## Valley Girls Split A Pair; Boys Win Two In Basketball

The varsity Lady Patriots hosted Tulia Tuesday night of last week and took a defeat. Tulia was on top all the way. The first period ended 21-10; halftime ended 32-22; the third period was 47-32, and the final score was 71-39 in the visitors' favor.

Calvert, Green, Hewett, S. Price, L. Price and Morrison were scoreless. Fulbright dropped in four field goals, six free shots for a total of 14 points. Brittan hit five field goals, two free shots and ended with a total of 12 points. Johnson hit one field goal, one free shot for a total of three. Devonna Smith dropped in three field goals, no free shots for a total of six points. Maupin hit two field goals, no free shots for a total of four points.

On Friday, the girls played Silverton there. This was a very even game. The first period ended 8-all; at halftime it was 27-21 in Valley's favor; the third period ended 23-32 and the score was knotted at 42-42 at the end of regulation play. In the overtime period which followed, the Lady Patriots dumped in five more points while the Owlettes were scoreless, and Valley took the conference victory 47-42.

Price girls didn't get into the action. Fulbright dropped in one, hit thirteen free shots for a total of 15 points. Morrison hit two free shots. Brittan hit two from the floor and two from the line for a total of six. Johnson hit five from the field, no free shots and totaled 10 points. Devonna hit one field goal, three free shots, for a total of five points. Maupin hit seven free shots. D'anna Smith dropped in one from the field.

In the boys game with Tulia at Valley, the Patriots started off behind and trailed 11-15 at the first bell. At halftime, they had gone ahead 30-26, continued to lead 43-32 at the end of three, and finished with a 66-54 lead at the final buzzer.

Clardy hit eight field goals, four free shots for a total of 20 points. Silva didn't see action, Martin and Taylor didn't hit. Williams hit six from the field, six free shots for 16 points. Saul dropped in two and hit five free shots for a total of nine. Phelps hit three from the floor, three from the line and totaled nine points. Morrison hit two from the floor for four. Cox hit two from the floor. Beavers hit one from the floor.

The game at Silverton Friday night was handled pretty easily. Valley had control of the game from the very first, and led 9-2 at the end of the first period; 29-10 at halftime; 41-18 at the end of three periods, and finished ahead 64-28.

**The Superintendent's Corner**

The Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities—a guide for Texas property—gives factual and useful information to property taxpayers in Texas. According to the guide, the valorem tax system in Texas used by approximately 30 taxing units which include school districts, cities, counties, and special districts.

During the 1985 year, taxing units will levy an estimated \$1.5 billion in property taxes. Approximately 50 percent of the levy is collected by school districts, 20 percent by cities, 10 percent by counties, and 10 percent by special districts.

An earlier analysis of the 1984 school tax levy shows that business properties including utilities paid 40.1 percent of the taxes statewide, while owners of oil, gas and other mineral reserves paid 12.5 percent. Homeowners accounted for 30 percent of the tax levy, and apartment type residences paid 4.6 percent. Acreage land used essentially for farming interests accounted for 6.2 percent of the total state bill.

According to a 1983 property value study conducted by the State Property Tax Board, the total state value of taxable property was \$637 billion. The study shows that homeowners accounted for \$212 billion of the total while commercial industry, minerals (oil and gas) followed closely. Personal business and farming acreage headed a list of nine additional categories which were substantial but less in amount.

Taxable property values in the Turkey-Quitaque school district during the 1983 year totaled \$4 million while the total market value for the district was \$11 million.

If you are not receiving the following things picture.

- THINGS YOU CAN DO:**
1. Make sure the TV and Valley Translator Station.
  2. Check antenna wire, on antenna and TV set. If broken, rusty or corroded, fix on each end. Fix, reattach wire does not touch each other.
  3. Make sure antenna wire is VHF.
  4. Plug TV set directly into extension cord, make sure it is grounded.
  5. Antenna wire should be at least 6 feet from power lines. Feet will cause some loss in signal.
  6. Antenna should be just above trees, clearing any trees, sometimes just moving the antenna a few feet can improve the signal.

**THINGS YOU CAN DO WITH YOUR TV:**

1. Change antenna wire to UHF.
2. Have tuner on TV checked. If it has a hard time tuning a channel, it may be out of alignment.
3. If your TV set uses strips are for the right channel.
4. Make sure your antenna is properly installed.

5. If part of your present antenna is old, it should be replaced.

**FOR THOSE OF YOU WHO CAN AFFORD IT, THE NEW TV SET IS THE ANSWER.**

1. Buy a new TV set. Chassis in size you want. Make sure it has the latest tuning channels in the USA.

2. Buy a new antenna. 40-70 with a BLONDER TO used with RG-59 cable to your TV.

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### The Superintendent's Corner

The Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities—a guide for Texas property—gives factual and useful information to property taxpayers in Texas. According to the guide, the ad valorem tax system in Texas is used by approximately 3,100 taxing units which include school districts, cities, counties, and special districts.

During the 1985 year, taxing units will levy an estimated \$9 billion in property taxes. Approximately 50 percent of this levy is collected by school districts, 20 percent by cities, 18 percent by counties, and 12 percent by special districts.

An earlier analysis of the 1983 school tax levy shows that business properties including utilities paid 40.1 percent of the taxes statewide, while owners of oil, gas and other mineral reserves paid 12.5 percent. Home owners accounted for 30 percent of the tax levy, and apartment type residences paid 4.6 percent. Acreage land used essentially for farming interests accounted for 6.2 percent of the total state bill.

According to a 1983 property value study conducted by the State Property Tax Board, the total state value of taxable property was \$637 billion. The study shows that homeowners accounted for \$212 billion of the total while commercial industry, minerals (oil and gas) followed closely. Personal business and farming acreage headed a list of nine additional categories which were substantial but less in amount.

Taxable property values in the Turkey-Quitaque school district during the 1983 year totaled \$44 million while the total market value for the district was \$109

million. The difference in the two figures are accounted for through the various exemptions such as homestead and tax relief for farm productivity. Additionally, state figures from the Tax Board claim that the school district levies taxes on approximately 82 percent of the taxable value thus claiming less value than the state market value figures. This is consistent with statewide tallies, especially rural farming areas.

The largest category of property taxes in the school district in 1983 was acreage used for farming. This accounted for \$14 million, followed by homeowners at \$9 million. Other categories contributing substantially to the total value were utilities, commercial industry, vehicles and banks.

Two of the most exciting basketball games of the season were played by Valley teams last week. The first game was played Tuesday night when Valley boys defeated a very fine Tulia team and then on Friday night the girls defeated Silvertown in a first district contest.

Both games were contests exemplified by good coaching, tremendous floor play, and excellent shooting. In defeating Silvertown, the Valley girls were hot from the free throw line evidenced by the hitting of 27 of 36 attempts. It has been a long time since a Valley team scored that many points from the charity line.

Fan support demonstrated by its attendance and cheering was a big help in bringing both teams through to victory. That means a lot to the players.

Beginning with October 1985, the required exit test will be administered to all eleventh grade students for the first time.

If you are not receiving a perfect picture at this time, please read the following things that YOU can do to improve your picture.

#### THINGS YOU CAN DO WITH NO COST TO YOU

1. Make sure the TV antenna is pointed directly towards the Valley Translator Station.
2. Check antenna wire. Be sure both ends of wire are secure on antenna and TV set. Make sure both ends of wire are not broken, rusty or corroded. If they are, cut off about an inch of wire on each end. Fix, reattach to antenna and TV set, making sure wire does not touch each other on terminals of antenna or set.
3. Make sure antenna wire is attached to UHF, terminal, NOT VHF.
4. Plug TV set directly into wall socket. If you have to use an extension cord, make sure it is heavy duty wire.
5. Antenna wire should be less than 40 feet long. All over 40 feet will cause some loss in signal.
6. Antenna should be just high enough to have line of sight to station, clearing any trees, buildings or other things. However, sometimes just moving the antenna up or down or to the side just a few feet can improve the signal.

#### THINGS YOU CAN DO WITH A LITTLE COST INVOLVED

1. Change antenna wire every two or three years. Make sure it's UHF wire.
2. Have tuner on TV cleaned once or twice a year or when you have a hard time tuning a certain channel in.
3. If your TV set uses strips and not a dial, make sure the strips are for the right channels. They are 54-56-58 and Ch. 60.
4. Make sure your antenna is designed for UHF channels 40 to 70.
5. If part of your present antenna is missing, bent or just plain old, it should be replaced.

#### FOR THOSE OF YOU WHO WANT THE VERY BEST AND CAN AFFORD IT, THE FOLLOWING IS RECOMMENDED

1. Buy a new TV set. Make sure you are getting the best chassis in size you want. Make sure it has the newest color tube, using smaller dots and a lot more of them per square inch. Make sure it has the latest tuner capable of tuning in all available channels in the USA.
2. Buy a new antenna. The very best is a JERROLD CYD 40-70 with a BLONDER TONGUE (ABLE U2-75 pre-AMP) to be used with RG-59 cable to your TV set.
