## EMT's-- Who Are They!!

Quitaque Ambulance Service is currently composed of 14 certified personnel. They are tremendously assisted and supported by Firemen, Volunteer Drivers, and many other "behind-the-scenes people!"

They have one Emergency Care Attendant, eleven Emergency Medical Technicians, and two Special Skilled Emergency Medical Technicians.

Four Emergency Medical Technicians reside at Flomot. Because of terrain, radio communication (pagers) is not a working option, most of the time. They are required to be first on the scene in their community until the ambulance arrives. They have a special brand of courage!

Sandra Barclay, who certified in 1989, works at First National Bank in Quitaque. She is married to Jerry and they have three sons, Tye, Cody, and Lance.

Linda Turner, certified in 1989, works at Turner Gin at Flomot along with her husband, Donnie.

Dianne Washington, certified in 1989 works at Floydada at the office of Fred Thayer, CPA. She and her husband, Seab, have one son, Todd and two grandchildren.

Erma Washington, certified in 1989 is married to Bill Dean and they have three children, Tim, Sandra Barclay, Connie Franks and eight grandchildren.

Judy Barrett, now serving her sixth year, certified in 1985. She's made 91 runs, is the secretary-reporter for Quitaque Ambulance Service and puts in an extra amount of time filling these volunteer duties! Judy works as a teachers' aide at Valley School, part-time for

Conner Insurance, and for Quitaque's First Baptist Church. She lives with her mother, Una Lee and her brother Danny.

David Brunson, now serving his 15th year as an EMT certified with the first E.M.T. class in 1976. In 1984, he completed the Special Skills training for an advanced EMT level.
