Cable Company Meets With City Officials

The Turkey City Council met in regular session Tuesday, January 10, 1989, at 7 p.m.

One item of business the elected officials were faced with, once again, was the question of Cable Television for

the city of Turkey.

On hand for the meeting was president of Mission Cable Company, Jay O'Neal and Paul Freeman, Chief Operation Officer, as well as Ray Moran owner of KJTV, Channel 34 and The Valley

Translator, and Brad Moran.

Mayor Hubert Price opened the meeting and turned it over to O'Neal and Moran to make their presentations.

Moran opened the meeting with a statement indicating negotiations are underway with Mission Cable to buy the Translator from him. He then stressed his problems of collecting TV dues in the area, and his reasoning for possibly scrambling a portion of the channels currently being received through the translator, and requiring subscribers to obtain a descrambler from him for a \$200 deposit, and increasing the monthly dues to \$8 per month, from the current \$65 per year charge.

O'Neal stated his company is in the process of buying forty cable systems in our surrounding area, including Quitaque, Silverton and Matador. "If we can work out a deal with Moran to purchase the translator, and/or if the City Council approves our cable system, then we're ready to build. It will take about two months to build the system here and two more months of paper work. We're looking at 120 days from start to finish," he said. He went on to add the City of Turkey would receive a two percent franchise tax payment.

The council members showed a major concern that if the city did approve the cable system, the homes in the country would not receive any signal for their television viewing. This was put to rest by both Moran and O'Neal. "No, they would not receive cable, but they would continue to receive the signal off the translator," O'Neal said. "The cable lines would extend one-quarter mile outside the city limits, anything past that, (depending on the amount of homes in one area) would be laid out on a 50-50 expense. Rural residents would have to pay half of the lay-out expense

Turkey Has Rash Of Grass Fires

The Turkey Volunteer Fire Department was again kept busy Monday afternoon fighting grass fires within the city, both a direct result of trash burning.

One of the fires raged out of control for a time, whipping flames around two homes, burning everything in its path, except the homes. Extensive damage was done to the wooden fence around the back yard of the Leon Lane home. Heat and smoke scorched the front of the Lane home, as the fire charred all the shrubbery and grass.

The home of Linda Ferguson was, at one time, totally surrounded by flames, yet she received no heat or smoke

damage to her home.

The other grass fire was at the home of Jan and Joy Turner.

Once again, Fire Chief Rex Fuston is asking the "residents of Turkey and the area to please use extreme caution when burning trash or grass. Persons should stay with the fire until they are absolutely sure it is out. The winds normally calm down late at night or early morning, this is probably the safest time to burn trash or grass. Screens should be placed over trash barrels, and persons should soak areas around homes, garages, and outlying areas before burning off grass, to prevent the fire from spreading."

Guest Home Destroyed By Blaze

The cause of the fire, believed to have started in the basement, has not been yet determined. The blaze was discovered by Mr. Guest, as the home began to fill with smoke.

Predator Training Program To Be In Silverton

The Texas Department of Agriculture will have a Predator Management Training Program at 6 p.m., Thursday, February 9, 1989, at the Briscoe County Show Barn in Silverton.

The session will include instruction on proper identification of causes of predation, alternate methods of predator control and M-44 sodium cyanide applicator certification training.

To continue use of M-44 sodium cyanide, all applicators certified before April 18, 1988, must take this course and be recertified. The training leading to M-44 sodium cyanide certification is free. Certification also requires a private applicator license, a noncommercial applicator license or a commercial applicator license, to purchase state-limited-use pesticides.


