

AUSTIN - Federal judges last week annulled the March primaries in three Texas congressional districts where race was ruled to have been the main factor in drawing boundaries.

The panel of three judges all appointed by Republican presidents - approved new, more compactly shaped districts. Redrawing those districts affected the shape and makeup of seven contiguous districts in the Houston area and six in the Dallas area.

So, the panel ordered special elections in those 13 districts set for Nov. 5, the same day as the general election for the rest of the state. The special elections will be open to all candidates of either party, and runoffs will be Dec. 10.

But, the redistricting plan did not sit well with House Speaker Pete Laney and Attorney General Dan Morales, both Democrats. The officials were contemplating an appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court last week to overturn the lower court decision.

Laney and Morales said voter confusion and unnecessary shifting of boundary lines will be key arguments if they appeal the order. Laney, who had a plan that would have changed the shape of only nine districts, said an early analysis of the court order is "more intrusive than necessary." Morales said only six districts need be changed.

Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock, a Democrat, had asked the judges not to take action and instead leave the matter to the 1997 Legislature. After the panel approved the new boundaries, Bullock praised their efforts. "The plan does not smack of politics or needlessly change boundaries that had already been set," he told the Austin American-Statesman.

Minimal changes were made to the two black majority districts in Dallas, but a largely Hispanic

Principals to Receive Cash Some Texas public school principals will be getting more than a jolt of self esteem for their role in improving their campuses. They will receive cash awards of up to

In the fall, principals of the state's most improved schools will receive checks - to use as they wish - based on the school's rating and the criteria being developed by a panel appointed by Gov. George W. Bush. The criteria are to be completed by Sept. 1.

"It's a check written to the principal. There are no strings attached," Criss Cloudt of the Texas Education Agency told the Associated Press.

Under the Principal Performance Incentives Program - part of the sweeping education bill passed by the 1995 Legislature - \$5 million will be disbursed. The program was tacked onto S.B. 1 by Rep. Kent Grusendorf, R- Arlington.

Some teachers, however, criticized the program because it left insolvent the Texas Successful Schools Awards System, another student performance-based program that did not focus on principals.

Drivers Skirting Insurance Law Many Texas drivers are finding illegal ways to skirt a state law that requires them to carry liability car

insurance all year. The Austin American-Statesman analyzed state data and found that about 21 percent of drivers involved in accidents last year were not insured or their insurance status

was unknown. One way consumers avoid paying costly premiums is to purchase a six- or 12-month policy and then cancel it after a month - long enough to receive their proof of insurance card that allows them to renew their driver's license and vehicle registration or obtain an inspection sticker.

Another method cheaters use to acquire an insurance card is to purchase a one-month from businesses that advertise them in the telephone book.

Lack of enforcement is part of the problem. Lawmakers have rejected enforcement proposals as too expensive for the state, too burdensome on insurers and too heartless toward low-income drivers, the American-Statesman reported.

Men compete in races of 20 and 50 kilometers (12 to 30 miles), women in 10 kilometers (about six miles). The races are scheduled later this month.

Race-walkers move with a rolling rhythm. With each step, one foot lands on a leg that is completely straight, then rolls ahead as the leg is propelled by swinging the hip. Arms bent at 90 degrees pump up and down in rhythm with the gait. The speed achieved is remarkable. If you watch Olympic race walks, you will agree: Race walkers must know how to take care of their feet. How about you? House Prepares For August Recess

Despite very long hours and some heated debate, the House of Representatives made significant breakthroughs this week in ending gridlock and passing important legislation with strong bipartisan support.

Health Insurance Reform Bill is Passed: Self-Employed **Deductibility Raised**

to 80% On Thursday, August 1, the House passed the Health Coverage Availability and Affordability Act, legislation that begins to reform the nation's health care insurance system. The bill passed by a vote of 421-2.

In an effort to achieve health insurance reform, the Congress focused on

so-called "portability" reform, a guarantee that employees would not lose their health insurance because of a job change or unemployment.

Under the House and Senate agreement, insurance companies would generally be prohibited from denying health coverage to workers who change or lose their jobs, and it would prevent insurers from excluding coverage for pre-existing conditions for more than

I am particularly pleased to report that selfemployed individuals will be able to deduct 80% of health insurance costs.

For many years I have supported legislation that would provide farmers and other self-employed individuals with the abil-

ity to deduct 100% of their health insurance costs. Increasing the deductibility from 30% to 80% will mean a great deal to farmers in particular.

As a result of this legislation, taxpayers will now be permitted to deduct, as an itemized medical deduction, qualified longterm care expenses, including premiums for such care. In addition, terminally ill and chronically ill individuals will be permitted to receive life insurance benefits prior to death without paying any taxes on such bene-

House Passes Minimum Wage/Tax Cut Bill

In another overwhelmingly bipartisan vote of 354-72, the House approved a bill increasing the minimum wage from \$4.25 an hour to \$5.15. Taken as a whole, I was particularly supportive of the various tax changes in the bill.



BAIRD INDEPEN-DENT SCHOOL DIS-TRICT

Recently the State Auditor published a report entitled "Savings Profile System". Although John Sharp, State Comptroller, questioned the methods used by the state auditor the proposed budget for the Baird ISD 1996/97 budget took into consideration most of the suggestions. The areas where expenses are being trimmed are administrative, maintenance, and extra-curricular. The budget for teaching supplies and materials has been maintained. The budget for expanding technology has been cut significantly during '95 and in the proposed budget for 1996/97. Technology is one area that is regrettable because we will just get further behind.

As patrons look at the proposed budget a logical question would be "If you are cutting all these expenses why is the budget only slightly less than last years budget?" The state legislature has mandated teacher pay raises (95/96 & 96/97) that offset the reduction in expenditures. The proposed budget for 96/97 is \$54,000 less than 1995 with a mandated increase is teacher

salaries of over \$90,000. The state aid to Baird ISD is based on local tax effort. This budget year is the last of the biennium and the next two school years (97/98 & 98/99) state funding will be determined by the local effort in 1996/97. If we do not maintain our present tax rate per \$100 of evaluation BISD would be forced to increase taxes in the next two years to make up for lost state

The Baird ISD is a community service and makes every effort to provide the highest quality education for the least dollars. The budget is a difficult item to understand if you do not work with it every day. Interested patrons are invited to the superintendent's office for a review of the

GRINDING IN THE NIGHT

An estimated one in 20 adults and three in 20 children unconsciously grind their teeth at night. It is the sound of • bruxism. While the noise may disturb spouses or children, it has a far more distressing effect on the sleeper.

Night grinding may be an unconscious effort to correct irregularities of the chewing surfaces of the teeth. Dentists term this a malocclusion. They grind away to eliminate a spot that is too high or to find a comfortable place to fit the upper and lower teeth together.
