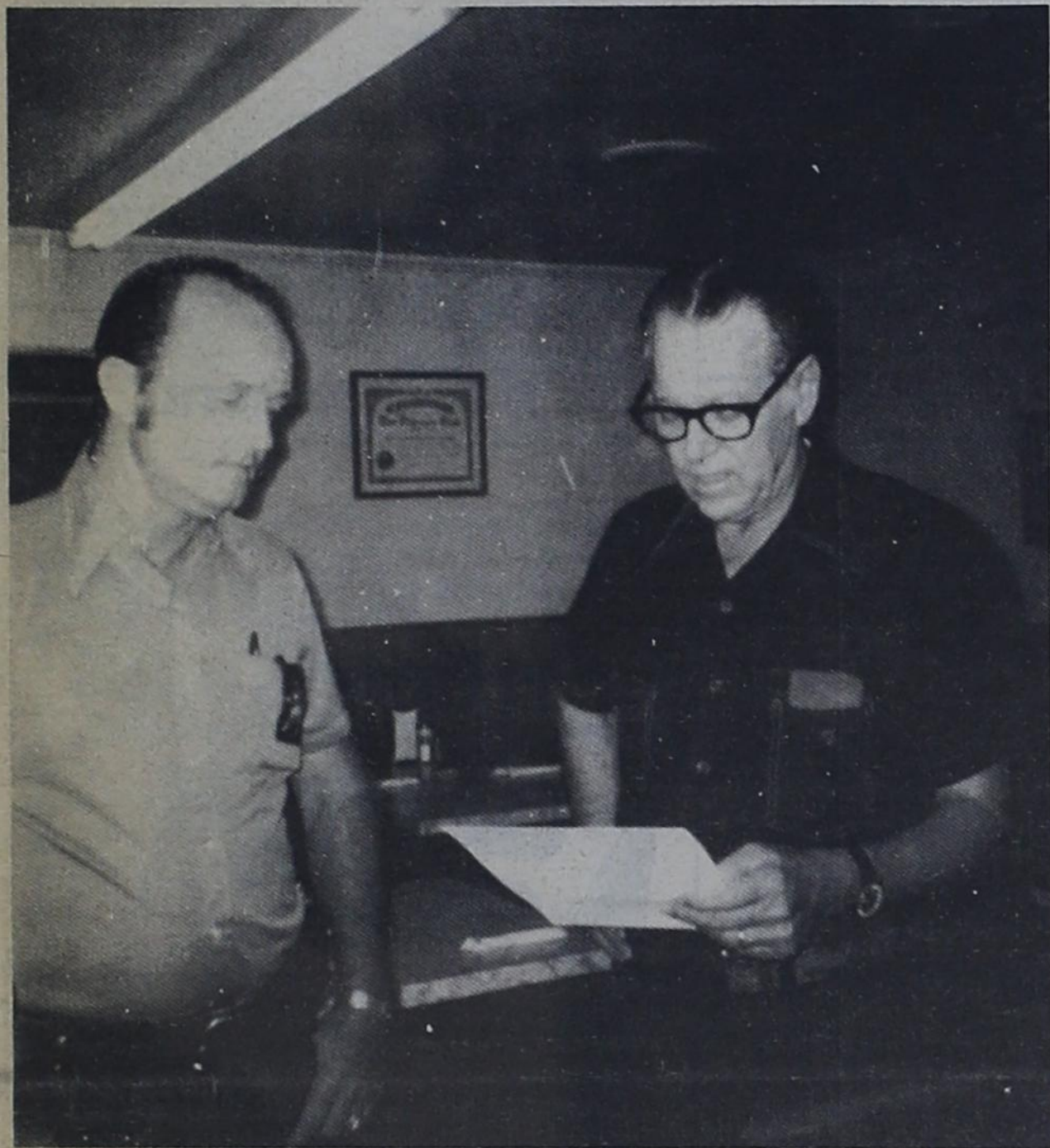

Baird Overtakes Rotan In Scrimmage Game August 19

The Baird High School Football Team traveled to Rotan last Friday for their first scrimmage game of the season.

A total of 49 players from the Varsity, Junior Varsity and Freshmen team's took part in the scrimmage.

"I was very pleased with the offensive effort" quoted Coach Williams, "with it being so early in the year."

The returning offensive line of Frankie Rodriguez, Larron Walker, Kerry Skinner, Steve Defosses and first year starter Zane Wright, did a fantastic job of making openings.

The offensive backs for the Bears this year are Chris Vestal, Donny Stovall, Dennis Baxter and Terry Hunter. This is the first year for these young men to start in the Baird Bear's Backfield.

The Varsity scored two touchdowns against Rotan's 0 score. The two touchdowns came on drives of 70 yards. This is a fine example of the consistency and good execution of the team for the first time playing this year.

Chris Vestal threw one touchdown pass to tight-end, Jim Sadler. Other passes completed were flanker, Gary Smith and split-end, Mo Gonzales. Five of the seven passes were completed for a total of 85 yards.

The Baird defense held the Rotan of-

fense scoreless. Good hustle and effort made this possible. Defensive stand outs were defensive-ends, Jim Sadler and Dennis Baxter.

The Baird Football Team will scrimmage Cisco, Friday, August 26, at 6:30. The Junior Varsity teams will scrimmage first with the Varsity following at 7:45.

The two pools will close for the summer when school opens.

Mark Lucas, manager of the City Pool, will close the pool and prepare for a continuance of his college courses.

The Shady Oaks activities will resume as usual without the swimming pool entertainment until next summer.

New Class Room Added To Baird Elementary

Construction began last week on a new portable classroom building on the Baird Elementary School campus. The structure is located just north of the primary wing and south of the fourth, fifth and sixth grade wing of the school.

The new facility, which is being constructed by Noble W. Walker Company of Austin, has two permanent classrooms with sliding panels to make four smaller rooms. Restroom facilities have been included in the 24x72 structure.

The building has been designed to

be used by the special education, remedial reading and Title I programs of the school. Those teachers who will hold classes in the new building will be Peggy Edmiston, Barbara Corn, Nancy Young, Judy Dudley and Betty Jennings, aide.

The new classrooms will be utilized by approximately 110 students each day with no more than 40 in the room at one time.

Plans now are for the classes to be held in the new building, Tuesday, September 6, for the first time.

Verdict Expected on Jail Inspection Soon

The Texas State Jailing Commission from Austin, Texas, were scheduled to inspect

inspect the Callahan County Jailing Facility on June 21, 1977. But, due to the resignation of one of the inspectors, no one else was available for the scheduled inspection date. Inner Department difficulties, unforeseen by officials, caused a postponement of the date until August 8, 1977.

Judge Dyer informed the Callahan County Star that the inspection of the jail had taken place on August 8, 1977, as rescheduled. The officials have returned to Austin and are expected to mail a re-

port with the verdict.

There has been no verdict returned, but the Judge feels certain the building did not pass inspection under the new rules and regulations.

These new rules and regulations have not been used in previous inspections of the jail.

If the jail is condemned, which is a strong possibility, the county will have to construct a new facility.

There has been no estimating on the cost or expenses of building a new jailing facility. There is a possibility of securing a grant, but taxes will have to be increased, regardless, to build a new county jail.

Burglars Hit Radio Shack In Clyde Sat.

The Radio Shack in South Park Office Center in Clyde, Texas, was burglarized last Saturday morning at 3:00 a.m.

Officer Jess Henley stated that himself and the owner of the store, Adrian Huddleston, apprehended one seventeen year old hiding in the store. The individual was arrested inside the store.

Henley also stated that an abandoned car and other clues led to the arrest of a second seventeen year old. This individual was taken into custody at his father's home in Clyde, later the same morning.

"The two were not handled as minors," stated Jess Henley, "for at seventeen

years of age you are considered an adult by the law."

The boys were caught on Henley's patrol. Officer J.D. Fry assisted in the second arrest.

Henley also stated that there was an estimated \$1600.00 in merchandise outside the store upon arrest of the first subject.

Charges allege burglary of a building to commit theft and were filed for investigation by the 42nd District Court Grand Jury.

The two teen-age boys, both of Clyde, were released on \$2,000.00 bond Monday morning after charges in Justice of the Peace Lee Savell's Court.

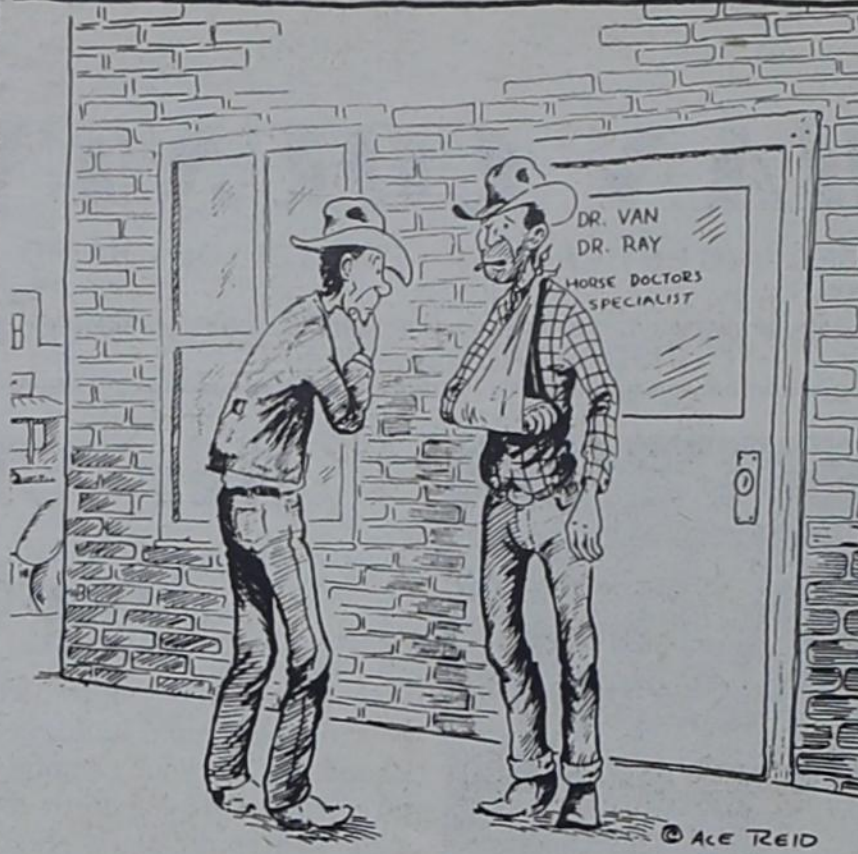

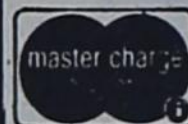

Veterans Bill Provides Pay

Joe Coker, Director of the VA Regional Office in Waco, cautions GI Bill students that advance payment of educational allowances, which can amount to as much as two month's benefits at the start of a school term, are just that—an advance on future allowances.

If a student requests advance payment, and the school agrees to process it, the normal interval until the first recurring monthly VA check is received will be 80-85 days.

For example, if a veteran accepts advance payment upon registering September 12, it will represent allowances for classroom attendance during September and October. No additional benefits will be paid until December 1, covering class attendance for November. Subsequent checks will follow each additional month of enrollment.

Anticipated financial requirements during the first

three months of the new school term should be considered now.

Additional VA money help is available to eligible GI Bill students. Education loans, which provide up to \$1,500 per academic year, may be granted to the students needing assistance beyond regular VA allowances. In some cases, applications may be filed for a VA loan before classes begin.

School financial aid officers can provide complete information.

Participation in VA work study program is another source of financial assistance. Eligible students can be advanced \$250 toward the maximum \$625 that can be earned in the work study projects during a school semester.

Complete information on all educational assistance programs can be obtained from the Veterans Representative on Campus or the nearest VA office.

At first she worked three days a week, but last summer she spent five days a week at the hospital. She has had a summer job this year but still managed one day a week at the hospital.

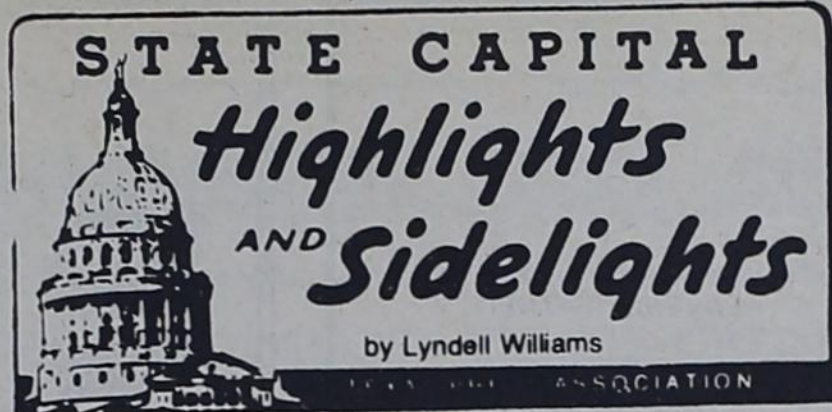
Doris Tollett Graduates

AUSTIN—Three major Texas water agencies are moving toward consolidation September 1 into a massive Texas Department of Water Resources.

Acting heads of the new super-agency were named last week to begin supervising the reorganization. The two men considered most-likely contenders for the water "czar" position were passed over.

Charles E. Nemir, 45, who had served as assistant executive director of the Texas Water Quality Board, will be acting executive director of TDWR. Acting deputy director will be Dick Whittington, 49, who has been deputy director of the Texas Water Quality Board.

The 65th legislature ordered combining of the Water Quality Board, Water Development Board and Water Rights Commission.

James M. Rose, TWDB executive director, and Hugh Yantis, executive director of TWQB, were seen as top contenders to head the consolidated department.

Rose announced that he will pass up an offer to remain on the new governing board's staff and launch a planning, consulting and developing firm, offering to assist small towns and other units with governmental assistance programs.

The six-member Water Development Board will be the operating board for the new department.

The Water Quality Board will become a division of water quality and the Water Rights Commission will continue to handle water permit matters under the new department's board umbrella.

Appointments Galore

Dolph Briscoe made a flood of new judicial appointments during the last two weeks.

Resignation of Justice Tom Reavley from the State Supreme Court effective in October led to appointment of Chief Justice T. C. Chadick of Texarkana, Sixth Court of Civil Appeals, to succeed to the top bench.

Briscoe then appointed Sixth Court Justice William J. Cornelius of Jefferson to replace Chadick on the Texarkana intermediate court bench, and he named Stephen Oden of Texarkana to the Sixth Court associate justiceship which had been held by Cornelius since 1973.

The governor moved Beaumont District Judge Harold R. Clayton to the Ninth Court of Civil Appeals to fill a vacancy.

He also appointed Carlton B. Dodson of Lubbock to an associate justice's place on the Seventh Court of Civil Appeals, succeeding Judge Mary Lou Robinson of Amarillo who was named chief justice of the intermediate court.

In the flurry, Briscoe appointed judges to 25 new district courts created by the legislature this year and named incumbent judges of 31 domestic relations and juvenile courts to converted district courts of general jurisdiction.

Agency Created

The legislature declined to create a state agency to help assure equal treatment of women, but the governor established one anyway by executive order.

Briscoe, with a sweep of the pen last week, ordered into effect, a 15-member Commission on the Status of Women.

The body will distribute information on women's employment and activities, develop policies to assure equal treatment, draft programs to expand services and contributions of women and make recommendations to help assure full use of the work force.

AG Opinions

State agencies may not refuse to hire a qualified handicapped person because of the handicap, Atty. Gen. John Hill held in a new opinion. But Hill said the agencies cannot establish a special system to reimburse travel expenses of the handicapped who are unable to drive their own cars.

In other recent opinions, Hill concluded: Dallas County must pay the premium for the "errors and omissions" insurance policy law requires the county clerk to obtain.

A former Texas Army National Guard officer is not entitled to access to a report of an investigation of allegations against him, since it tends to reveal identity of informants.

A bank outside the county seat can be used as a county depository without violating prohibitions against branch banking.

Interest on time deposits of the state employees insurance and benefits fund must be credited to the fund itself and not to state general revenue accounts.

Short Shorts

Gross sales by Texas businesses totaled \$33.8 billion for the first three months of 1977—a 19.4 per cent jump over January-March of 1976.

Texas wheat crop is now estimated at 117.5 million bushels, a 2.5 million increase from last month.
