Fire Spreads, Burns An Estimated 3500 Acres

The Baird Volunteer Fire Department received a fire alarm call at 12:45 p.m. last Tuesday, September 13. The call reported a grass fire located eight miles east of Baird.

Tuesday being a dry, windy day did not add points in the Fire Departments favor.

The acreage belonged to Hughes, Hatcher and Jones and the total land burned by the fire was estimated at three thousand acres.

In fighting the blaze the Baird Fire department received assistance from Cisco, Cross Plains and Clyde Fire departments along with area ranchers and citizens.

The fire was reported under control and tapped out at 12:30 a.m. after an estimated 8,000 gallons of water was pumped onto the land.

This, however; turned out to be a short time to rest, for the Fire Department received another call on Wednesday at 12:50 p.m. that the grass fire had rekindled and was burning acreage of the

Hughes estate.

It took an estimated 2000 gallons of water to smother the fire along with the aid of Clyde and Cross Plains Fire Departments.

There were several area citizens helping to bring the fire under control with heavy equipment, James Reynolds, and Hershel Wagley of Putnam ran dozers along the fire lines and Foy Jobe of Precinct 3 ran a maintainer to cut a fire guard.

On the second day the fire was tapped out at around 5:00 p.m.

Total acreage damaged by the fire on the two days was estimated at 3500 acres outside the city of Baird.

Callahan County ranchers may suffer a rough winter for their cattle due to the damage of the fire.

The fire was presumably ignited by the rail road and no report to state otherwise, has been received.

Baird Bears Give Buffaloes Rough Night Scoring 41-7

The Baird Bears breezed past the Cross Plains Buffalos, 41 to 7, last Friday in a non-conference game.

The score jumped to a 14-0 first quarter lead and was ahead 16-0 at halftime. Chris Vestal scored on a one yard run with seven minutes and 35 seconds left in the first quarter with Dennis Baxter adding to the conversion. With five minutes and 30 seconds left in the first quarter Larron Walker recovered a fumble in the endzone for the next score.

With one minute and 30 seconds left before the half Chris Vestal scrambled out of a pocket and fumbled going across the goal line but an alert Gary Smith fell on the ball for a second TD for the Bears.

The Buffalos kicked off to the Bears in the third quarter. The Bears drove the ball to the Cross Plains ten yard line before having to turn the ball over.

With only six minutes and 50 seconds left in the game, Vestal scored on a 25 yard run. Baxter ran the two points. As the game was ending Vestal threw a pass to Jim Sadler for the final touchdown. Jesse Mendez kicked the extra point.

Baird had 246 yards rushing for the

game while holding Cross Plains to 49 on the ground. Baird hit 8 of 16 passes for 122 yards and had 23 first downs.

The Bears had an outstanding night on the offensive scoring 41 points while the defense also had a good night allowing only 7 points and 45 yards rushing.

Dennis Baxter had 131 yards on 24 carries with one TD and two runs after a TD for two points each.

Donny Stovall had 52 yards on 14 carries averaging 36.5 yards on three points.

Jim Sadler had 5 receptions for 84 yards; Gary Smith, 2, for 25 yards; and Mo Gonzales, 1, for 13 yards.

Chris Vestal completed 50% of his passes for 122 yards.

On defense there were nine players with five or more tackles: Smith, 9; Rodriguez, 8; Baxter, 5; Sadler, 8; De-fosses, 6; Gonzales, 5; J. Mendez, 5; Stennett, 5; and Skinner, 5.

The game left Cross Plains in 0-3 for the years while the Bears compared with a 2 to 1.

Congratulations are in order to the Bears for a good game well played.

Baird School Tennis Courts Re-Surfaced

The work on the tennis courts located at Baird Junior High and Baird High School is almost complete. These four asphalt courts have been re-surfaced with a rubberized Color Court. This surface increases the playability of the courts as well as the beauty of the courts.

The wind screens are to be installed within the next few weeks. These re-surfaced courts are as nice as any in the area.

Since lots of money and labor have been spent on these courts, there are a few rules that must be observed in order to keep the courts as nice as possible:

1. Tennis shoes ONLY are to be worn

on the courts.

2. No bicycles, tricycles, motorcycles, skateboards, or horses are allowed on the courts.

3. No bottles, chairs, or boards are allowed inside the fences.

4. School tennis players have first priority on the tennis courts for scheduled match play.

5. Adjustments in the net height are to be made by school personnel, not by propping boards at the ends of the net. These boards can damage the surface of the courts.

Care of the tennis courts is up to those who used the courts. Tennis can be enjoyed by the community if the proper guidelines are followed.

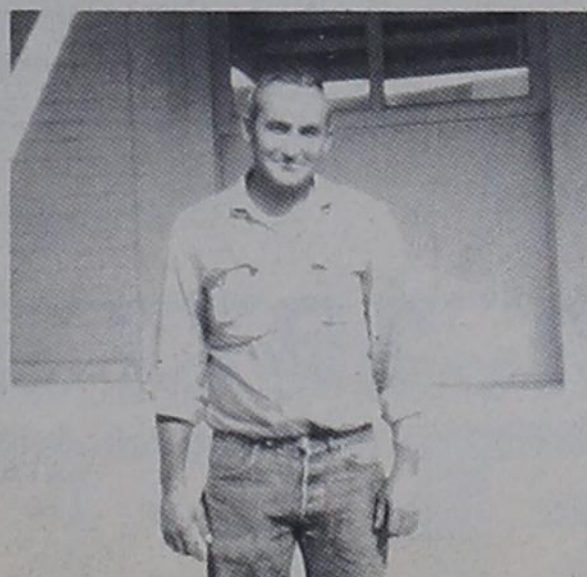
Know Your Neighbor

Jerry Allen has been named by the Chamber of Commerce as the personality profile story of "Know Your Neighbor" for this week's issue of the Callahan County Star.

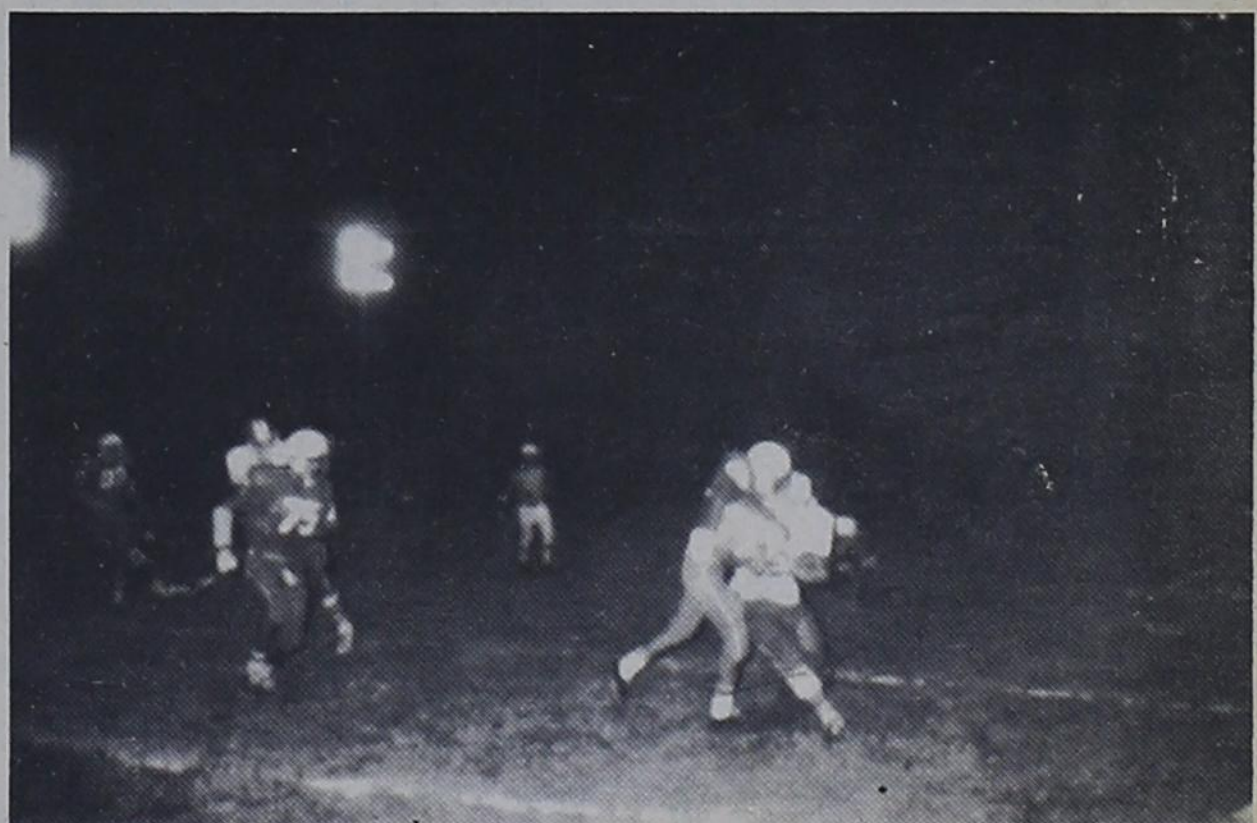
Jerry and his wife Joann, and son, Clint live at 521 Spruce in Baird.

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
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Clyde Bulldogs Loose 14-3

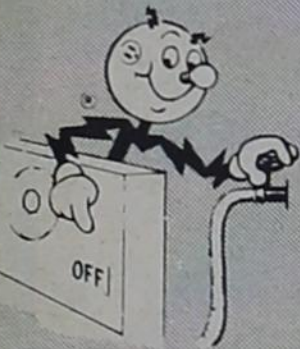

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS
GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 8, 1977

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 18)

S.J.R. 18 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to provide for expanding the Court of Criminal Appeals from its current membership of five judges to nine judges and to permit the court to sit in panels of three judges.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment increasing the size of the Court of Criminal Appeals to nine judges, and permitting the court to sit in panels of three judges."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 13)

S.J.R. 13 proposes a constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$200 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund and to allow surviving widows of veterans to purchase tracts under certain circumstances.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$200 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund and to allow surviving widows of veterans to purchase tracts under certain circumstances."

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 3)

Under current Texas law a person charged with a felony offense who has previously been convicted of two felony offenses may be denied bail. S.J.R. 3 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution which would also result in the denial of bail, for a limited time and subject to appeal, to a person accused of committing a felony while on bail for a prior felony for which the person has been indicted, or accused of a felony involving the use of

a deadly weapon after being convicted of a prior felony.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment permitting denial of bail to a person charged with a felony offense who has been theretofore twice convicted of a felony offense, or charged with a felony offense committed while that person was admitted to bail on a prior felony indictment, or charged with a crime involving the use of a deadly weapon where there is evidence such person has been convicted of a prior felony offense; providing for a 60-day limit to that person's incarceration without trial; and providing for that person's right of appeal."

NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 5)

S.J.R. 5 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the legislature to grant exemptions or other relief from ad valorem taxes on property designated for the preservation of cultural, historical or natural history resources.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing tax relief to preserve certain cultural, historical, or natural history resources."

NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 19)

S.J.R. 19 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the formation of associations authorized to collect certain refundable assessments from producers of poultry, livestock, and other raw agricultural or marine products and validating the 1967 law regarding the formation of such associations.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the formation of agricultural or marine associations which may mandate the collection of refundable assessments for improvement of production, marketing, or use of their products."

NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 49)

S.J.R. 49 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to permit the legislature to authorize state and national banks to exercise banking privileges by use of electronic devices or machines located at such places as may be provided by law and authorizes the sharing of such electronic devices or machines among banks on a reasonable, non-discriminatory basis.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to give the legislature the power to authorize state and national banks to exercise banking and discounting privileges by use of electronic devices or machines."

NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 30)

S.J.R. 30 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution changing the name of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission to the State Commission on Judicial Conduct and making several changes in its powers and procedures. The most significant change would authorize the Commission to suspend from office judges and justices under indictment.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment changing the name of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission to the State Commission on Judicial Conduct, and relating to the commission and the powers and proceedings of the commission, a master, and the supreme court, or court of civil appeals justices serving in place of the supreme court, for the suspension, censure, removal, or involuntary retirement of a justice, judge, or justice of the peace under certain circumstances."

Continental gets No Relief From Court

On September 8th, Travis County District Court Judge Herman Jones denied Continental Telephone's request for relief from the Texas Public Utility Commission Order of January 14.

The January Order of the Commission granted Continental \$1.4 million of the \$5.2 million requested by the telephone company.

Failing to get what is considered adequate relief, Continental took its case to the Travis County District Court because, according to Continental President, James F. Miles, "We felt that the Commission made several errors in arriving at the findings of fact in the case. Apparently Judge Jones does not agree with our position, but the facts are clear and I continue to believe that we are right. Unless we are successful, the customer is the one who will suffer in the long run. Our ability to get fair return on our investment ultimately will determine our ability to attract the capital essential to expand and improve service to our customers." Miles continues, "It is simple, if we cannot raise the money to provide better service and that's where the

customer is the eventual loser."

When asked if Continental will appeal the current decision, Miles replied, "We are studying the situation carefully and have not decided what our next step will be."

If the Commission Order holds up, the rate structure established will mean that some customer's will experience increases in their monthly bills while others can expect refunds of appropriate credits.
