Emergency Loans Available to Farmers In Disaster-Designated Area Counties

Low interest emergency loans are available to eligible farmers and ranchers in 18 Texas counties that were declared federal disaster areas due to freeze or excessive rain between September 1 and December 31, 1991 according to Texas Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry.

In making the declaration, U. S. Secretary of Agriculture Edward Madigan named Briscoe, Clay, Collingsworth, Floyd, Motley and Young counties as primary disaster areas.

In addition, Armstrong, Baylor, Gray, Hall, Jack, Montague, Palo Pinto, Stephens, Swisher, Throckmorton, Wheeler and Wichita counties were declared contiguous disaster areas.

Cottle, Crosby, Dickens, Donley, Hale, King and Lubbock counties were included under the same disaster under a previous disaster designation.

Primary disaster areas due to drought, freeze, flood and hail

between Jan. 1 and December 31, 1991 were declared as Cochran, Lamb and King counties. Baylor, Hall, Parmer and Wichita counties were named for freeze damage between October 1-Nov. 30, 1991.

Archer, Briscoe, Childress, Clay, Collingsworth, Deaf Smith, Donley, Wilbarger and Young counties were named contiguous disaster areas for freeze between Oct. 1 and Nov. 30, 1991.

These declarations allow family-size farm operators in both the primary and contiguous areas to apply for emergency assistance from the Farmers Home Administration.

Each loan application will be considered on its own merits, taking into account the extent of losses, security available, repayment ability and other requirements.

Applications for emergency farm loans for these losses are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Floydada, Texas FmHA County Supervisor Becky V. Rainer said today.

Mrs. Rainer said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000,

whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," Mrs. Rainer said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until February 22, 1993 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Mrs. Rainer said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U. S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U. S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FmHA office in Floydada is open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Visitors from all over the world come to Briscoe County to see the scenic beauty, have fun with our outdoor recreation, relax, and to listen to the Indian stories which took place in Briscoe.

The plains of Briscoe are partly grassland, some of which is natural range just as Coronado found it exploring the panhandle. Another reason grassland is widespread is the Conservation Reserve Program or CRP which helps to keep the grasslands the way they are. With irrigated agriculture on the plains, there can be more crops grown and make the plains bloom in a new and

special way. The mystique of limitless horizons lets the visitor see for as long as he can. The wide open space gives room to dream. In a moment, the terrain of the tableland may be washed away in the hues of a regal sunset or wrapped in the awesome power of a summer thunderstorm.

The caprock escarpment divides the tablelands of the high plains from the rolling plains and with an abrupt contrast causes the beautiful panoramic views. With Tule Canyon in our county there is geological treasure with a wall that reveals what happened here millions of years ago.

The physical features bring many outdoor recreation activities. The terrain lends itself to a good habitat for game, which means it is excellent for hunting. With Lake Mackenzie and Lake Theo in our county, there is an opportunity for fishing and water sports. With canyons in the

county many people like to hike and ride bikes through the undisturbed natural surroundings.

With the natural terrain in Briscoe County, we try to keep our heritage alive and fresh. It was home to the Comanche and other Indian tribes who found shelter in the caprock and water from the creeks. Briscoe County had been a trading area for centuries and was a major route for the Comancheros during a long journey. Ranching in Briscoe County brought people together to live in harmony with the land.

With all of this beauty in Briscoe County with the plains and canyonlands I am surprised this county is not as big as New York City, but I am glad it is not; all of this beauty would be gone.
