Clara White Takes Over City Secretary's Job

BAIRD—In a recent City Council meeting, the city secretary's job was offered to Clara White. Mrs. White, who presently works in City Hall, has accepted the job and will officially become City Secretary July 1, according to Mayor Charles Walker.

J.G. (Bromo) Bennett, who has previously been both plant superintendent and city secretary, will now be plant superintendent. The action was done because the council thought it was too much for one person to handle both duties.

The only other personnel change was the termination of the city-paid fireman, Larry Newton.

Contrary to rumors, the night watchman's job has not changed.

In other action, the council voted to raise the water, sewer and sanitation

Citizen's Spirits Not Dampened By Rains

BAIRD—Heavy rainfall dotted the Baird area late last week, but the cloudbursts didn't dampen the Baird residents' spirits.

Everyone was quite happy with the much-needed 6.45 inch rain recorded during a four-day period in Baird. The city of Baird was surprised with a 4 inch rain early Friday morning. A smaller

amount of rain totaling ½ of an inch was dumped on Baird Saturday night.

East of Baird near Admiral recorded approximately 1.10 last week. 5.6 inches of rain fell to the north of Baird last week and only a meager .70 fell to the south of Baird Friday.

The Baird Lake rose a foot from the rainfall and the old T & P Lake ran over the spillway after the heavy rains.

COUNTY—The fate of the Callahan County Jail is still unknown, due to the postponed state inspection of the jail.

Originally the jail was to be visited by state inspectors Tuesday, June 21. However, one of the inspectors from Palo Pinto submitted his resignation. So, the county will be re-notified when a new inspection date has been selected.

The topic of ambulance service is also at a standstill right now. County Judge A.E. Dyer, Jr. said he had tried to contact the mayor of Clyde and the mayor of Cross Plains to see if these cities would subsidize an ambulance service. However, he has been unable to contact either mayor.

Therefore, no action will be taken until the commissioners assemble in their monthly meeting on the second Tuesday in July.

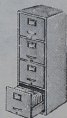

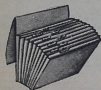

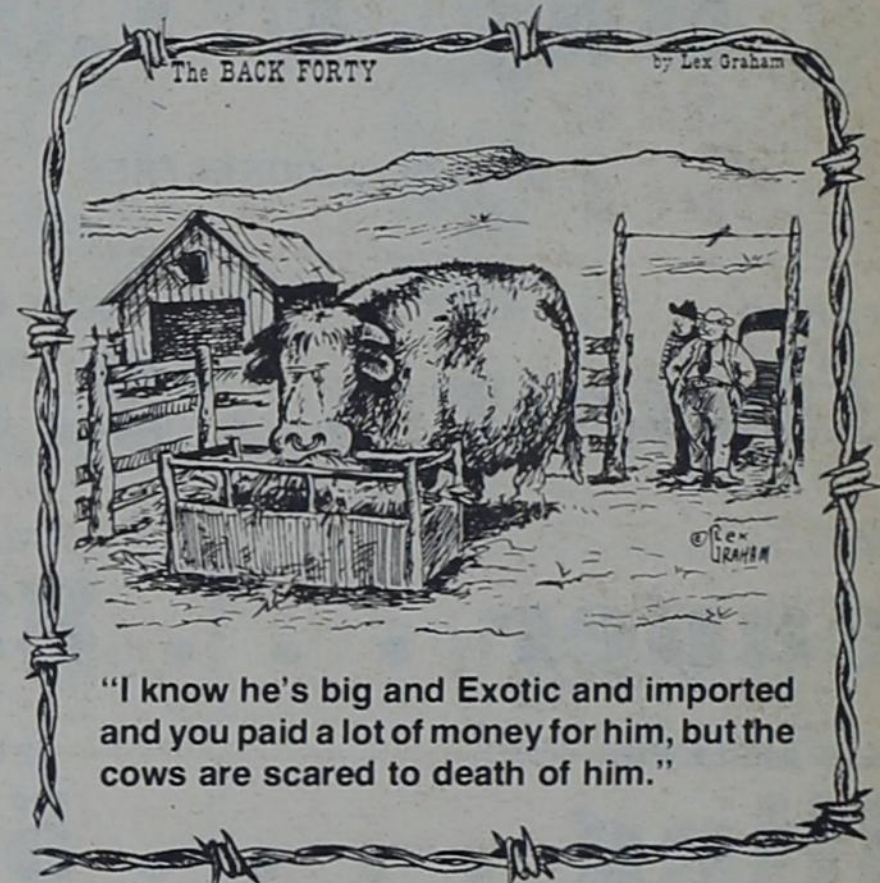
He was preceded in death by his parents, three brothers and four sisters.

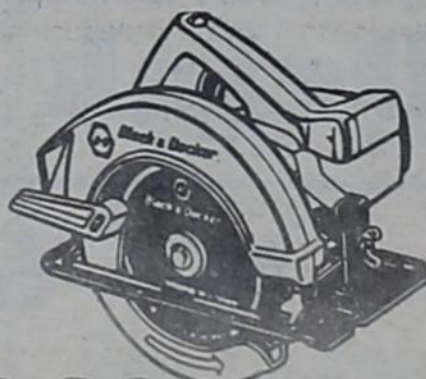

But as of July 1st this program will be discontinued and once again the fire department will be 100% volunteer. So we want to thank all those who have read our article and supported us through the past year.

We ask at this time to help support our volunteer fire department, a 100% volunteer and non-profit organization. It is a service that is essential to our community. Please lend your support to the individuals who dedicate themselves and volunteer their

time in serving and in endangering their life to protect you and your property against fire. It is a dangerous and dirty business and these volunteers get little restitution; thus a thank you and a hand shake mean alot.

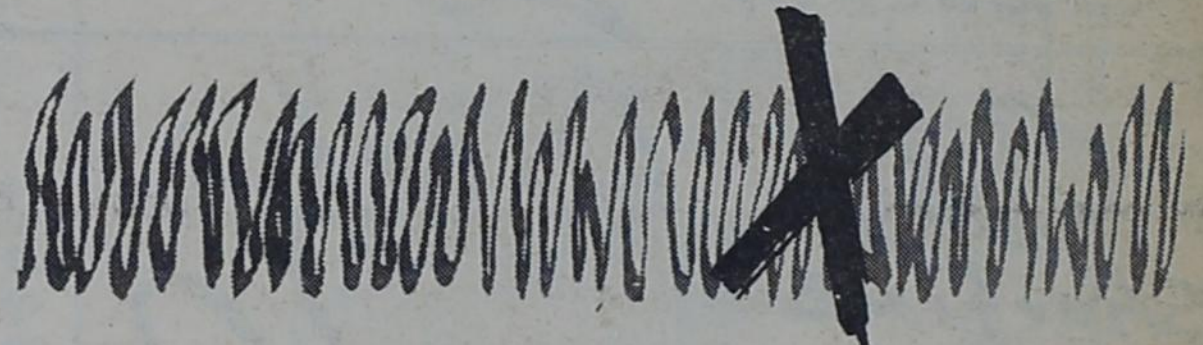

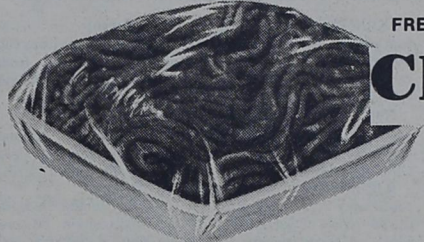

CJC Pre-Registering For 2nd Summer Term

COUNTY — Cisco Junior College is now registering students for the second summer term, which will begin holding classes on July 11.

registration during those hours. They may go to the CCCA offices at 1600 Sherman in Abilene between 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m., and the Clyde Educational Center offices in downtown Clyde are open for pre-registration between 8:00 a.m. and 12:00 noon.

In addition to the continuous pre-registration, regular registration dates will be held June 30 at Dyess Air Force Base, Merkel, and Coleman, at Abilene on July 5, at Clyde on July 6, and at the main campus in Cisco on July 7.
