Plans are being finalized for the Briscoe County/Media Day Tour and Celebration.

According to organizers, the expected number of participants and guests have exceeded the numbers they were expecting, but the way they look at it, the more the

Saturday, May 6, 1989, will be an important day for Briscoe County. Several civic groups, coordinated by Judge Jimmy Ross, will be pulling all the stops to make sure a group of Panhandle area civic leaders and media representatives get the best impression

The get-acquainted tour was organized by Ross's group to change the regional image of Briscoe County in the southeastern Panhandle. The guests will get a first-hand look at Lake Mac-Kenzie, Caprock Canyons State Park and a local ranch. They'll also get to sample the community's home-cooked barbeque.

It's not that other parts of the Panhandle don't have similar facilities, but Ross's group is convinced that the unusual scenic attributes of the county can be used to draw overnight visitors and their vacation money.

There's also the possiblity of opening a guest ranch in the area and cooperating with the Cottonbelt Railroad to bring excursion trains from Lubbock and Estelline where the line joins the Burlington-Northern Route.

# Voters AskedTo **Up Their Taxes**

Hall County voters are faced with quite a task on this election day, Saturday, May 6, 1989. Voters are being asked to pass a hospital tax increase that could go as high as 75 cents per \$100 valuation. property

This will mean an increase of up to 55 cents per \$100 valuation, although the Hall County Hospital District Board is suggesting they'll only raise the tax to 45 cents per \$100 valuation. The current hospital tax is 20 cents per \$100 valuation. Should the 45 cent tax rate not generate enough revenue, the maximum tax rate of 75 cents per \$100 valuation could go into effect, without having to be approved by Hall County

Voters will also be asked to seat two new members to the Turkey-Quitaque Board of Trustees. Ronald Mullin, Dee Whittington and Lecky Fuston are bidding for the two vacancies on that board.

Quitaque voters will have candidates to chose from as they elect members to serve on their city council. O.R. Stark, James Davidson, Larry Price, Johnny Griffin, Todd Washington, Gary Chandler, and Randy Powell will be asking the voters to place them in the city offices.

In Turkey, Arlowene Williams, Lorene Setliff and Steve Farley are running unopposed for city council.



County Extension agents Curtis Preston and Lynda Fogerson and the office secretary Lisa Schott will host the celebration in honor of the 75th anniversary of the passage by the U.S. Congress on May 8, 1914, of the Smith-Lever established which Cooperative Extension Service in

agriculture, home economics and related subjects" as a part of the land-grant university system in state and territory in the nation

Taken together, the state Cooperative Extension Services make up the largest system of informal continuing education in the world and have been cited as America's most distinctive contribution to higher education.

The Texas Legislature on January 29, 1915, accepted provisions of the Smith-Lever Act and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service became a part of the Texas A&M University System, the state's land-grant institution at the state level. The cooperative partner at the Federal level is the U.S. Department of Agriculture and at the local level is the County Commissioners Court.

Extension's purpose is education for action. Extension educational programs are directed toward "helping people to help themselves" in solving problems they encounter on their farms, ranches, homes, businesses or communities. These programs are based on the application of proven

research findings.

Today's Extension programs are related to agricultural production and marketing, natural resources, horticultural products, family and consumer sciences, development, community development.

Involvement of local volunteer leaders in developing and implementing programs enables leaders Extension to reach large numbers programs are focused ont problems which the local people consider most important.
