## Turkey Residents Warned Of Nitrate In Water-Advised To Protect Infants

The Texas Natural Resource Commission has tested Turkey water samples, and found that Nitrate/Nitrite is 13.40 mg. This is a high enough level to cause concern among parents of very young infants.  
 The Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC) sets drinking water standards and has determined that nitrate poses an acute health concern at certain levels of exposure. Nitrate is used in fertilizer and is found in sewage and wastes from human and/or farm animals and generally get into drinking water from those activities. Excessive levels of nitrate in drinking water have caused serious illness and sometimes death in infants under six months of age. The serious illness in infants is caused because nitrate is converted to Nitrite in the body. Nitrite interferes with the oxygen carrying capacity of the child's blood. This is an acute disease in that symptoms can develop rapidly in infants. In most cases, health deteriorates over a period of days.  
 Symptoms include shortness breath and blueness of the skin. Clearly expert medical advice should be sought immediately if these symptoms occur.  
 Letters have been sent out to notify Turkey residents of the results of the nitrate test, to encourage parents and other responsible parties to provide infants with an alternate source of drinking water. Local and State health authorities are the best source for information concerning alternate sources of drinking water for infants.  
 TNRCC has set the drinking water standard at 10 parts per million (ppm) for nitrate to protect against the risk of these adverse effects. It has also set a drinking water standard for nitrite at 1 ppm. To allow for the fact that the toxicity of nitrate and nitrite are additive, TNRCC has also established a standard for the sum of nitrate and nitrite at 10 ppm. Drinking water that meets the TNRCC standard is associated with little to none of this risk and is considered safe with respect to nitrate.

## FIRE DANGER

**THEN and NOW!**

You get your ticket weeks in advance. Your seats are never as close as where you really wanted, but that makes little difference. After all, your ticket not only means you see the action, it guarantees you're part of it. Then you notice some prime seats where no one will sit. Who gets a ticket to a big event and then opts not use it?  
 In attendance-keeping, they are known as the "no-shows." People who buy tickets and then for some reason don't attend. No-shows, can prevent an event from touting itself as an official sellout. For that reason, you'll hear boos, hisses, and catcalls when the number of no-shows is announced at some sporting events.  
 In many respects, Texas elections vary little from this scenario. You get your voter registration card (your ticket) weeks in advance. Most of us are never as close to the political action as we'd like, but on election day that makes little difference. Our vote makes each and everyone one of us a vital part of the action.  
 And like any big event, organizers always hope for a 100 percent turnout (a "sellout," if you will) on election day. However over the years, the political arena has been anything but full. Empty seats are easy to find.  
 So where are the "Boos" for the no-shows on election day?  
 Let's face it. Booming the election day no-shows is no longer fashionable. Yes, it's certainly chic to complain about "the system," but taking an active role in changing it? That's for the other guy to worry about. The right to vote, once a patriotic duty, has become as important to some people as a weekend chore that never seems to get done. "Yeah, yeah. I'll do it--if I get around to it."  
 With 1996 being a Presidential election year, that fact alone should be enough to spark voter interest across our state. And considering Texans will also have the final word on one U.S. Senate seat, all 30 Congressional seats, all 150 seats in the Texas House and approximately half the seats in the Texas Senate, you can understand why 1996 is viewed as a significant election year- and why voter participation is as important as ever.  
 However if a 20-year trend holds, more than a quarter of the registered voters in Texas will opt to sit out this presidential election year. In hard numbers, that's more than two million people. Since 1976, voter turnout in the November General Election has surpassed the 70 percent mark only once. As Secretary of State, that's a trend of voter apathy that disturbs me.  
 Upon being appointed by Governor George W. Bush, my goal has been to continue the strong legacy of my immediate predecessors in the area of voter registration. Secretaries of State including Jack Raines, George Bayoud, John Hannah, and Ron Kirk have all worked to assure every Texas eligible to vote gets the chance to register to vote.  
 Passage of the National Voter Registration Act has made registration a relatively simple process. More than nine million Texans will be registered to vote this election year, representing approximately 70 percent of the eligible voting population. With registration made easy, the challenge is now on assuring those registered to vote will show up at the polls.  
 The answer to voter apathy has proven elusive. Feelings of isolation from government, negative campaigns, the overwhelming number of elections have all contributed to the problem. All have added to the perception, "What does it matter?"  
 If you are concerned about how state and federal government utilize your tax dollars, your vote is crucial. If you consider jobs and the economic future of our children a priority, your vote is significant. In 1996, as in every election, your vote still matters.  
 Democrat or Republican, Libertarian or Independent: your political affiliation is not the issue. What matters is that you let your voice be heard on election day. The sounds that resonate from the ballot box are ones that cannot be ignored in Washington, in Austin, in county courthouses or in city halls.  
 Your voter registration card is your ticket. The political arena has plenty of seats. With so much riding on the outcomes in 1996, it's time we start booing the election day no-shows again.

**Hall County Farmers Eligible For Disaster Assistance, Gramm Says**

U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm has announced that farmers in Hall County are eligible to apply for low-interest emergency loans to help recover from crop losses caused by flooding, hail and high winds which occurred between May 25, 1995 and June 5, 1995.

For those who cannot obtain through normal channels, the U.S. Department of Agriculture will make loans available at below-market interest rates to family farmers.

In addition, six other Texas counties have been named as contiguous counties and therefore are eligible for assistance.

The counties affected by the flooding, hail and high winds are Briscoe, Childress, Collingsworth, Cottle, Donley and Motley.

The Consolidated Farm Service Agency, which will supervise the loan program, is charged with providing aid to the farmers and ranchers in order to assist their economic recovery from natural disasters.

Local CFSA county offices can provide affected farmers with further information and assist them in completing applications for assistance.

**Emergency Farm Loans Applications Being Accepted For Hall County**

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by a tornado are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) office located in Memphis, Mollie F. Moffitt said today.

Hall County is one of four in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Dan Glickman eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the natural disaster.

Mrs. Moffitt said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 90 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 3.75 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FSA emergency loan," Mrs. Moffitt said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until September 24, 1996, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possible over into the new farming season," Mrs. Moffitt said.

FSA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and

rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U. S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U. S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FSA office in Memphis is open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

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## Federal Money Available For College Funding

Texas Panhandle residents can take advantage of special funds for qualified individuals with money for college tuition and books. JTPA funds studies at 11 area colleges, including Amarillo College, Frank Phillips, Clarendon, South Plains and West Texas A&M University. "The funding is available just in time for Spring Registration at Amarillo College's newest division--The Amarillo Technical Center," said Laurie Dahl of the Panhandle Job Training Partnership.

The Job Training Partnership's mission is training people for high demand jobs that pay well. Through the program, students can receive funding for as much as two years of higher education. Individuals may choose educational programs leading to approximately 65 targeted job categories identified by the Texas Employment Commission as "high demand." The Partnership funds numerous programs offered at Amarillo College and the Amarillo Technical Center division. There are a number of approved programs starting this spring at Amarillo Technical Center. Students may meet with JTPA representatives at any Texas Employment Commission office to discuss their options.

Federal money administered through the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission funds the job-training program. The Texas Employment Commission provides JTPA services at TEC offices throughout the Texas Panhandle.

To further assist students, the job Training Partnership provides career counseling. On-campus housing for students with families and single students is available on the Amarillo Technical Center campus, Dahl noted. The College and the JTPA program also help students find part-time jobs while they're enrolled and full-time jobs when they graduate.

Students interested in Job Training Partnership funding must begin the application process early as it usually takes a minimum of two weeks prior to registration to complete the program paperwork.

Any Panhandle resident who wants more information about the Job Training Partnership should contact the nearest Texas Employment Commission Office.

Amarillo Technical Center's advance registration for spring term runs from February 12 through 17. Regular registration is set for March 6, with classes starting the next day.
