Assistant Secretary for Public and Assisted Housing Operations, HUD Washington.


As a result of our local Housing authority Keeping their "house" in order, they have been awarded a



## Driver Loses Life In Accident Friday Morning

A Watkins Motor Lines Driver lost his life Friday morning about six miles east of Baird on I-20.

Ross Bryant Phillips, 57, of Besseman, North Carolina, was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Don Burns at 8:30 a.m. Lewis Aliff, 31, of Crouse, North Carolina, was transported to Hendrick Medical Center by "First Flight" helicopter. Aliff was asleep in the trucks sleep at the time of the crash. It took about 40 minutes for rescuers from Baird Fire Department and Citizens E.M.S. to re-

move Aliss from the wreckage. Both men were ejected from the cab of the 18 wheeler when it struck a six foot embankment.

D.P.S. Trooper David Parkhill said the west bound truck drifted off the road to the right "taking out" 102 feet of guardrail then dropping off a 12 foot creek bank and striking the other side. It appeared that Phillips possibly went to sleep at the wheel, but the accident is still being investigated, Parker said. Callahan County Dispatch received word of the accident at 7:52 a.m.

The Watkins truck was pulling two loaded trailers and both were opened up by the impact

spilling their contents of Adidas Shoes, Automotive Clutch's, and lip balm in the creek and on the service road. A Baird Fire Department spokesman said they had to remove many boxes of shoes from around Aliff before he could be reached to start rescue efforts. The truck had left Dallas earlier Friday morning and it was not known where they were bound.

Aliff was admitted and listed in guarded condition Friday evening at Hendrick where he remained Monday according to a hospital spokesman. Arrangements for Phillips are pending with Carothers Funeral

Home in Gastonia, North Carolina. Local arrangements were handled by Parker Funeral Home in Baird.

Crews worked until late Friday to clear wreckage and load the scattered merchandise into other trailers. Lee's Wrecker Service handled the salvage operation.

Baird Fire Department personnel would like to thank the Texas Department of Transportation employees for their assistance with performing a very difficult rescue.

## Gulf Moisture Cools Our Weathers

Late last week Hurricane Dolly made landfall near Tampico, Mexico, spinning a lot of Gulf moisture across Texas.

The heaviest rains came in South Texas and turned to the west of Eastland County. Abilene on to New Mexico and the Big Bend got anywhere from 2 to 5 inches.

Eastland County got scattered light rains, recording a trace up to about an inch in some locations.

Totals for the weekend included: Cisco .90, Eastland .48, Carbon .30 and Ranger .15.

These were gentle showers, with no wind and only occasional thunder.

At press time Tuesday a lot of clouds were still roaming around Texas, with a cold front stalled out around the Panhandle. But so far there seems to be no trigger to set off the heavy rains needed here to fill tanks, rivers and lakes.

But one thing everyone was enjoying was the early fall weather. Last Friday the temperature fell down to 75, and has only climbed into the 80's since. The nights are cool, down to the high 60's.

All hope this continues, whether we get more rain or not.

## Putnam Man Injured In Accident Tues.

BAIRD-A Putnam man was injured in an accident at the County Precinct yard in Baird just before 1 P.M. Tuesday.

Darrell Jobe 38, was severely burned when an asphalt heater which he was working spewed molten tar on him. Jobe, a county employee was working alone---ran two blocks to the Callahan County CO-OP and asked for help

Tina Atkins, a CO-OP bookkeeper, said a CO-OP dock hand opened the door and said "a man had been burned" and to call for an ambulance. They took the victim around to water hose and started cooling him until Baird Rescue personnel could arrive.

Citizens E.M.S. treated the victim at the scene and then transported about two blocks to "First Flights" landing zone near the Baird Depot. Jobe was flown to Hendrick Hospital in Abilene and was listed in stable condition when he was transferred to Parkland Medical Center in Dallas, according to a Hendrick spokesperson. No other details on his condition were available.

Tommy Holland, Commissioner for Precinct 3 and Jobe's employer said the county was paving Foster Street, a county road just west of the Baird City limits and Jobe was heating the asphalt

for tat project. Holland said it appeared that Jobe had removed a cap from a pipe that was pressurized due to a valve being open, causing the hot liquid to flow on Jobe. He had left Jobe's location shortly before the accident. Jobe has worked for the county approximately 10 years. his father, Foy, is also a long-time employee.



"The Callahan County Teacher's Institute is being held

at Baird this week with fifty to sixty teachers present.

Dr. Cooper of Abilene addressed the teacher's Tuesday in favor of the proposed school tax amendment to constitution, State Superintendent R.B. Cousin delivered and address at 10 a.m.



"Every character in the film is an outcast," says Murphy. "Quasimodo is an outcast because of his looks, Phoebus comes to town to do his duty and become a fugitive, Esmeralda is an outcast because she is a Gypsy."

"The Gargoyles were supposedly carved and discarded by the stone masons because they were imperfect. Even Frolo, through his zealotry, makes himself an outcast."

Many of the film's collaborators made the first of several trips to Paris in the fall of 1993. There they soaked up the atmosphere of Hugo's beloved city and spent three days touring the passageways, hidden rooms, stairwells and towers of the great Cathed

ral Notre Dame. Being there helped the filmmakers realize the size and scope and beauty of the magnificent building, and experience what it must have been like back in the 15th century when it was the centerpiece of the city.

As the story began to take shape, the filmmakers began searching for opportunities to inject fantasy and humor into the story. The inspiration for the film's gargoyles characters came from Victor Hugo himself.

From its beginning, Disney's adaptation of "The Hunchback of Notre Dame" was envisioned as an ambitious musical which would feature new and exciting songs to help tell the story — and a score to set the mood.

## Oil And Gas Reports Mixed

Around the state the latest oil and gas reports are mixed.

According to the Railroad Commission, Texas preliminary May, 1996 crude oil production averaged 1,322,945 barrels daily, down from the 1,382,096 barrels daily average of May, 1995.

Texas oil and gas wells produced 470,743,239 Mcf (thousand cubic ft.) of gas, based upon preliminary production figures for May, 1996. This was up from the May, 1995 gas production total of 469,753,795 Mcf.

Drilling permits for July 1996 were up, however, and July oil and gas completions. In July operators reported 350 oil, 338

gas, 34 injection and four other completions, compared to 345 oil, 319 gas, and 31 injection and other completions during the same month of last year.

The most drilling activity was still in the Midland area (161 permits), but West Central Texas had 69 permits in July, 1996. So oil activity continues - but what oil producers need is a better price.

Locally the Texas Railroad Commission has issued the following reports for May, 1996:

Callahan County: 31,109 barrels of crude oil, 155,082 Mcf of gas  
Eastland County: 37,762 barrels of crude oil, 599,491 Mcf of gas.

AUSTIN — Democratic state Sen. John Montford resigned last week to become chancellor of Texas Tech University in Lubbock.

Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock appointed Republican Sen. Bill Ratliff of Mount Pleasant to replace Montford as chairman of the powerful Senate Finance Committee.

Ratliff, former chairman of the Senate Education Committee, rewrote the state's education law in 1995. Bullock, a Democrat, told the *Austin American-Statesman*, "I'm sick of partisan politics. The extremists in both parties are missing the mainstream Texans. Bill Ratliff works for everyone."

As chancellor, Montford, former Lubbock County district attorney, becomes Texas Tech's chief fundraiser and government liaison.

Montford's departure from the Senate makes his district a prime target for the Republican Party of Texas, said Tom Pauken, state GOP chairman. Now, a GOP majority is possible: Republicans hold 14 of the Senate's 31 seats, and half of the seats are up for election in November.

Montford was elected to the state Senate in 1982. He was roundly praised for his service over the past 14 years. Gov. George W. Bush, who will call a special election in September to fill Montford's seat, said, "I am sorry (Montford) is

leaving the Senate. He has been an unbelievably good member."

Anne Marie Kilday, spokeswoman for the state Democratic Party, said "It is Texas Tech University's gain and the entire state of Texas' loss."

Montford, 53, said he sees himself at Tech for five or six years.

### Laney Appeals Redistrict Order

House Speaker Pete Laney asked the U.S. Supreme Court last week to overturn an Aug. 6 federal court order to redraw boundaries and set special elections in 13 Texas congressional districts.

In his appeal, Laney argued that redistricting is a "legislative duty" and that state legislators should be allowed to redraw the boundaries during the 1997 Legislative session, beginning in January.

Laney has said that special elections with Dec. 10 runoffs would be confusing to voters. And, he said, the panel of three federal judges redrew more districts than necessary to correct the three districts in Dallas and Houston declared unconstitutional because of "racial gerrymandering."

"I hope the mid-election confusion and expense the judges have caused in 13 districts within 28 counties can be eliminated and elections can be held as planned," Laney was quoted in the *Dallas Morning News*.

### Slots Banned in Bingo Halls

The Texas Lottery Commission ordered all bingo license holders to move "eight-liner" slot-type gambling machines from their bingo halls by Sept. 1.

Billy Rhea, security director of the commission, said the machines violate state law, which bars other forms of gambling at bingo halls.

Any halls that have the machines after Sept. 1 could lose their licenses and the operators turned over to law enforcement agencies for prosecution.

Under state law, gambling de-

vices are legal as long as they pay no more than 10 times the cost of a single play or \$5, whichever is less.

In some of the banned machines, a dollar can be inserted and credits can be built up to hundreds of dollars.

### Insurance Case Gets Green Light

The Texas Supreme Court, in a ruling last week, denied a request by Allstate and Farmers Insurance companies to dismiss a lawsuit alleging the companies overcharged customers more than \$100 million.

Six South Texans brought the suit over the companies' practice of "double rounding" insurance premiums to the nearest dollar. The companies divided the annual premiums into two six-month payments and rounded the payments again to the nearest dollar.

Insurance Commissioner Elton Bomer has clarified the rules for calculating premiums, and has disallowed double rounding. But the plaintiffs obtained court permission to pursue a class-action lawsuit on behalf of millions of Texans who were covered over the past decade by Allstate and Farmers.

### Other Capital Highlights

■ About 1.3 million Texas children under age 18 have no health insurance, and state officials are looking for ways to help parents who can't afford coverage. Texas Health Commissioner David Smith said it would cost nearly \$1 billion to insure those youngsters. Of the billion dollars, \$300 to \$400 million might come through some type of health premium subsidy provided by the state.

■ The Texas Commission on Judicial Efficiency has forwarded a list of proposals to lawmakers to consider in efforts to improve the state's judicial system. One proposal is to raise state judges' pay 30 percent. Doing so would cost taxpayers about \$16 million a year. Another proposal would require the state to fully fund all state courts.

## Guest Slot By HVO

Congress passed health care reform legislation on Aug. 1st and the President signed it Wednesday.

It could be a model case to demonstrate how special interests and partisan politics play into these things.

The final bill has good points and some not so good.

The Republicans are touting passage of the bill as a major victory, while the Democrats, while not happy with the finished product, say that it's better than nothing.

Many are disappointed that the "sweeping reform" health care package still does not have any provisions for mental illness. Despite coordinated, bipartisan leadership from Senators Domenici and Wellstone, the support of many members of Congress and the President as well as heroic efforts by the national members of the NAMI (National Alliance for Mental Illness), Congress ultimately settled for legislation that once again abandoned those with mental illness.

Late in July, House and Senate reached a compromise on legislation to curb some of the worst abuses by health insurers. The House okayed the compromise with only two dissenting votes and the Senate unanimously passed it the next day. Democrats opposed Medical Savings Accounts, pushed by the Republicans, and compromised on that provides a four-year, limited test.

The new law protects those who want to change jobs are start a business without losing their present coverage, and also limits pre-existing condition exclusions.

Listed on the "bad" side of the bill are provisions which criminalize transfers of assets to qualify for Medicaid.

A disappointing omission is protection by mental health coverage. In its passage of the original bill, the Senate approved an amendment sponsored by Sens. Pete Domenici and Paul Wellstone, which required that benefits for mental health and substance abuse be comparable to medical benefits. Pierce lobbying by the business community, who claimed it would increase costs drastically, killed the mental health provision in conference negotiations.

Just prior to the final vote on the conference report, Cong. Stark (D-Calif.) moved to "recommit the conference report to the committee" with instructions to modify it to provide mental health insurance parity. His recommitment motion failed 228-198, so the measure passed without that parity.

The Texas Congressional vote: All Republicans except Stockman voted NO for recommitment.

All Democrats except Geren and Stenholm (who voted NO) voted to recommit. (Wilson did not vote).



### CHANGES WITH AGE

Choosing shoes that accommodate broadened feet may help relieve problems created by years of wearing too tight shoes. Among other changes, the loss of natural padding makes elements of the feet more susceptible to stresses that cause painful conditions. Chronic dry skin can develop painful cracks, often in the heels. The cracks may invite infection.



## Monster Cats In Rivers And Lakes Of Southeast

Some of the biggest freshwater monsters in the United States roam the rivers and lakes of the Southeast. On July 5, 1996, Bill McKinley of Elkmont, Ala., caught an 111-pound blue catfish from an intake pond next to Brown's Ferry Nuclear Plant on the Tennessee River near Athens, Ala. The International Game Fish Association and the National Freshwater Fishing Hall of Fame probably will certify this fish as the biggest blue catfish ever caught on hook and line in the United States. Forty-five minutes after McKinley took his huge catfish, another angler caught a 108-pound blue cat from the same lake.

Few anglers go in search of these monster cats of the deep, because most sportsmen prefer to catch cats for a fish fry. Delicious to eat, the catfish has gained such popularity that many farmers raise them like chickens.

But you don't have to go to the grocery store. You easily can catch your own. In this book, *The Masters' Secrets of Catfishing*, John E. Phillips, a life-long catfisherman and outdoor writer, offers time-tested secrets for taking big cats or a mess of cats for the table. Catch

\*flathead cats by gravelling to pull big cats out of underwater caves, according to Gerald McNairy of Athens, Ala. "The water needs to be between 64 and 70 degrees to try this tactic. I use a cane pole, a hook and a big net to block the flathead cat's escape

\*river cats by pinpointing where small run-offs and little feeder creeks bring mud-stained water into a river. The mud-stained water washes

insects, worms and grubs into the river as well as microorganisms that cause baitfish, which attract catfish, to concentrate on the edges of the mud line.

\*shallow-flat cats off the main river channel by fishing with a float to keep your bait just off the bottom or an egg-shaped slip sinker with a barrel swivel, 20 inches of leader and a No. 6 hook on the bottom.



**GRINDING IN THE NIGHT**  
An estimated one in 20 adults and three in 20 children unconsciously grind their teeth at night. It is the sound of bruxism. While the noise may disturb spouses or children, it has a far more distressing effect on the sleeper. Nocturnal grinding can exert thousands of pounds of pressure per square inch on the surfaces of teeth. It can be rough not only on teeth but on the supporting bone, the gums and jaw joint. For many years, bruxism was attributed to the release of tension from emotional stress. However, many dental authorities today believe that the causes exist in the patient's mouth. Night grinding may be an unconscious effort to correct irregularities of the chewing surfaces of the teeth. Dentists term this a malocclusion. They grind away to eliminate a spot that is too high or to find a comfortable place to fit the upper and lower teeth together.
