A two-vehicle collision Monday near Kress claimed the life of a 34-year-old Plainview woman and injured a man from Willis.

The victim, identified by the Department of Public Safety as Carla Valdez Ramirez, died from injuries suffered when a tractor-trailer jack-knifed in front of her car.

The accident occurred about 11:45 p.m. Monday on U. S. Highway 87 about 3.5 miles north of Kress. Mrs. Ramirez died at the scene.

The driver of the tractor-trailer, Carmel Q. Anderson, jr., 48, was listed in fair condition Tuesday at Swisher Memorial Hospital. Anderson suffered head and back injuries.

DPS officials said the accident occurred when Anderson lost control of his southbound rig on wet pavement. The vehicle then

crossed the median and jack-knifed in front of Mrs. Ramirez' car.

Services for Mrs. Ramirez were held at 11:00 a.m. Thursday at Sacred Heart Catholic Church in Plainview with the Rev. Matthew D'Souza, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Plainview Memorial Park. Rosary was said at 8:00 p.m. at Lemons Memorial Chapel in Plainview.

Born on March 4, 1952 in Matador, Mrs. Ramirez was married to Abundio Ramirez, who died in 1985. She was reared in Quitaque and attended school here. She was a member of the Sacred Heart Catholic Church.

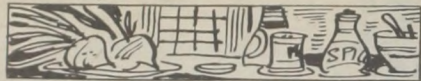

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Third Conservation Reserve Sign-up August 4

Starting August 4, Briscoe County farmers may volunteer highly erodible cropland for entry into the 1987 Conservation Reserve Program. The third sign-up period for the new USDA program will end August 15.

The Conservation Reserve Program encourages farmers to stop growing crops on highly erodible cropland and plant it to grass or trees through 10-year contracts with USDA.

"Farmers will have an opportunity during this next sign-up period to bid on a program contract for the 1987 crop year. Successful bidders will be allowed to harvest their 1986 crop before the contract becomes effective. Land designated may not be grazed after October 1, 1986.

For retiring highly erodible cropland from production, farmers will receive conservation

payments of up to 50 percent of the eligible cost of establishing trees or grass on the acres placed in the program. They also will receive rental payments of up to \$50,000 per year, based on the bid per acres times the number of acres under the contract. Rental payments will be made in cash or commodity certificates annually, as soon as possible after October 1, 1987, to producers with approved contracts. Cost-sharing payments will be made as soon as possible after participants report the approved conservation practice is completed.

Farmers may be more interested in the Conservation Reserve Program now that they know about the sodbuster and conservation compliance rules of the Food Security Act. Those who fail to meet the rules may not be eligible for certain USDA program benefits.

Extension Highlights

Hot dry weather is definitely upon us and the home garden and lawns are feeling the stress. A reminder to all is do not wait your garden after it shows signs (such as curling leaves) of water in early morning and late evenings. This will definitely help maintain the quality of your produce, such as taste in cucumbers, and yield on tomatoes.

The time is also upon us to control for white grubs in lawn. June beetles have been emerging from the soil and are swarming under yard or street lights in late evenings. Female eggs which have hatched into white grubs and are beginning to feed on lawn roots. Once grub feeding begins, control measures should be taken.

Homeowners in our region the state need to treat between mid-July and early August, according to our area entomologist. Timing of chemical application very critical for adequate control.

To check for grubs, cut a square foot section of sod with shovel and examine the roots at a soil to a depth of four inches. You find four or more grubs per square foot of yard in selected areas, exhibit stress or visual damage then treatment necessary. Diazinon, Dursban, Othanol provide adequate control and should be used at recommended rates given on the chemical container label. These chemicals come in both granular form or a liquid form. After application, remember to keep children and pets off the treated lawn until the grass is dry. Treat all chemicals with proper care and safety as recommended on the label.

You corn producers need to be aware that the 1986 Section 18 request from Texas to Azodrin on corn for Banks grass mites has been denied by EPA. Although we have been able to use this product for the past years on corn, we will not be able to use it this year. EPA has determined in their risk assessment that the environmental benefits of one Azodrin application exceeded the alternative, which was considered to be two applications of Supvacide for mite control plus one application of Furadan for Southwestern corn borer control. Reports of spider mites are generally increasing in corn around our area. Area Entomologist Dr. Pat Morrison feels earlier mite application will begin soon.

So, now that Azodrin is what are the alternatives to controlling economic infestation of Banks grass mites? Following are listed in the guide "Managing Insect and Mite Problems of Texas Corn:" Diazinon, Cyfluthrin, Rampart, Comiteg Thimet. 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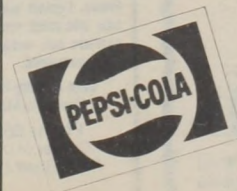
