Ground Saturated In Valley Area

The rain came last week and it continued to hang around and wet the ground to the saturation point. The Caprock Canyons State Park reported 5.7 inches of rain which caused Lake Theo to gain several inches and therefore be higher than it has been for several seasons.

The town of Quitaque reported anywhere from 4.7 to 5.6 inches of rain. The slow falling of the moisture and the many days of rain caused many businesses to have leaks show up in their roofs as well as many homes which considered their roofs leak proof, to begin dripping once again as well as water seeping into basements in town. Many young calves and colts born during this cold April rain did not survive the trauma of the cold.

But even with all of the problems that the rains brought, it also caused smiles on the faces and happiness in the thoughts of the good crop year ahead. Music can be heard from the throats of many frogs as they voice their approval of the many lakes that have surfaced since the rain.

Bishop of Amarillo Visits Quitaque

A gathering representing at least 40 families numbering over 100, met at the Quitaque Catholic Center Sunday April 27, 1997, to meet, greet and hear their Bishop ospeak. Most Reverend John W. Yanta, Bishop of Amarillo, made his first visit to Quitaque. He remarked that it was like coming home. He grew up in the small community of Runge in Karnes County, South Texas.

As a small boy in a family of eight, he was the one always up to mischief, the least likely to become a priest. When his older sister started to school, she could only speak Polish. He attended local schools until he was 13, when he entered the seminary.

"I am not worthy to be a priest," he said, "but God continued to call me until I stopped resisting." He has been a priest for 41 years.



He plans to visit all the parishes in his Diocese of Amarillo before Christmas. "We have to take care of each other, I want to be a brother to everybody here," he stated. "A Bishop is the same as everyone else except he is to be the leader, the chief priest and chief shepherd." There are 52,000 to care for in his Diocese.

He was ordained on St. Patricks Day in 1956. He replaced the bishop who had baptised him. He has been a youth director in the church, founder of a Catholic TV station, director in a government youth program, newspaper editor and active in the schools in San Antonio.

Mary, Santos and Norberio Garacia of Silverton provided music for the group Sunday. Pastors from Wellington, Memphis, Shamrock and Childress attended the gathering. Bishop Yanta was driven to Quitaque by Mike who was from Louisiana. The Quitaque Catholic Community served a meal to all the visitors Sunday afternoon.

Bishop Yanta said, "Having been in San Antonio all my life, I feel right at home with the friendly people of the Amarillo area. The people have given me such a friendly, cordial welcome to the panhandle that I have not have time to be home sick for San Antonio."

That's why the Air Bag Safety Campaign has launched Operation ABC: Mobilizing America to Buckle Up Children. In partnership with the Campaign, and with the support of the President of the United States and the nation's governors and mayors, law enforcement in all 50 states will be stepping up enforcement of child passenger safety and safety belt laws during Buckle Up America! Week, May 19-26, in order to protect children and families from potential crash-related injuries.

Public support for strengthening child passenger safety laws and stronger enforcement of existing laws is very strong; 76 percent of those surveyed support it. "It's time to make unbuckled children unacceptable in America," Dewey added.

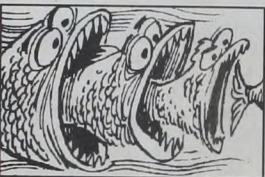
A visitor can smell the wonderful food cooked by some of the town's people. What pride the local residents feel as the tourists fill the town and enjoy all the hard work and planning!

Ranch-to-Rail North Day, May 6

The 1997 Ranch-to-Rail North Day will be held May 6 at the Amarillo Civic Center in downtown Amarillo. Registration begins at 8 a.m. The program is open to the public and will be valuable to anyone involved in the cattle business.

In addition to reviewing the results of the 1996-97 Ranch-to-Rail program, the program will focus on improving carcass traits of beef cattle. "In the past, we have tended to focus on herd health and the performance of calves in the feed yard," says Dr. Ted McCollum, Extension Beef Cattle Specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in Amarillo, "but recently several producers suggested we give them some ideas for evaluating and improving herd genetics in an effort to produce cattle that ultimately provide a higher quality beef product."

With this in mind, the main part of the program will focus on selection and evaluation tools that producers can utilize to evaluate and improve the carcass merit of cattle. The morning program will discuss conventional means of improving carcass merit such as sire selection based on breed complementarity, cow size, and carcass EPDs.

Recent developments in the application of ultrasound technology to evaluate sires and feeder cattle will also be a program topic. The morning will

conclude with a discussion of the bovine gene mapping project at Texas A & M, College Station and the future of marker-assisted selection to improve carcass merit.

Following a lunch sponsored by Texas Cattle Feeders association, the Texas Beef Council will report on their activities. The program will close with a brief session to assist producers with interpreting Ranch-to-Rail data.

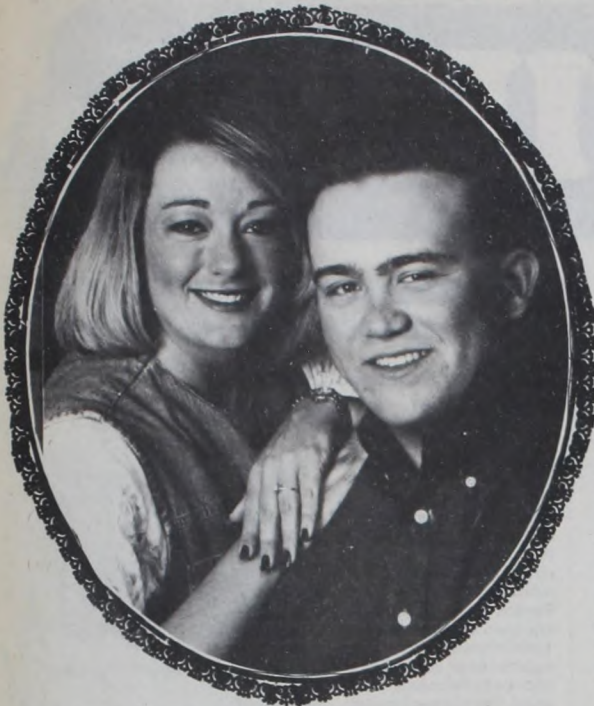

Migraine Triggers

(NAPS)—Better technology and more complete medical information are combining to give hope to migraine sufferers.

Migraine is a debilitating headache, often accompanied by nausea, vomiting and an increased sensitivity to light and noise. Victims were once dismissed for exaggerating their pain, but today migraine is recognized as a disease of the brain.



Excessive heat or cold can trigger a migraine attack.

Although there is no cure for migraine, there are treatments and others are being researched. One investigational treatment now under study involves control of a certain brain chemical that regulates the size of blood vessels. This chemical is believed to play a role in the progression of migraine headaches.

Participants in the study must be 16 or older, with at least a six month history of between one and six attacks per month. Headache evaluation, expert medical care, and research-related treatments are all offered at no cost. To see if you qualify for the study or to find the clinical site nearest you, call 1-800-57-STUDY, ext. 42.

The following are known to be triggers, which cause migraine on a regular basis:

- Excessive heat, cold, light, motion, or noise
- Irregular sleep patterns
- Certain types of food, including cheese, red wine and chocolate; or very cold foods, such as ice cream
- Tobacco and alcohol
- Hormonal changes—especially in young women.

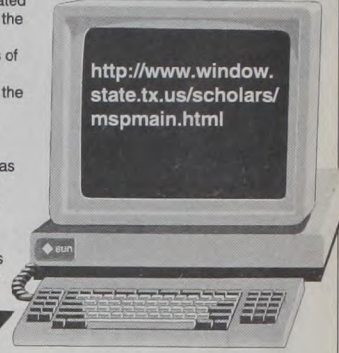

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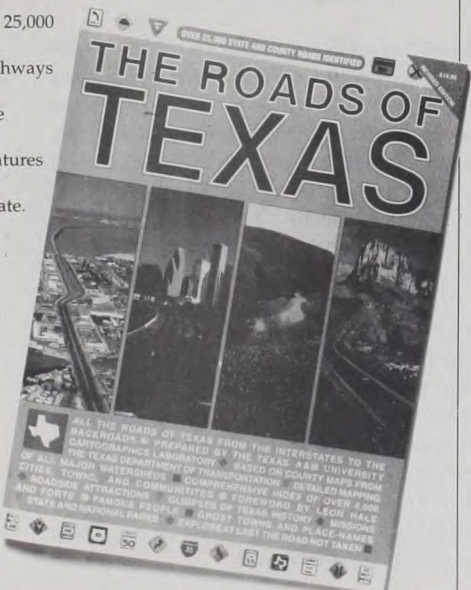

Group Formed To Put Hiway 199 In Spotlight

Communities from over a 350 mile area--from Fort Worth to Dimmitt in Castro County--have banded together under the name of Highway 199 Northwest Extension association to work for an improved highway that will move their West Texas Country 32 miles closer to Fort Worth. From this meeting came plans for improvements along the route by closing existing gaps between Seymour and Crowell and between Paducah and Turkey. Other plans include unification of the route numbering from Fort Worth to Bovina in Palmer County on U.S. 60 through extension of the present State Highway 199--between Fort Worth and Seymour from Seymour Northwestward over proposed new construction from Seymour and Crowell, along present U. S. 70 to Paducah, along new construction to Turkey, and thence along and supplanting State Highway 86 from Turkey westward through Quitaque, Silverton, Tulia and Dimmitt to Bovina.
