Deposits Up At Beginning Of 1991 For Hall County

Hall County entered 1991 with more money on deposit in the two banking institutions than was on deposit the year before, according to figures released in statements of condition of Memphis State Bank and First Bank and Trust.

According to the year-end financial reports dated December 31, 1990, the two Hall County Banks had \$55,019,000.00 up some \$3,404,000.00 from the figure on December 31, 1989.

Possibly one of the reasons for this increase was the closing of the Memphis Branch of First Savings and Loan in the fall of 1990. Hall County funds held in savings institutions like First Gibraltar Savings or First Savings and Loan are not separately reported on quarterly financial reports.

However, Hall County farmers were blessed with good peanut, cotton, and hay crops and cattle prices were good throughout 1990 so some of the increases could be credited to better agriculture revenues.

Total assets figures for the two banking institutions also climbed to \$59,767,000.00 up from \$56,284,000.00 at the end of 1989. This is an increase of \$3,483,000.00.

Showing a very slight decline is the total loans figures of the two banks. Hall Counties owed \$21,597,000.00 at the beginning of 1991 while they owed \$21,867,000.00 at the beginning of 1990.

Quitaque Lion's Club Distributes Flags

The Quitaque Lions Club has distributed flags to the city merchants and churches who will fly them until the war in the Middle East is over. The flags are usually flown on special occasions as a service to the community. This service is offered by the Lions Club and paid for by the merchants. The flags are flying daily now in Quitaque as a show of support for our brave men and women who are serving in Operation Desert Storm.

The Lions Club reminds all who fly our nation's flag that care must be taken to always display it properly. To do less desecrates the colors of liberty. The flag should be flown in the hours from sunup until sunset. It should only be displayed at night if it is directly lit. The flag is not to be flown in inclement weather except in cases of national mourning. All of the codes of flag etiquette should be observed at all times.

The Valley Lady Patriots marched into this week looking for a victory against the Lady Cyclones of Memphis. A victory would assure them the District Crown for the second consecutive year. In the first quarter, the Lady Patriots eased to a 13-0 lead as Tessa Mullin got off to a fast start scoring 11 of the 13 points. In the second quarter, the Lady Patriots stretched the lead to 10 points 32-22 as several Lady Patriots hit the scoring column. The third quarter was hard fought, but saw the Lady Patriots cling to a 10 point lead 46-36 going into quarter number 4. With the District Crown on the line, the Lady Patriots turned up the heat on the Lady Cyclones and outscored them in the final quarter 18-9 and clinched the District Championship by a score of 65-44. 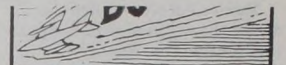
