Lt. Coker was a former football and basketball star at Turkey high school and was also prominently identified with the activities of the Epworth League. He was a member of the Methodist Church.

He enlisted in the Army Air Forces as an aviation cadet on January 5, 1942. Following primary training at Randolph Field, Lt. Coker completed his pilot's training at Kelly Field.

Undaunted by the hazards faced regularly and continuously, he performed his duties in such a manner that the highest credit is reflected upon himself and the military forces of the United States.

Early in the summer of this year his transport plane, enroute to China, failed to show up, and he and his crew have since been reported missing in action. At 26 he is the older of the two boys of Mr. and Mrs. Coker in military service. Pfc. U. F. Coker, Jr., is in the infantry branch and is stationed in Alaska at present.

The missing lieutenant also has three sisters, Mrs. Estelle Lane of Turkey, Mrs. Maurine Stevens, living in Seattle, Washington with her husband T-Sgt. Stevens, and Army Air Forces technician Boeing Aircraft plant, and Miss Evelyn Coker, a student at West Texas State College, Canyon.
