## **Emergency Farm** Loan Applications Being Accepted

"Applications for emergency farm loans caused by excessive rain and flash flooding that occured on August 14, 2005, and continuing are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (F.S.A.) office located in Anson, Richard G. Young said today.

"CALLAHAN is one of 13 in Texas recently named by the Secretary of Agriculture eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from excessive rain and flash flooding that occured on August 14, 2005 and continuing."

Richard G. Young said, "Farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 100% of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue the agricultural business, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 3.75 percent."

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for a F.S.A. emergency loan." Richard G. Young said. Farmers participating in the Federal Crop insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from

# **Piatigorsky Presents Music 'Without Boundaries'**

Again the people of this area have a chance to hear world-class music. On Thursday, Nov. 10th, at 2 p.m. cellist Evan Drachman will be performing a recital in the Women's Clubhouse, Eastland.

For almost a decade this extraordinary artist has appeared at numerous venues throughout the United States and abroad.

A graduate of the Curtis School of Music, cellist Drachman increasingly sought after for his solo and chamber music performances. As President of the Piatigorsky Foundation, New York, he has become a respected authority on presentation of live classical music for diverse audiences everywhere.



# **Emergency Farm Loan Applications Being Accepted**

"Applications for emergency farm loans caused by flooding that occurred on August 9, 2005 and August 10, 2005 are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) office located in Anson," Richard G. Young, Farm Loan Manager, said to-

"Eastland County is one of 6 in Texas recently named by the Secretary of Agriculture eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from flooding that occurred August 9, 2005 through August 10, 2005."

Richard G. Young said, "Farmers may be eligible for loans up to 100% of their actual losses, or the operating loan needed to continue the agricultural business, which ever is less. For farmers un- corporations, partnerships or able to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 3.75 percent."


"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for a FSA emergency loan," Young also said. Farmers participating in the Federal Crop Insurance Program will have to figure in


proceeds from those programs in determining their

"Applications for loans under the emergency designations will be accepted until June 19, 2005, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Richard G. Young said.

FSA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on, farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to farmers who meet U.S. citizenship requirements and to farming cooperatives in which U.S. citizenship requirements are met by holding a majority in-



# **National Geographics Features Adventists And Longevity**

Some of the members of the Seventh-day Adventist Church in Eastland are involved in an on-going study sponsored by the National Institute of Health and carried out by Loma Linda University, California.

This study attempts to determine the role nutrition plays in general good health, long life, and in the prevention of various cancers.

This is a follow-up to a similar study conducted in 1976.

A recent letter from Terry Butler, Dr PH, Adventist Health Study 2, indicated that news from the studies was being shared with the general public.

On Sunday, Oct. 23, ABC News Tonight had a feature called "Living Longer, Living Better.

The National Geographic Magazine (November 2005) has a special feature on Adventists, the Adventist Health Study, and Loma Linda in the cover story "The Secrets of Living Longer." The National Geographic article presents the photos, stories and health secrets of three groups of people (Sardinians, Okinawans and Adventists) who are reputedly some of the healthiest, longest living people in the world.

The section on Adventists briefly describes the background of the Adventist lifestyle, the Sabbath, and the 1976 Health Study.

"In the end the Study reached a stunning conclusion," says Gary Fraser of Loma Linda University."The average Adventist lived four to ten years longer than the average Californian."


