Valley Patriots Continue Winning Streak At Lazbuddie

The Valley Patriots began District play last week with Lazbuddie, and took a big win in Friday night's 2-A North Zone opener.

The Patriots scored three times before the first buzzer.

Tim Clardy rushed for 152 yards, including touchdown runs of 64, 2, 15 and 43 yards. Clardy is a second team player.

Valley backfield starters Will and Tommy Williams saw little play due to injuries, as eight Valley backs saw extended action.

Coach Ted Giddens said, "We have seven or eight backs we can give the ball, and we don't have to worry about it."

The Valley passing attack was almost as impressive with Quarterback Craig Cox hitting foot-footed Ricky Jeeter for gains of 24, 13 and 12 yards. Jeeter snagged four aerials for 55 yards for the night and Cox took 87 yards in the air.

Coach Giddens said, "I was really impressed with our intensity. For us to win, we have to play with lots of intensity."

The Patriot defense, which allowed its opponents only 76.7 yards per game so far, was in top form against the Longhorns, giving up only four total off-

sive yards. The Patriots scored their third tally of the first quarter following another Williams bobble when Clardy scored from 15 yards out with 5:15 remaining.

Rex Morgan was named Player of the Week by the Amarillo Daily News for Class 1-A.

Rex is the starting safety on the Valley defense which allowed just four yards of total offense in the Patriots' 46-0 win over Lazbuddie. The 5-10, 155 pounder was credited with nine assisted and three unassisted tackles. Morgan also made an aerobic interception as he was falling to the ground, and rushed for 50 yards as a fullback. "That's the second game in a row Morgan has played like this," said Coach Ted Giddens.

Valley made 22 first downs to the Longhorns' one. The Patriots rushed for 412 yards to the Longhorns' 27. The Pats passed for 87 yards while the Horns got 25. The Patriots received nine penalties for 55 yards and the Longhorns got one for five yards.

Child Safety Seminar To Be Held In Silverton October 3

Betty Borgia, area coordinator for the National Child Safety Council, will present a program Monday, October 3, at 7:00 p.m. in the Silverton School Auditorium. She will speak and answer questions.

The public is invited to attend this program, and parents of young children are urged to attend.

National Child Safety Council is a tax-exempt non-profit organization that for 30 years has worked with law enforcement departments and elementary school children. For several years the children in Silverton have been provided with child safety and drug education materials sponsored by the Briscoe County Sheriff's Department.

Top law advisors on the board and council of NCSC say that 150,000 children are disappearing in the United States each year, many from the rural areas where children are not taught as carefully as the city youngsters are to beware of strangers. This figure does not include runaways or parental abductions. Also, according to the July 1983 issue of Readers Digest, "Children For Sale: Pornography's Dark New World—For pleasure and profit, pornographers have murdered the childhood of a million girls and boys."

It appears the most desirable age of children taken is five to nine years. Therefore, the child safety program from kindergarten to fourth grade this year will emphasize "Dangerous Strangers" and each child will receive a booklet entitled "How To Tell The Good Guys From The Bad Guys."

Nationwide NCSC has offered a child fingerprint procedure. This is a strictly voluntary program. Parents must sign consent form and only one set of prints is taken and turned over

Farmers Being Required To Harvest For PIK

ASCS requires farmers to obtain loans on 1983 cotton for PIK. Cotton producers in Hall County who are eligible to receive their PIK from Commodity Credit Corporation stocks will have to obtain price support loans on their 1983 production to satisfy 40% of their PIK needs, according to Billy Don Atkinson, County Executive Director. The other 60% will come from cotton already in CCC inventory.

Mr. Atkinson said, "The loans will then be redeemed and sold to the CCC for PIK. Producers who have no 1983 crop cotton for harvest or those who had insufficient cotton for harvest to satisfy their PIK needs will receive their PIK from CCC stock."

Hall County's cotton producers need about 1,582 bales of their 1983 cotton crop to use as collateral which can be redeemed and sold to CCC for PIK

purposes. About 4,898 bales of cotton will come from CCC stock.

The producers are eligible for PIK because they reduced their upland cotton acreage beyond the regular acreage reduction and land diversion program requirements.

Under the special purchase program for cotton, the CCC required about 780,000 bales of cotton which, when added to present inventory, is not enough to meet the needs of the PIK program.

List of Eligible Voters Is Posted For ASC Committee Elections

A list of the names of all known eligible persons to receive ballots in the upcoming annual ASC committee election soon will be available at the county ASCS office. Farmers will begin nominating candidates for the ASC election on October 6.

ASCS, an agency of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, is responsible for farm program administration. On the local level, ASCS operates under a farmer-elected committee system. This year's elections will be by mail ballot between November 25 and December 5. Voters may also get ballots at the county ASCS office.

Anyone who meets the following requirements is eligible to vote in these farmer committee elections: any individual of legal voting age with an interest in a farm as owner, tenant, or share-

cropper who is eligible to participate in any ASCS program.

Several general provisions relate to ASCS voter eligibility. The spouse of an eligible voter is also eligible to vote. Any person under legal voting age can vote if he or she runs a farm, and a legal guardian who runs a farm for a child can vote for the child. No person can be denied the right to vote because of race, sex, age, color, religion, or national origin.

The spouse of an eligible voter is also eligible to vote.

A person may cast a ballot in any county in which he or she is an eligible ASCS voter, but he or she cannot vote in more than one community in the county. If an eligible voter has separate farm interests in more than one community in the same county, special care will be taken to see that only one ballot is issued to that voter.

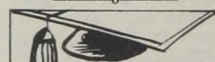
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FOUR WIN HONORS AT TEXAS 4-H FASHION SHOW

Four young fashion designers captured first-place honors at the 1983 Texas 4-H fashion show held in San Antonio recently.

Winners in the four main categories include Annie Mellem, Dallam County, active sportswear; Milissa Lehr, Concho County, non-tailored daywear and cotton division winner; Jacqua Nance, Dawson County, tailored daywear and wool and mohair division winner; and DeAna Dohman, Calhoun County, evening and specialty wear.

To compete in the show, a 4-H member must have completed a clothing project and won first place in local, county and district shows. About 11,000 youth participate in 4-H clothing projects annually.

IMPACT OF 4-H VOLUNTEERS

The value of the time and out-of-pocket expenses that volunteer leaders donate to the 4-H program is estimated at about \$1 billion a year in the U. S.

Almost 620,000 volunteer adult, junior and teen leaders assist the 4-H program across the nation.

Texas boasts some 22,000 adult and teen leaders. These leaders each donate about 220 hours per year to 4-H. Their contributions deserve special recognition, and that's part of the reason for National 4-H Week, October 2-8, notes the state 4-H program leader with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System
