## Quitaque Quest Mountain Bike Race October 26

 Quitaque Quest Mountain Bike Race will be held again on October 26 and will become part of a cup series. Race organizers for a number of mountain bike races in the West Texas area have agreed to hold a series of bike races and name over-all winners at the end of the racing season.  
 The series, called West Texas Chainbreaker Mountain Bike Race Series, will comprise of three races at Palo Duro Canyon, two races in the Lubbock area, and Quitaque Quest at Caprock Canyons State park for the 1996 series. The cup series gives participants in all racing categories an opportunity to treat biking with a tournament atmosphere. A championship will be determined, based upon accumulated points, following a racing event at Buffalo Lake in Lubbock, on December 8.  
 Riders can acquire points by participating in the six events and must compete in five races. Points are given thru 19th place with Quitaque Quest participants gaining double points. Double points for the race at Quitaque causes riders to view Quitaque Quest as a very important race and should motivate top riders to visit Quitaque on October 26.  
 Although the Cup Series has been newly organized, the potential is almost unlimited. There are discussions currently taking place to expand to include the areas around Abilene and San Angelo.

## First Cotton Bale Ginned At Flomot

The Flomot Gin, owned by Carmen and Roger Lee, has ginned their first cotton for the 1996 season.  
 The cotton ginned was two bales from the Coy Franks farm whose cotton was in the hail last week.  
 The burr extracted cotton was stripped on October 12 and ginned on October 13, 1996. The two bales weighed 505 pounds each with 1820 pounds of seed from the two bales. Lint turned out 30.24 percent.

## Callahan Announces Candidacy As Write-In For Hall County Sheriff

Glenn Callahan, who is running for Sheriff of Hall County on a write-in ballot makes his statement this week as follows:  
 I was first certified as a Peace Officer in 1984, and have worked for the Texas Department of Criminal Justice for the past 5 1/2 years. If I am elected as your Sheriff, I will give the citizens of Hall County a professional Sheriff's Department in every way.  
 Each person I hire in the Sheriff's Department will be of good moral character and integrity. If anyone in my department should fail to conduct themselves properly, I will terminate that person immediately. I will write a Standard Operating Procedures Manual setting forth what is expected of each person in my department so if the need to terminate someone arises, it will not be a problem to do so.  
 Some of you have asked, if I am elected, whether I will terminate certain individuals who are currently employed by the department. It is my understanding that every employee working under the Sheriff is automatically terminated when the current Sheriff's term ends. Of course, there may be some who are good employees and I would consider hiring them.  
 If I am elected your Sheriff, I, and each employee working under me, will work for the citizens of Hall County every day I believe that a dollar's worth of work for a dollar's worth of pay each day is only fair, and the right thing to do. I will not allow any officer who is on duty to just sit around whether it is at the office or in a restaurant. If an officer is on duty, we will be on patrol, which is our duty and obligation to the citizens of Hall

## Saturday, Bicycle Parade and Race

**HEY KIDS!!!** Get those bicycles located and flats fixed. There is going to be a bicycle parade and race. As part of the Fall Foliage Festival on Saturday, the Caprock Bike Club is sponsoring a Bicycle Parade beginning at 10 a.m. The parade is not limited just to kids or adults who are going to participate in the race, but to anyone who wants to ride as part of the parade. Get those bikes decorated and come to the bank at least 10 minutes before 10 a.m. The Parade will leave the bank and proceed down Main Street and will end at the old Co-Op gin lot. It is going to be fun!  
 Registration for the bike race will begin immediately follow-

## ing the Parade. Parents or guardians must be present during registration to sign a Release and Liability Waiver. Any parent wishing their child to participate without using a helmet must sign an agreement form. All these forms may be signed during the week prior to the race by contacting Jannell Smith at the Bank Building. Although not required, it is highly recommended that all riders wear a helmet. All participants must wear a shirt and closed toed shoes.

Riders will participate in a boys and girls division and will be classified according to age. Participants who are 6 years old or younger will compete in an age group, as will 7 and 8 years old, 9 and 10, and the oldest group will be 11 and 12 age group.  
 A race course has been laid out and prepared on the Co-Op gin lot and riders will be in view of spectators for most of the event. The course length, .6 of a mile, will be ridden by the 11/12 age group three times, while the 9/10 age riders will ride two loops. The 7 and 8 age group will only need to ride the course for one loop. The younger group, 6 and under will ride a special course of their own. All riders can expect to experience a water hole, rough ground and sharp curves.  
 In addition to 1st, 2nd and 3rd place ribbons, all participants will receive a participant ribbon. A number of businesses have donated gifts in support of this biking event. Items such as water bottles, air pump, bike basket, ice cream, sundaes, and other good things will be awarded to participants. Cokes and power ade will be available to the riders.

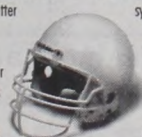
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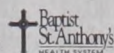

**TAHC Changes TB, Bangs Regulations**

from TSCRA News Update  
At its meeting last month, the Texas Animal Health Commission adopted changes in its Tuberculosis and Brucellosis regulations, effective September 30.

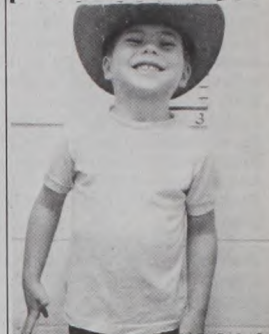
Cattle infected with tuberculosis will now be branded with a "T" on the hip, rather than on the left jaw, and indemnity will be provided for non-lesioned animals destroyed as a result of tuberculosis testing.

The tuberculosis regulations now include a "designated pen" as another destination for sexually intact cattle entering from a foreign country. The change also provides for these cattle, as well as those entering a quarantined feedlot, to be accompanied by a VS 1-27 permit and allow them to be "S" branded either prior to or on arrival at their destinations.

A change in the bovine brucellosis regulations will remove the E Permit requirement from steers and spayed heifers entering the state and sexually intact cattle moving to slaughter, quarantined feedlots or designated pens.
