BRISCOE COUNTY COURTHOUSE—Briscoe County was organized March 15, 1892 and since there was no courthouse, a small shack was built on the west side of the street west of what is now the courthouse square. The little house was occupied by County and District Clerk T. L. Anderson until about January 1893. One of the first acts of the Commissioners Court was to begin the erection of the two-story courthouse [pictured above] which was used for a good many years. The contract to build was let to W. C. Cheney and lumber was hauled from Amarillo. Cost of the building was approximately \$3,000.00. Each of the county officials had a small office in the courthouse, in which religious services were also held. H. H. Wallace was the district judge and D. B. Hill was the district attorney.

United Farmer & Rancher Caucuses Being Held in Area

The purpose of the United Farmer & Rancher Congress is to provide a forum for the sharing of problems and their solutions for the family farmer. Recommendations for action will be carried to the congress by the approximately 1500 delegates who are being elected in some 500 meetings being carried on in the 48 contiguous United States between July 16 and August 30 of this year.

A meeting is schedule tonight (Thursday), August 14 in the Swisher Memorial Building in Tulia with Connie Irlbeck, Hap-

py, as coordinator. On Friday, August 15, there is scheduled a meeting at the Moore County Community Building, with Keith Christie, Dumas, as coordinator. On August 19, a meeting is scheduled in Dimmitt, with Jennett Thorn of Friona as coordinator. If you cannot make the one scheduled for tonight, then may be you can make another close to the area.

The delegates who are being selected in a democratic, grass roots program will bring to the congress the problems and solutions as identified by the farmers and ranchers they represent. Meeting in caucuses and forums at the congress, the delegates should be able to identify shared problems and possible solutions. It is the hope of the United Farmer & Rancher Congress steering committee that this cross-section of the American farm community can respond to repeated requests from members of the U. S. Congress not only to identify the real problems of the family farmer, and the causes, but also to suggest ways and means by which the U. S. House of Representatives and the U. S. Senate, together, can move to aid the plight of the American farming and ranching family.

The committee will be planning educational programs for county families for the remainder of the year and for 1987, based on the recommendations from the recent Home Economics Task Force Study.

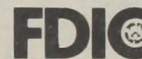

There is no entry fee. Prizes will be \$10.00 for first place, \$7.50 for second place and \$5.00 for third place.

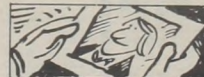

Dry Spell Coming For Some Texans

A different kind of dry spell is coming soon for some Texans. W. S. McBeath, administrator of the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission, today issued a reminder that the legal drinking age will rise to 21 on Labor Day. The present legal age is 19. At 12:01 a.m. on Monday, September 1, possession or consumption of alcoholic beverages will be illegal for any person who has not reached his or her 21st birthday. The only exception is if the under-age person is in the

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immediate physical presence of his own parents or spouse who is over 21. Possession of an alcoholic beverage by the underage person is a misdemeanor with a possible fine of \$25 to \$200.

It is also a crime for the underage person to present false identification or to misrepresent his age in an attempt to purchase alcoholic beverages, or to successfully make such a purchase even without misrepresenting his age. In either case, the first offense fine is the same as for possession. Giving alcohol to a minor carries a fine of \$100 to \$500.

Sale of alcoholic beverages to an underage person is the most serious offense. A fine of \$100 to \$500 and/or a year in jail is the penalty for the first violation. A second violation can result in the same jail term and/or a fine of \$500 to \$1,000.

McBeath also cautioned that the age change will affect persons entering package stores. Liquor stores may not allow underage persons to even enter the store. And most such establishments have warning signs prominently posted.

"Many young people do not realize it is a criminal offense to ignore the warning signs and enter a liquor store," said McBeath. "It is criminal trespass under section 30.05 of the Texas Penal Code, which is a Class B misdemeanor."

Another common misconception is that drinking age violations only apply to public places.

"That's not true," said McBeath. "It will be just as illegal in a party barn, a fraternity house or a car parked on private property," he said.

McBeath urged voluntary compliance on the part of both licensees and underage former customers. Anyone who has a question about the upcoming change can obtain clarification from the nearest district office of the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission, or at the Main Office in Austin, telephone (512) 458-2500.
