## Early Voting Now Available

Early voting for the November 8, 1994 election is now in effect. Those people wishing to be mailed a ballot should be 65 years or older or expected to be out of the county on November 8, 1994. To receive a ballot, voters should call the clerk's office at 806/259-2627 or write and request a ballot at Hall County Clerk, Hall County Courthouse, Memphis, Texas 79245.

Ballots mailed back must be received by the clerk's office before the close of business on November 1, 1994.

Early voting by personal appearance went into effect on October 19, 1994 at the Clerk's office in Hall County Courthouse, Memphis, Texas and will end on November 4, 1994.

Voters should bring their voter registration cards if possible as this will speed up their early voting.

On election day voting boxes will be open at 7 a.m. and will close at 7 p.m.

## Bike Club Plans Colorful Event

The Caprock Bike Club is sponsoring a bicycle ride called "Tour of Colors" along the Caprock Canyons Trailway on Saturday, October 22. This event will be held in cooperation with other activities on Fall Festival Day in Quitauque and will greatly add to the opportunity to see the fall colors while coming down the trail on a bicycle.

The cycling event registration will be held at the First National Bank beginning at 8:00 am and end at 9:00 am. Following registration, riders and their bikes will be transported to the trailhead at Woods Crossing near South Plains. The bike club has provisions to transport 36 bikes each trip and may find it necessary to make more than one trip to get all bikers positioned for the trail descent. Early registrants will be the first to get started.

Beginning at Woods Crossing, the riders will begin the ride down the trail. Riders wishing to ride the complete trail will travel 22 miles while others may elect to ride 15 miles to Monk Crossing. A sag wagon or support vehicle will follow the riders and Coca Cola supplied Power Aid will be made available along the trail. Participants may expect to view magnificent country, including deep canyons, Clarity Tunnel, cross 22 bridges, and see the changing of fall colors. This ride is not difficult as can be attested by those on previous trips. The trail is mostly down hill and riders will rest a number of times. **It Is Not A Race.** It is a Treat.

## Are You Protecting Your Animals?

The City of Quitauque is faced with a growing number of persons not restraining animals within the city limits. We would like to remind our residents that there is a city ordinance requiring dogs to be restrained while in the city limits.

Due to the large number of unvaccinated, unrestrained animals in the city limits, we are forced to pick up any animal not restrained by the owner. The impounded animals will be held for up to seventy-two hours during which time the owner of an impounded dog may redeem such dog by paying fifteen (15) dollars impounding fee provided the dog is wearing a tag showing that the dog has been vaccinated against rabies within the current calendar year.

If such dog does not have a vaccination tag the owner may redeem the animal by paying a twenty-five (25) dollar impounding fee.

If you really care about your pets, please have your animals vaccinated yearly.

## Quitauque Fire Department Controls Blaze

The Quitauque Fire Department was called out on Monday evening, October 17 to a fire on Main Street. The fire was located at the corner of Main and First Street.

Decorative hay bales and other fall decorations for the Fall Foliage Tour were blazing at this corner.

**L. T. STARKEY ENDS LAWMAN CAREER**  
L. T. Starkey of Ralls, son of Mrs. C. W. Starkey of Flomot, will retire Oct. 31, after almost 31 years in law enforcement, 19 of those as Ralls police chief.

The 61-year old Starkey said before he graduated from high school in Flomot, he knew he wanted to become a police officer. The Ralls sheriff caught wind of his career goal and called him in for an interview. Starkey worked 12 years as sheriff's deputy.

He then worked five years for Energas and spent two years working for a church retreat camp in Floydada. "Once you hang a gun and badge on, it gets in your blood," he said. When the Ralls council offered him the chief's job, he took it.

Law enforcement has changed a lot during the past three decades, Starkey said. The bootlegger problem all but dried up, but incidents of family violence have skyrocketed. The legal system, which seems to favor criminals, represents another

unwelcomed change. If only lawman Starkey had kept a diary!

Dewain Collins, supervisor with the Texas Dept. of Public Safety and James Hale, Floydada's police chief, agree that Starkey's word is his bond, and he treats everyone fairly. He makes the law enforcement profession look good. He has done so much in the area, people will never forget him.

Mr. Starkey plans to work part time as a carpenter. During his free time, he and wife Roddie will travel.

- #### CHUNKY GARDEN GAZPACHO
- 2 pounds fresh tomatoes, seeded and diced
  - 3 tablespoons Kikkoman Lite Soy Sauce, divided
  - 2 tablespoons dry sherry

The Company proposes to increase its customer charge by 89 cents per month with no other changes to its gas rate schedules. The change would apply to General Service (residential and commercial) and Small Industrial Service. The Company also proposes the following increased service charges:
