Governor Bush At State Park

In conjunction with the promotion of tourism in Texas, Governor George Bush and First Lady Laura Bush along with their daughters arrived at the Caprock Canyons State Park last Thursday.

The Governor encourages all Texas families to join this summer in taking time to enjoy the peace and beauty of Texas at its natural best. "Texas is fortunate to have many opportunities for families to get away from the hustle and bustle of daily lives to enjoy the great outdoors, whether by hiking through magnificent canyons, wading in the ocean, fishing in our lakes and streams, or walking with a guide along a nature trail to learn more about birds and wildlife." Nature tourism is a growing industry that attracts many visitors and substantial dollars to our state's economy.

While visiting with the Austin Youth Group, the governor swapped stories with them and handed out Caprock Canyon baseball caps.

Bush thanked parks officials for giving children the chance to experience nature and learn more about themselves.

"It's important to show kids the wholesomeness of the outdoors," he said. "nature puts everything in perspective."

Leadership and life skills and environmental considerations also were issues the children were asked to take with them back to Austin, said Kevin Good, director of community services with the parks and wildlife department's Public Lands Division.

Bush, his wife Laura, and their twin daughters spent the earlier part of the day in Quanah before visiting the children and touring the park on horseback.

"Small-town Texas has a lot to offer all of us," Bush said. "We want Texans to use Texas and tour the state they call home."

The group left for a horseback ride with some of the local cowboys leading the way thru the canyons.

Before leaving the Park, the Governor got in some jogging. The First Lady commented on how beautiful the Park was and said it was one of the best maintained Parks that they had visited.

Everyone agreed that the event went very well.

TxDOT Allows Selected Roadside Baling To Help With Drought In Area

Due to the continuing drought, Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) is making some of its right-of-way available for ranchers for mowing and baling of roadside grasses. Under authority granted by the Texas Legislature in 1977, TxDOT can allow ranchers to mow and bale vegetation along the department's 77,000 miles of highway.

Written permission from the appropriate TxDOT district engineer is required before any mowing and baling take place. Owners of property adjacent to the right-of-way have the right of first refusal before others are allowed to mow or bale. The district engineer has the authority to deny any request.

Persons granted permission to mow or bale must not receive compensation for performance of these operations but may use or dispose of the hay or other materials produced. Mowing and baling will be limited to appropriate rural roadways.

"When disaster strikes, we do everything we can to help," said Bill Burnett, TxDOT executive director. "If ranchers can make use of the grass without endangering the public or harming the road system, we will do our best to be accommodating."

GTE Sells Quitaque And Turkey Exchanges To Cap Rock Telephone

GTE Telephone Operations is selling approximately 650 telephone lines to Cap Rock Telephone Cooperative, Inc., effective June 30. The sales price was not disclosed.

Under terms of the agreement, Cap Rock Telephone Cooperative will provide telephone service to customers in Quitaque and Turkey.

"We are working diligently with our counterparts at Cap Rock Telephone Cooperative to ensure a smooth transition," said Kathy Harless, GTE Texas/New Mexico region president.

The property sale is part of GTE's previously announced strategic effort to trade or sell a small percentage of local exchange properties in markets that may be of greater long-term value to other telephone service providers.

Both GTE and Cap Rock Telephone Cooperative are keeping customers informed of the change through a direct mailing, advertisements and media releases.

All telephone services will continue without interruption. Customers will no longer be able to use their GTE calling card after June 30.

Customers who pay their bill by check should make their check payable to Cap Rock Telephone Cooperative after June 30, instead of GTE.

The Quitaque and Turkey telephone service areas were a part of Central States Telephone Company which became a part of State Telephone Company of

Texas June 30, 1927. State Telephone was one of four companies that joined April 1, 1931 to form Southwestern Associated Telephone Company.

Southwestern Associated was changed to General Telephone Company of the Southwest (now GTE Southwest) in July 1952 to achieve closer identification with the General Telephone system, now GTE Corporation, with which it had been affiliated since 1935.

With revenues of \$20 billion in 1995, GTE is one of the largest publicly held telecommunications companies in the world. GTE is also the largest U.S.-based local telephone company and a leading cellular-service provider-with wireline and wireless operations that form a market area covering about one third of the country's population.

Turkey-Quitaque Lions Hold Joint Installation

The Turkey and Quitaque Lions Clubs held a joint installation of officers, Monday, June 10, 1996. This service was held at the Senior Citizens Room in Turkey. Twenty-nine people were present for the potluck meal.

The two new boss lions are Margie Bell or Turkey and Bob Hinkle of Quitaque. They have great plans for the two clubs for the coming year.

Quitaque Mayor Request Funds For Water System

Mayor Jim Davidson along with 34 other officials from area towns met Thursday with the Panhandle Regional Review Committee for requested funds for water systems.

Mayor Davidson requested \$250,000 from the Texas Community Development Program. The grant, along with some city money could be used to replace several sections of dilapidated water lines. If the money is funded it would improve Qui-

taque's water system considerably. The system was installed in 1927, the year of incorporation.

This year, Texas was allocated \$51 million for the Community Development Program. The Panhandle region received \$1.7 million.

After evaluating the requests based on merits of the project and local effort, state agency will make their decision. The agency should know by mid-August which requests receive money.

The four members that were still coming to B.W. were Lillian White, Lockwood McCracken, Cora Gragson and Lolla Belle Harmon. Lillian passed away but, there were others to take her place. Lockwood passed away and Cora moved to Wellington and that left Florene Cobb, Lolla Belle and Opal Hamilton who is a member of the Church Of Christ. We managed our trip to Texas.

The time came when Opal had to help her sister redo her house because of a fire and that left Florene and Lolla Belle so we decided to call it quits.

Summer Time Fun

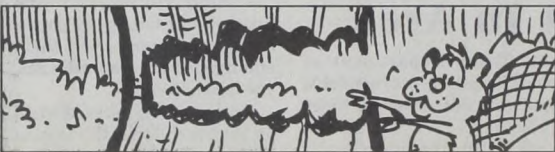
Fourteen young adults along with two adults began a journey last week that they won't soon forget.

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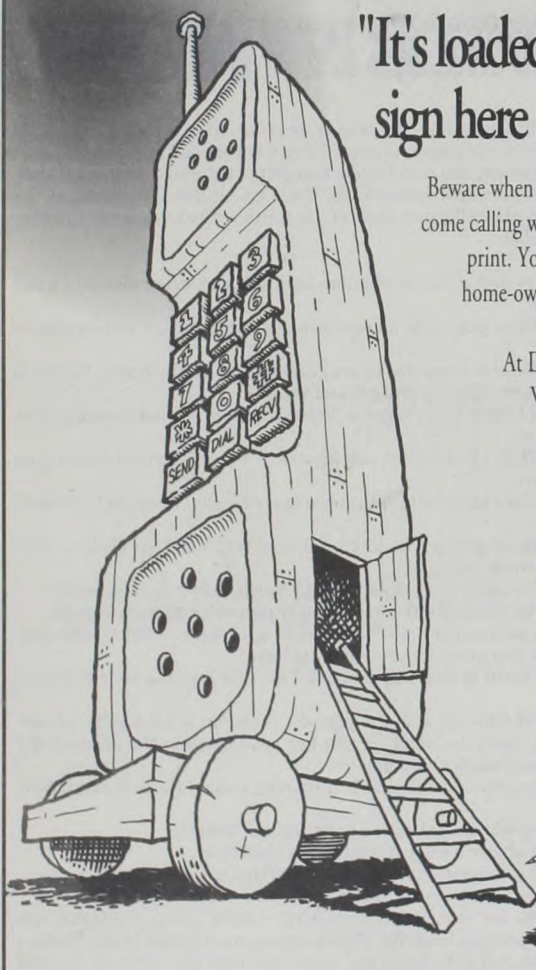

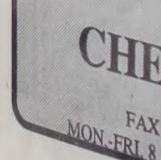

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Sharp Proposes Steps To Ease Burden On State's Farmers And Ranchers

State Comptroller John Sharp delivered to state leaders a special economic report on Texas' continuing drought and proposed specific steps the state should take to help farmers and ranchers weather the dry conditions in the coming months.

Sharp called on state officials to insist that the U.S. Department of Agriculture extend the federal Emergency Livestock Feed Program. The program, which provides up to 50 percent of feed costs in time of crisis, is scheduled to end on August 31.

In addition, Sharp said, 24 Texas counties dropped from the program on May 31 should be readmitted.

Sharp also announced that the Texas Department of Transportation, at his request, has directed its district engineers to promote their discretionary program allowing farmers and ranchers to cut and bale grass from state right-of-ways.

In addition, Sharp urged state leaders to renew their efforts to market the Agricultural Water Conservation Loan Program, a state program that makes funds available for equipment, labor and other costs to improve water-use efficiency in irrigation systems.

Texas should encourage broader marketing of its Linked Deposit Program, too, Sharp said. The Texas Agricultural Finance Authority has funds available for water conservation loans but lends most of its money to diversify crop production and expand processing.

"These are worthwhile projects during normal times," Sharp said. "But without rain, farmers and ranchers won't have much to diversify or process, and they deserve to know that there are funds available for water conservation."

Finally, Sharp suggested that the state's Legislative Budget Board consider additional funding for the Small Community Emergency Loan Program administered by the Texas Water Development board.

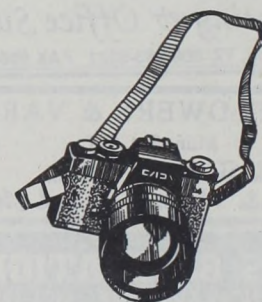

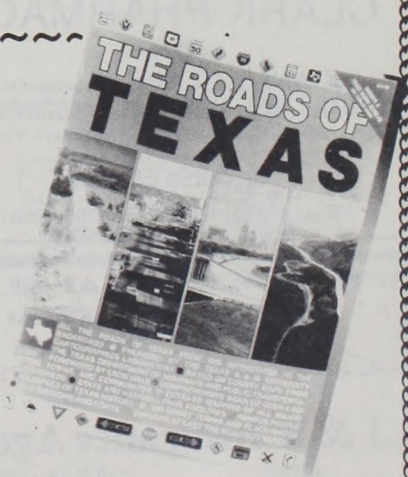

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NOTICE OF PROPOSED GAS RATE CHANGE

On May 31, 1996, Energas Company filed Statements of Intent to change its gas rates with each incorporated city listed below. The proposed changes will take effect no sooner than 35 days after filing. Each city may suspend the proposed effective date for an additional 90 days.

The company proposes to increase rates to General Service (residential and commercial), Small Industrial Service, Large Gas Air Conditioning and/or Electric Generating Gas Service, and the Air Conditioning Rate Rider. Additionally, the company is proposing to offer a new service, General Service-State Institutions, to state agencies. The company may implement a different rate design than proposed provided the increased revenue does not exceed that specified herein.

The proposed changes are expected to increase the company's annual revenues by approximately 7.6 percent or \$7.7 million. The proposed changes could affect approximately 200,000 gas consumers in the following communities:
