BAIRD — The weather conditions here for the past week have been cold and below freezing, with an ice covering, making driving extremely dangerous. People have been reminded to stay at home unless trips are very necessary.

Ice has stayed put for the past two days, Saturday night and Sunday, and Monday morning greeted us with the same conditions. Reports are that it will be here to stay, at least until late Tuesday. The temperature was expected to hold at 25 degrees through Tuesday, and more bad weather is forecast for our area.

Some stores in Baird remained closed Monday morning due to the weather, while others operated as close to normal as possible. The slick ice covering on the streets would melt to some degree on the surface, due to the heat from tires, however

they would be glazed over again before other tracks could be made, causing extreme danger in walking or driving.

Numerous accidents were reported on busy I-20 and conditions were worse further West. Overnight lodging was a must for people who chose not to drive under these conditions.

It is a serious thing to the older set, but to the young folks it's a lot of fun, being out of school and sliding down hills on the ice. This sport they seldom get to do here, maybe twice a year for the most part. The kids make good use of the weather and can't understand why the older folks think it is so bad.

The school students here had a holiday Monday for the teachers to be engaged in a workshop, and school was dismissed for Tuesday - which will make the kids real happy.

Callahan County Junior Livestock Show Opens Friday in Cross Plains

The annual Callahan County Junior Livestock Show will open Friday, Jan. 12, at 8:30 a. m. in the Callahan County Livestock Show Barn, north of Cross Plains. The two-day event will include the judging of approximately 250 entries from the County 4-H Clubs and the four FFA Chapters.

There are 60 steers, 15 beef heifers, 10 dairy cattle, 30 swine, 35 breeding sheep and fat lambs, 15 goat, 30 rabbit and 40 poultry entries.

The judging of goats, rabbits and poultry will begin at 9:30 a. m. Friday. Byron Wilson of Abilene will judge the rabbit division. J. I. Moore, retired Vo-AG teach of Abilene, will judge the poultry. Chuck Threet, Brown County Extension Agent, will judge the goats. Threet will also judge breeding sheep at 10:30 a. m. and fat lambs at 11 a. m. Swine judging will begin at 1 p. m. with the Brown County Agent doing the placing.

Bobby Lemons, Mitchell Co. Extension Agent, will judge all the cattle on Saturday. Dairy judging will kick off the day's

events at 10 a. m., following by beef heifers at 11 a. m. The steer show will begin at 1:30 p. m. with Lemons doing the judging.

C. Lee Smith, Clyde area rancher and farmer, is general superintendent and chairman of the Callahan County Junior Livestock Show Assn., which is sponsoring this event. 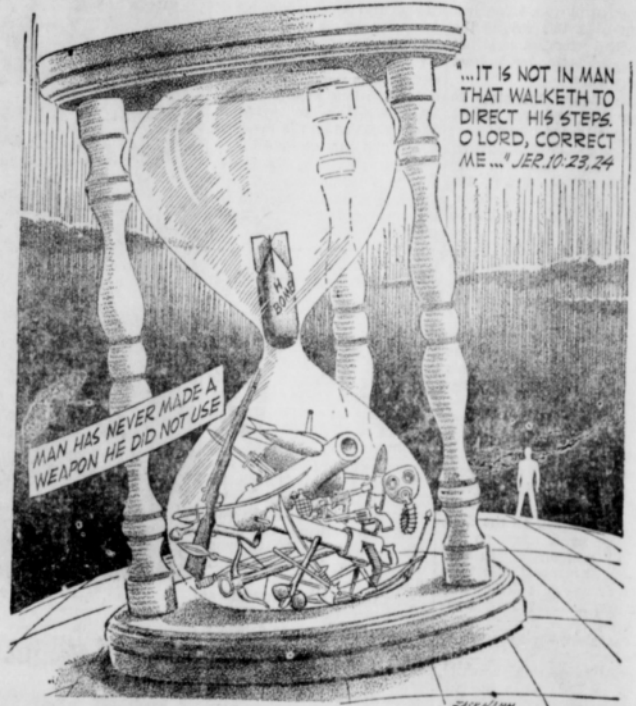

Manager Claud Holley Reports On CofC Activities for 1972

We bring you a brief report on activities and work of your Chamber of Commerce for 1972 and along with it opinion, continuing problems of importance and new projects that demand the attention of everyone if we wish to move forward and remain an active and vigorous organization.

Among other activities we will see the completion of our Community Building at 415 Chestnut, Your Chamber of Commerce is sponsor of the beautiful Community Facility. The Baird Housing Authority being the builder. When completed the Chamber offices will be located there with the Housing Authority offices. The building has a meeting area that can be divided into two meeting rooms by folding partitions. There is a complete kitchen. The meeting area and offices are entered from the lobby. Your chamber of commerce will have responsibility, along with the housing authority, in management of the building, scheduling the use, etc.

The building now used by the Chamber has been sold and we will vacate when the community building is ready for occupancy.

Your manager also serves as Executive Director of the Housing Authority and with the community building, along with 22 dwelling units nearing completion, this has taken full time planning and construction during a great part of the year. Your Directors recognize this and have been most helpful. We have worked very hard to avoid neglect of any part of the chamber of commerce work.

We do believe the completion of the dwelling units and especially the Community building is an asset to our total community and we anticipate wide usage and demand for the services offered.

We have worked most diligently to devise some way to solve our housing and apartment problem. Contacts have been made with both developers and builders, with follow up out of town visits. To date we have not been successful but do have excellent prospects to see some building starts, and we will continue work on this as it is most important. It is quite possible other matters under serious consideration may directly depend upon family housing in our community.

We have under consideration a Brochure for Baird and this should be completed early in 1973. The Committee on this work has secured cost estimates, copies used by others and will decide on scenes and material to be used in a proposed 6-page layout. We think this is most important in the area of information on Baird and will answer inquiries on our City to those seeking new locations.

We have continued to work with the owners of North Village Addition and our City to start development of this area for business and residential sites. The City has water into the area and presently the owners and City officials are attempting to find a way to extend sewer service to the addition.

Requests continue for houses and apartments by mail, telephone and office calls. Some calls come to the office seeking homes and small acreage to purchase. These are passed on to Real Estate of someone wishing to sell that may have advertised, and in this instance we get the two together as we are not in this business and take no listings. This is a continuing service to the City and a day to day function of your chamber of commerce.

We continue to receive requests on varied matters regarding our City and County. It is our policy to answer all inquiries even though they may seem unimportant to us, they are important to someone and may be found beneficial to our community.

We continue to receive requests for information on hunting conditions and available leases. In December we received inquiries from several points in East Texas and several from Louisiana, Monroe, Rustin, etc. This has become an important factor in the economy of our County.

We have continued our support and cooperation with FFA and 4-H work, with both doing a great job with our fine young people.

We will continue to work with our RCA and Junior Rodeos, both having successful shows in 1972.

We have worked with our business and professional concerns in every way possible to maintain good services to the people in the Baird shopping area.

Your chamber of commerce has been given support and cooperation by our schools, City and County. We are grateful for this assistance and cooperation.

Recognition is past due for the valuable consideration to our civic well-being by so many women's clubs and organizations. The total community is indebted to them and we say Thanks for your civic activities.

Our Annual Dinner meeting March 31, 1972 was an outstanding event, with Mr. Reagan Brown as guest speaker, doing an excellent job and catering by the Baird Parents was superb. This was an outstanding event.

We strongly urge your consideration and suggestions for work in 1973, some we suggest below.

Housing is a must for our community and we urge each of you to give thought and suggestions in solving this need.

We badly need a strong street improvement program, new paving, repair and rehabilitation on existing paving. We will work with our City and property owners on this important project.

Further work is needed in the clearing and clean up of vacant lots and dilapidated buildings to make our City more attractive.

There is much to be done, and every citizen should become involved in community activity to assure some measure of getting the job done.

We offer sincere appreciation for your cooperation and support, let us believe in ourselves and our community.

Federal Land Bank Announces Record Year for New Loans

BAIRD — Leslie Bryant, Manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Coleman, announced today that The Federal Land Bank of Houston closed 3-701 loans for more than 164 million dollars during 1972. "This has been a record year for new loan business and represents an increase of more than 60% over 1971 which was the largest year in the bank's 54-year history," Bryant stated. "A number of factors account for this substantial increase in volume of new loans," said Bryant. "Probably the greatest factor was the new lending authorities made possible by the Farm Credit Act of 1971, which was implemented this year," he said. He also reported that the interest in buying farms and

ranch land sharply increased during the year. "This interest covered all facets of Texas agriculture, the part-time farm and the farm and ranch units, both large and small," he stated. The Federal Land Bank of Coleman, which serves Coleman and Callahan counties, closed 89 loans for \$2,306,600.00 during 1972. The Federal Land Bank of Houston makes farm and ranch real estate loans throughout Texas and on December 31 had more than 675 million dollars in loans outstanding to over 35,000 farmers and ranchers. Officers and directors of the local association are Johnnie I. Henderson, R. O. Nichols, Ralph M. Edens, W. R. Hickman Jr., and Hadden Payne.
