Briscoe Stock Show Ready At Silvertown

Area active members of Briscoe County FFA chapters and/or Briscoe County and Valley 4-H Clubs are gearing up for the annual Briscoe County Stock Show to be held Saturday, January 28, 1989, at the Show Barn in Silvertown.

Valley will be well represented with 25 students entering 29 hogs and 9 lambs in the competition.

This year's show judge is Burt Williams, County Extension Agent from Spearman.

The Lamb Show starts at 9 a.m., followed by the Dairy Heifer Show. The Hog Show will begin at 1 p.m.

A Buyers Dinner will be served at 5 p.m. at the Show Barn. All interested and prospective buyers are invited to attend.

Something new added this year, will be a Premium Sale scheduled to begin at 6 p.m.

Rules and regulations have been set forth for all participants:

1. All exhibits will be under control of the management buy the show will in no case be responsible for any damages that may occur.

2. All sheep, swine, heifers and steers must be on the show grounds by 6 p.m. Friday, January 27. Entry fee is \$7.50 per head for sheep and swine and \$10.50 per head for all cattle. January 16 was the deadline to county agent or ag teacher. Late fee up to show after deadline is \$2.50 per head.

3. Animals must remain on the grounds until all judging is complete and will be dismissed by superintendents.

4. All exhibitors must be bonafide members of active FFA chapters or 4-H clubs in Briscoe County and enrolled in Silvertown or Valley Public School.

5. All animals must have been the property of the owner and exhibitor throughout the feeding period. Such feeding period shall have begun before November 1, for sheep, beef heifers and dairy heifers. Ownership deadline for swine is December 1.

Ownership date for steers is July 1 in accordance with State Validation Regulations.

6. Each exhibitor shall exhibit his or her own animal and be responsible for its care while on the show grounds, unless granted permission by the show superintendent. If student is ineligible to show in accordance with House Bill 72, then the animal entered may be exhibited by a substitute showman, if he or she is a bonafide 4-H or FFA member in Briscoe County and enrolled in Silvertown or Valley Schools.

7. There will be no limit on number of animals entered, however, only two total animals allowed in premium sale per exhibitor.

8. There is no minimum

class size.

9. All bedding for the animals will be furnished by the show. Straw is permitted in cattle pens only.

10. The weight limits, age limits per species and class break are as follows:

Sheep: minimum 90 pounds and no top limit for FW, FWX, MEDX; minimum of 75 pounds and no top limit for Southdowns, sheep must have milk teeth.

Hogs: no bottom weight and maximum 250 pounds; 5 pounds tolerance; classes will be broken at discretion of swine superintendent in regards to breaking by breed and/or by weight.

Steers: 800 pounds minimum weight; no maximum. Must be Texas validated.

Dairy heifers: no weight limit.

Beef heifers: no weight limit, must be 12 to 24 months of age and halter broke; does not have to be registered; no teeth requirement.

There will be a livestock show Board of Directors meeting at the Show Barn at 8 p.m. Friday, January 27, 1989.

Increase In Hall County Hospital Tax Proposed

The following news article was taken from *The Memphis Democrat*, Jan. 19, 1989.

State Rep Warren Chisum, D-Pampa, has filed a bill which if passed by the state legislature and approved by Hall County voters would raise the maximum tax rate and the Hospital District could collect from \$.20 per \$100 valuation to the state maximum rate limit of 75 cents per \$100 valuation.

When the hospital district was created in 1987, the tax rate was limited to 20 cents on \$100 valuation.

House Bill 393 would allow the district board of managers, if petitioned by 50 or more registered voters in the district, to call a special election to raise the maximum rate to the statewide limit of 75 cents.

Bill Neely, Hospital Administrator, explained that the hospital district does not intend to tax residents at the 75 cents rate.

"We don't want them to assume that we are going to the maximum," Neely said. Although the hospital district board has discussed the possibility of raising the tax

rate to 45 cents, Neely said, board members have not decided what rate should be set.

The purpose of the Chisum Bill, Neely said, is to give the board the flexibility in the future to establish whatever rate is necessary to support the hospital.

County citizens are well aware of the financial problems of the local hospital

district, and the fact that the 20-cent rate being assessed this year is too low along with operation revenues to meet the financial needs of the hospital to remain open.

To keep the medical facility open, hospital supporters launched a major fundraising drive that has raised more than \$400,000. "Without the infusion of those donated

because he was too lazy to move or else he just loved them. I'm not sure which.

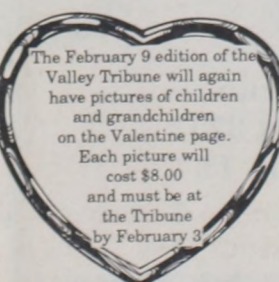
He would sneak in the house and hide from me on hot days or cold nights. I'd find him when I'd hear him shake his floppy ears.

Steps To Better Diabetes Control



Walking is not only the fastest-growing solitary sport in the United States, it is also an important way for eleven million Americans with diabetes to help control this chronic disease.

Controlling diabetes often requires a carefully balanced regimen of exercise, diet and medication. Since strenuous exercise such as running is not recommended for diabetes patients, walking serves as an ideal form of physical activity.

Walking promotes better control of blood sugar, improves function of the heart and lungs, helps reduce body fat, lowers blood pressure and has a beneficial effect on cholesterol levels.

Most people, regardless of their fitness level, can start a walking program. Walking is gentler to the muscles and joints than running and jogging and is one of the least injury-prone aerobic exercises. Any exercise program, however, should be approached with some thought and planning, especially when you have diabetes. Here are some recommendations to consider before undertaking a fitness walking program.

- Get your doctor's approval.
- Walk on the most absorbent

surface you can find: sand, grass, dirt, or running track.

- Wear proper-fitting, soft-soled walking shoes.
- Wear clothing that absorbs perspiration and allows air to flow through: cotton clothing during the summer and layers of cotton and wool during the winter.
- Drink fluids (preferably water) before and after walking to avoid dehydration.

Each person's diabetes regimen and response to exercise may differ. You should determine—in collaboration with your doctor—what adjustments to make in your diabetes management to ensure trouble-free, enjoyable exercise.

Roerig, a division of Pfizer Pharmaceuticals, is sponsoring a nationwide program to encourage physicians to recommend walking as a

safe and effective exercise for their patients with diabetes.

Physicians involved in the program are provided with Fit-Walk 94 Kits for their patients which include a hip pack containing a tip sheet about walking, a journal to record walking exercise progress, patient information on walking and its effects on diabetes, and an issue of Walking magazine with a coupon for a subscription discount. Contact your physician to see if they are involved in the Fit-Walk program.

A regular exercise program and proper diet go hand-in-hand in diabetes control. Research shows that by eating food high in complex carbohydrates and fiber, and low in fat and cholesterol, people with diabetes can keep their blood sugar, cholesterol, and body weight at reasonable levels. Former New York Met Ed Kraneppol is making available, through Roerig, a booklet containing some of his favorite recipes that have helped him in the management of his diabetes. The recipes are easy to prepare and offer a nutritious alternative to high-sugar, high-cholesterol foods. 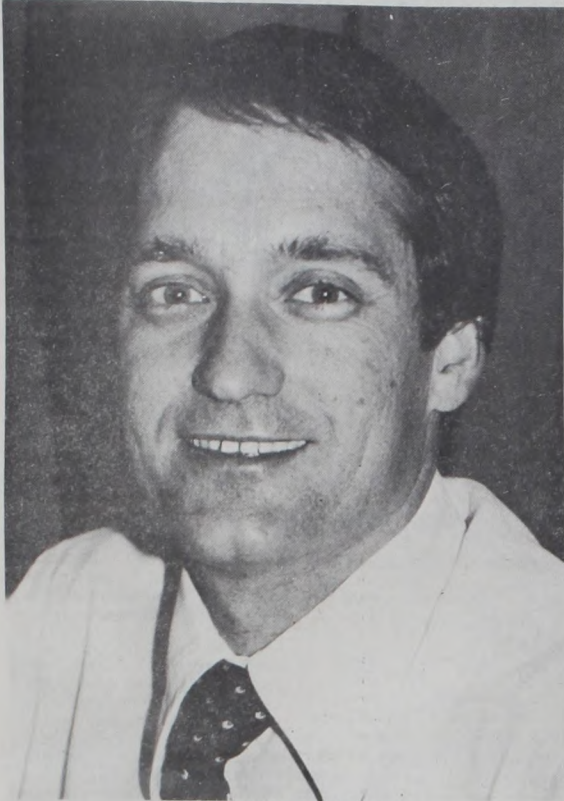

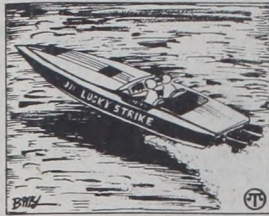
The Excitement of Offshore Racing

You could say Americans go overboard when it comes to boats. The fact is, there are eight-and-a-half million pleasure boats in the United States.

Whether they prefer sail boats or power boats, most boat owners and occasional boaters agree that offshore racing is one of the most exciting sports in boating.

One of the most successful offshore racing boats is the Lucky Strike. Crew chief Lloyd Gootenberg has made quite a splash on the international circuit with the race boat. Public Warned About Vandalizing Mailboxes

"Using a mailbox for target practice seems like harmless fun," says Turkey Postmaster Janice Timmons, "but it's really a serious federal offense."

"Mailboxes and mail are personal property, but they are protected by federal law. Anyone caught going through mailboxes and removing the mail or defacing the mailbox itself may be in for some stiff penalties," Timmons said.

The actual law reads: "Whoever willfully or maliciously injures, tears down or destroys any letter box or other receptacle intended or used for the receipt or delivery of mail on any mail route, or breaks open the same or willfully or maliciously injures, defaces or destroys any mail deposited therein, shall be fined not more than \$1,000 or imprisoned not more than 3 years."

"That's quite a price to pay for what may seem to be a harmless prank," says Janice.

Postmaster Janice Timmons asks Turkey customers who observe anyone defacing a mailbox or tampering with another person's mail in a mailbox to call the post office and/or the sheriff's office.

You may also contact the Postal Inspection Service at P.O. Box 1919, Lubbock, Texas 79408-1919, or by telephone at 806-762-7821. All information provided will be kept in strictest confidence, if requested.

"We at the Post Office are working to make your mail service as fast, reliable and secure as possible. Your cooperation in keeping the mail secure is greatly appreciated."

"Customers with curbside mailboxes have a special challenge when it comes to keeping them in top condition. The boxes are subject to the weather as well as hazardous drivers, high weeds, parked cars and pranksters. Even so, most customers manage to keep their mailboxes in good shape for proper delivery of their mail."

"The responsibility for these boxes rests with the customer," says Timmons. "The curbside mailbox must be accessible to the carrier without requiring the carrier to leave his or her vehicle."

"There should be no obstructions, such as vehicles, trashcans, weeds or snow. The bottom of the box should be 3 1/2 to 4 feet above ground level, and the address should be clearly printed on the receptacle, facing the carrier, to assure more efficient delivery."

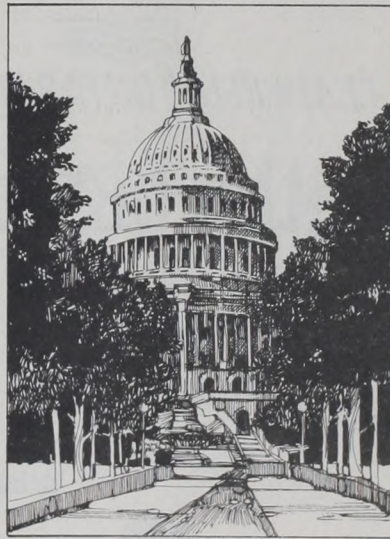
"An old dented box with sharp cutting edges, or a box that is too small should be replaced, or mail delivery may be withheld."

"If you have any questions regarding the placement or upkeep of your mailbox, please call the post office," says Mrs.

Timmons. "And thank you for your continued cooperation here the Turkey delivery area."

funds," Neely said, "they were looking at the possibility of closing before the end of 1988."

Much of the money that has been contributed will be used for physician recruitment and replacement of hospital equipment, Neely said.

Neely said he is hopeful that Chisum's bill will pass soon enough to enable the hospital election before the district's fiscal year ends June 30, 1989. Since the Texas Legislature must wait 60 days before voting on a bill, unless the Governor designates the bill as an emergency, this looks doubtful.

The bill does include an emergency provision that the measure will be enforced after its passage by state lawmakers. Steve Collins, general counsel for the Legislative Council, said a bill with an emergency provision will take effect when the governor either signs it or files it with the Secretary of State's office without his signature.

But the hospital district could run into problems with the state's uniform election rule unless the bill is amended, because the election code only authorizes elections on the third Saturday in January, first Saturday in May, second Saturday in August or the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November.

If the local hospital district wants to hold a special election on a date other than those set by law, the bill must include an exemption from the uniform date requirement. Rep. Chisum is addressing this matter with the Legislative Council on a possible amendment.

In a telephone interview Monday, Mr Neely told *The Valley Tribune* "as of June 30, 1988, at which time an audit report was

completed on the hospital, \$154,278 was brought in by tax revenue, for a 10 month period. A 45 cent per \$100 valuation tax increase would bring in \$465,699. That's based on an 89 percent collectable rate. The total amount of appraised valuation of Hall County property is \$116,279,406."

When asked, if passed, how long before we the tax payers would see an increase, he responded "Hopefully it will go to the voters before June 30, if so, then the increase would go into effect July 1, 1989, assuming it's passed."

"The donations have given us time to find more revenues in an effort to keep the hospital open. The board has not said for sure the increase would be 45 cents, although they have indicated that figure. We have had 31 physicians respond to our advertising, we've narrowed that down to 5 or 6 applicants to interview more closely."

Youth Going To Soviet Union

Tracy Tomlin of Silverton, daughter of Emmett and Sandi Tomlin, has been invited to participate in the first Hugh O'Brian Youth (HOBY) Foundation alumni trip to the Soviet Union June 25-July 11, 1989.

She was required to submit an essay on what she felt her background would contribute to the trip. Thirty-five Alumni Association members from the United States were selected for the tour. The group of 35 (plus five staff and counselors) will depart from New York's Kennedy Airport on June 25 or June 27 at 7:30 p.m. for Helsinki, Finland. They will leave Helsinki immediately for Moscow. Once in the Soviet Union, the group will be sponsored by Spudnik, the Soviet youth travel organization. Accommodations will be in Spudnik hotels and/or university dormitories. Motorcyclists Needed By DPS

The Texas Department of Public Safety Motorcycle Training Section is seeking experienced, safety conscious motorcycle riders to become DPS-approved motorcycle instructors.

Motorcycle safety instructors will work on a free-lance basis for the educational organizations that sponsor rider training programs. The programs are approved and administered by DPS.

The instructors teach safety skills and defensive strategies to beginners in a 17-hour Riding and Street Skills course. The course is required for minors under the age of 18 and encouraged for all other riders. Instructors can also teach an 18-hour Experienced Rider course.

The courses are scheduled in the evening and on weekends. Instructor pay varies, but averages at least \$10-\$15 per hour for up to 20 hours per course. Classes are offered in 46 sites around the state. Instructors are needed in nearly all areas.

All instructor candidates must complete a 60-hour Instructor Preparation Course which is certified by the Motorcycle Safety Foundation. The course is usually given over three consecutive weekends, and will be offered in several selected locations throughout the state in 1989.

Lower '88 Taxes With Capital Gains And Losses

Although you may benefit from lower tax rates this year, other factors may mean higher taxes for you. To ease your tax burden for 1988, adapt your tax and investment strategies to take advantage of the new rules. Take, for example, capital gains. Before tax reform, only 40 percent of long-term capital gains was taxable; Currently, 100 percent is taxable at a rate as high as 33 percent.

"To lock in capital gains on a stock, but postpone paying capital gains tax until next year, consider going short against the box," explains Vern Martens, vice president at Merrill Lynch Tax Advisory. "That is, borrow the same number of shares you own and sell the borrowed shares. The gain will not be realized until you deliver the stock you own to cover your short position—which, for tax purposes should be in 1989."

Alternatively, consider buying an option to sell the stock—called a put option—to lock in the gain by guaranteeing a fixed price for the stock until the option expires, presumably sometime in 1989.

For those who have realized capital gains in 1988, consider ways of offsetting that income. Taking capital losses to offset gains is one way. Furthermore, \$3,000 of additional capital losses can be used to offset ordinary income.

Another way to benefit from substantial gains in securities but

avoid capital gains taxes is through gifts to charity. When making a donation in 1988, an investor should consider giving appreciated securities held long-term rather than cash. This removes the tax liability on the gain and provides a deduction for the full amount of the gift. Were the securities sold, and the donation to charity made in cash, the capital gain would be taxed.

But remember, gifts of appreciated securities count as a preference item and may subject you to the Alternative Minimum Tax (AMT).

Realizing losses also may reduce your tax bill and increase your long-term investment return. "In a bond portfolio, for example" Mr. Martens advises, "you might sell an out-of-state municipal bond at a loss and buy an in-state bond."

If you are not subject to the AMT, you can also buy an AMT bond. AMT bonds, also called non-essential purpose bonds, are municipal bonds issued after August 7, 1986 from which more than 10 percent of the proceeds fund private projects or facilities.

"Although they are fully taxable for individuals subject to the AMT, they generally offer a higher tax-free yield for those not subject to the AMT," adds Mr. Martens.

Prudent tax planning may not only reduce your tax bill but also boost your long-term investment returns. Seek the guidance of an experienced tax advisor when planning your tax strategies.
