CRP Signup Doing Well At Half-Way **Point**

from USDA - Farm Servaice Agency

Landowners and producers re reminded that the 18th CRP signup period is being conducted now through December 11, 1998. Under this voluntary program, landowners enter into contracts with USDA to place erodible and other environmentally - sensitive cropland in conservation practices for 10 years. In exchange, landowners receive annual rental payments for the land and cost share assistance for establishing those practices

Landowners who are considering enrolling their eligible land into this program are couraged to notify the Hall County FSA Office immediately to set-up an appointment. Billy Wayne Denison, County execu tive Director for the Hall County FSA, stated, "This may be the last CRP signup for regular CRP practices in Hall County. We are rapidly approaching the maximum acreage limitation allowed to be enrolled in CRP in Hall County. Briscoe and Donley Counties have already reached their limitation, and are conducting a CRP Signup 18 only for land their office administers, but is physically located in a neighboring county that has not reached its limit."

Landowners are also reminded that there is an ongoing, continuous CRP signup program available at any time during the year that applies to small acreages requiring installation of specialized practices. Please call or come by if you have any questions regarding

Ophelia May Finney



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EXCESS NITRATE IN QUITAQUE WATER

The City of Quitaque has been notified by the Texas Department of Health that the water being supplied by our system exceeds the maximum constituent level of Ni-trate (as Nitrogen) specified by the "State Drinking Water Act" (public law 93--523 U. E.).

The limit for Nitrate (as nitro-gen) is set at 10 milligrams per liter of water. The amount of nitrate (as Nitrogen) in the water we supply was reported to be 13.10 milli-grams per liter of water.

Adults and children over the age of 6 months need not be concerned about drinking from the tap. An excess of nitrate intake by an infant under the age of 6 months may reduce its available oxygen supply and possibly produce "blue baby"

To obtain bottled water from the City of Quitaque, persons must come by the City Hall between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.

DO NOT BOIL YOUR WATER

Boiling water will increase trhe ncentration of Nitrates. The City of Quitaque will provide, at no charge to our customers, bottled water of acceptable quality to pregnant women and to infants under 6 months of age for cooking and drinking purposes.
