## "All Kids Count" Task Force Meeting April 5th

The Briscoe, Floyd, Hall and Motley County "All Kids Count" immunization initiative task force will hold its second monthly meeting April 5 at 6:00 p.m. at the High School in Matador.

The purpose of this meeting is to discuss the process of distributing and collecting questionnaires within the four county area. The task force will distribute Needs Assessment questionnaires to parents of young children. Provider questionnaires will be given to administrators of health care facilities and physicians in private or group practice.

The needs assessment will enable the task force to determine where gaps exist in children's health care services. The providers survey will tell them what primary health care services are available for children. The information provided by the health care community will be used to develop a directory of children's health care services.

A scheduling conflict prohibited the winner from being in attendance so this year's award will be made at the school's awards banquet.
