Patriots Drop Three Games To Canyon On Opening Night



The Canyon Eagles swept three games on the first night of action for the Valley High basketball teams, the JV Eaglettes winning easily 54-21, the state Class AAA runner-up Eaglettes capturing a 51-42 win over the state finalist Class A Patriots, and the Eagles handing the Patriots a 70-49 licking.

The JV girls game was never much of a contest as the Canyon girls outscored the Patriots in every quarter and won handily.

Darlene Hendrix led the Patriot scoring with 10 points, Jena Mullin hit for 5 points, Nita Landry scored 4 points and Martha Holman 2. The JV squad is composed of the following girls: Dodi Lane, Shonda Smith, M'Lisa Meyer, Darlene Hendrix, Jena Mullin, Suzanne Lane, Donna Brown, Martha Reed, Debra Parsley, Nita Landry, Martha Holman, Louise Holm, Christine DeLaGarza.

The girls varsity game, as expected, was the big game of the evening as the two championship clubs from last year squared off. Both teams have several members from last year's team back again this year and both teams are picked to win district championships.

The game started rather slow with the Patriots getting on the scoreboard first with soph Janna Turner hitting for a 2-pointer. The Eaglettes came right back to tie it at 2. Each team got another field goal to tie the score at 4, then the Canyon crew started to pull away and at the end of the first period Canyon led 12-8. The Eaglettes made the score 12-8 before the Valley girls could score again. By this time Valley guards Mary Brunson and Bonnie Clary each had picked up three fouls and it sort of looked like the visitors were going to rout the Patriots, but started picking up some bonus free shots and tied the score at 17, then at 18 and 19. The score was tied once more at 21. From that point, however the Eaglettes scored 11 points to the Valley girls 1 and led 32-22 at halftime.

The Eaglettes widened their lead to 14 points early in the third quarter but the Patriots refused to fold and pull to within six points, 34-40, at the end of three quarters. The locals stayed within six points most of the fourth quarter until just before the game was over when the visitors put the game away.

All things considered the Valley girls played pretty good basketball. However they committed mistakes and turned the ball over to the visitors on numerous occasions and a team doesn't do this and beat the Eaglettes. But if the girls of Valley High can hang on to the ball and not throw it away so many times, this reporter believes that they are capable of winning over the Eaglettes, who have a very fine team, make no mistake.

Starting for the Patriots were Eva Cheatham, Janna Turner and Pierce each scored 2. Others on the team were Darrell Dowd, Randy Woods, Jesse Costella and Brett Cruse. Fouls seemed to be the biggest problem in this game. This game eliminated Valley 1.

Saturday night Valley 2 met the Hedley boys and let them know they came to play ball. Although they got behind the first quarter they came back and really made a ballgame of it and lost by the score of 33-30. Kenny Chandler scored 14 points, Jesse Ferguson 9, Jeff Crump 5 and Greg Ramsey 2. The boys are proud of their second place trophy.

The Eagles scored 14 points before the Patriots managed to get on the scoreboard and the Eagles led 23-7 at the end of the first period. Coach Hulsey's starting five couldn't seem to get untracked in the early going and near the end of the first period he sent in a second five and this group had better luck against the Eagles and played on pretty even terms for the remainder of the half. The Eagles led 40-22 at halftime. The visitors won going away, however, leading 58-32 at the end of three periods and the final tally was 79-49.

Randy Green led the Patriots in scoring with 15 points, most of this coming on free tosses. Ernie Lucero scored 8 points and Ricky Hall also hit for 8. ASCS To Assist In Fuel Allocation

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) and the Texas Railroad Commission have joined hands in an effort to increase efficiency in the handling of the mandatory allocation of middle distillate fuels. An agreement between the state and federal agencies should speed up the program.

Beginning immediately, ASCS County Office personnel will verify fuel needs for hardship cases on Form OOG-PAP-20 for all applications prior to their submission to the State Allocation Office (Texas Railroad Commission).

Previously, it was planned that

needed verification would be obtained after the form was submitted to the Austin office. Form OOG-PAP-20 is to be used by wholesale purchasers to request emergency allocations for immediate use. The form has been supplied to ASCS County Offices throughout the State and was made available to County Clerks' offices.

Also available is Form OOG-PAP-17 which is for the use of purchasers of middle distillate fuels in bulk supply to adjust their monthly allocation for the year or for obtaining a new allocation.

Fuel Retailers Must Attach Price Stickers To Their Pumps

"Because of recent changes in the Phase IV petroleum regulations, all gasoline and diesel fuel retailers must obtain new ceiling price stickers for each pump or grade of petroleum sold," Walter I. Perry, Administrative Officer of the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) office in Plainview, said today. New pump stickers and instruction-computation forms are now available and may be picked up at the IRS office at 1403 West 5th Street, Plainview, Texas 79072.

Written requests for stickers and instructions may be made at the IRS office listed above. Retailers should specify the number of stickers they will need.

gas is sold from a pump, a separate sticker must be posted for each grade. Stickers must contain the new ceiling price and the minimum octane of the gasoline. Anticipating additional changes, The Cost of Living Council (CLC) designed the stickers with four numbered blanks for inserting the ceiling prices for November 1973 through February 1974.

Under revised CLC Rules gasoline and diesel fuel retailers are permitted to increase their May 15, 1973 selling price to reflect, on a dollar for dollar pass-through basis, their increased petroleum costs. This can be done no more than once a month. Whenever an adjustment is made to the maximum permissible price, each retailer must adjust his posted price.

"On the reverse side of the posting instructions is a form which dealers must use to compute their ceiling prices," Mr. Perry said. This sheet must be retained at the service station for IRS inspection to determine compliance with the new regulations.

WORK COMPLETED ON DRAFT OF POLICY STATEMENT

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Proof of Legal Deer Required of Hunters

Once the deer is down and field dressed, what must the hunter do to get his venison ready for the oven, legally?

First, he must attach the proper tag from his hunting license to the deer.

If the hunter has bagged an antlerless deer then he is also required to attach an antlerless deer permit or special tag that he receives from the landowner to the foreleg of the deer.

Then it can be transported directly to the hunter's home or to a commercial plant.

If the venison is to be shared, a legible note signed by the person who killed the deer must be attached to each portion given to other persons. The note must also list the address of the one who killed the deer, date of kill, hunting license number and name of ranch and county where killed.

This signed document must remain with the carcass or any portion of it until the deer is finally processed and delivered to its ultimate destination, in the home or a commercial processing facility.

Do not remove the head of any deer until the carcass has been processed and delivered to its final destination. But you may skin the deer if you wish and remain within the law.

The final destination is defined as a person's home or a commercial processing facility where the deer is finally processed.

It is lawful for a hunter to process a deer in camp as long as he keeps the proper tag from his hunting license, the proper antlerless permit or antlerless tag with the processed meat until such meat is delivered to a commercial locker plant or the residence of the person killing the deer.

Purpose of these regulations, according to the Parks and Wildlife Department, is to insure that all legally taken deer can be identified by game wardens and still permit a person to properly care for the meat thereby insuring some fine steaks, roasts, chili and sausage during the coming season.

WORLD WAR ON DYSTROPHY: Russia's Dr. A. N. Studitsky (L.), Japan's Dr. Setsuro Ebashi (r.), and Dr. Carl M. Pearson of UCLA Medical School were among internationally noted researchers participating in the 4th international scientific conference on muscle and neuromuscular disease, held in Arizona in October by Muscular Dystrophy Associations of America. The meeting, which brought together over 100 investigators from the U.S. and 13 foreign countries, was co-sponsored by the Italian National Research Council of Rome. The five-day conference discussed latest findings on MD and related neuromuscular diseases. MDAA will utilize findings to intensify its worldwide research program. The Association's research effort, along with its program of patient and community services, is principally supported by the annual door-to-door *March Against Muscular Dystrophy*.
