The Turkey—Quitauque CISD Board of Trustees met in regular session, Monday, May 8, 1995 at 8 p.m. in the Valley School Cafeteria.

After minutes of past meeting were corrected and approved the Board canvassed the school board election results and accepted the total of votes counted.

An interview with Coach Chris Burtch was held for the position of teacher/coach for the coming year. Coach Burtch, also, discussed responsibilities which were outside his coaching responsibilities, such as community involvement, student relationships and teacher relationships.

The board voted 6-0 to hire Coach Chris Burtch. Coach Burtch has been at Menard for five years.

Summer School was voted on and accepted for 20 school days this summer.

Quitauque Prepares For Trails Day Celebration

Quitauque residents and merchants have begun preparing in earnest for the National Trails Day celebration on June 3.

The Chamber of Commerce is meeting weekly to update plans and activities, and along Main Street throughout the community there is a beehive of cleanup work taking place.

Later this week a work force comprised of several Trustees from the prison at Tulia will arrive in Quitauque to assist with cleanup and modernization plans. They will work here about two weeks under the supervision of prison officials and City Administrator Robert Patrick.

Things are falling in place for the activities on June 3, and several new things have been added for this year's event.

The popular western shootout program, "Outlaws", along Main Street will be back, and it looks like the Kwahadi Indian Dancers may make their appearance here for the first time.

As an added attraction, there will be three guinea drops during the day, and each guinea will have a \$100.00 bill attached to its leg when it soars from the airplane. Demonstrations have proved that the bird will not be harmed, for it is graceful in flight.

Some of the events during the day include a parade, an antique car display, arts and crafts, tours of the Trailway, noon barbecue, Lionel train display, chili cook-off, Grand Prix motorcycle race and music on the streets.

The festivities will begin with the launching of the hot air balloons at sunrise, followed by the Quitauque Lion's Club pancake breakfast at the Fire Hall.

USDA Announces CRP Signup For Early Release

Briscoe County CFSA will accept requests from CRP participants from May 15 through June 2, 1995 to modify eligible contracts to extend the expiration date. The signup period will run concurrently with a signup period for early release. The one-year modification to extend option is only available to participants on any acreage that expires from CRP on September 30, 1995. The early release option shall be available to CRP participants with acreage devoted to certain practices enrolled in signup periods 1 through 12. Participants may request to release all or any part of the eligible acreage under contract. Producers planning to convert released acreage to agricultural uses, including crop production, harvesting forage, grazing, or other similar agricultural activities, will be required to meet with NRCS to develop a basic conservation system or haying or grazing plan. Final payments on the released acres shall be prorated from October 1, 1994 through the later of the release date approved by the Hall County Committee or the participants's deferral date. Participants may defer early release anytime through September 30, 1995. Request will be taken by appointment May 15 through June 2, 1995. Please call the county office at 806/823-2431 and make your appointment as soon as possible.
