## Dana Ramsey Is Wayland's Female Citizen Of The Year

Quitauque native Dana Ramsey was named Wednesday as Wayland Baptist University's 30th Female Citizen of the Year.

She was accorded the university's highest honor during Wayland's annual Citizenship Chapel in Harral Memorial Auditorium. The 1986 winner was announced by Dr. Paul Butler, student development vice president.

Voted upon annually by the Wayland student body and faculty, the Female Citizen of the Year award goes to the senior woman who best exemplifies Christian attitudes, a commendable academic record, diversity of interests, loyalty to American ideals, personal integrity and the Wayland spirit.

The award was begun in 1956 following Wayland's recognition as recipient of the Valley Forge Award from the Freedom's Foundation for its program of integration on campus.

Dr. Willis J. Ray, founding president of Grand Canyon College in Phoenix, Arizona, was featured speaker for the occasion. Dr. David L. Jester, president of the university, gave the history of the award and offered congratulatory remarks in honor of the recipients.

Immediately following the program, the recipient affixed her name plate to the plaque in the

foyer of Gates Hall, alongside those of the previous winners. This year's honoree and her family were then treated to a special luncheon in the McClung University Center.

The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Glenn Ramsey of Quitauque, Miss Ramsey is Wayland's third Citizen of the Year from Quitauque, following the footsteps of Jim Saul (1968) and Eva Cheatham (1979).

The valedictorian of the Class of 1981 at Valley High School, she has been active extensively in campus life at Wayland including every level of the Student Government Association. She was the 1984-85 SGA president, was also president of Theta Alpha Psi sorority, and has been active in Baptist Student Union, Student Union Board, Alpha Chi National Honor Society, and the Wayland Student Education Association.

An excellent student in addition to her role as campus leader, Miss Ramsey was named earlier this spring as the Highest Ranking Graduating Senior in the Class of 1986. An elementary education major and math minor, she has been on the Dean's Honor Roll every semester while in college, was named recipient of the Roy C. McClung Award and Scholarship in 1984, and is

listed in the 1984-85 edition of "Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges."

Miss Ramsey was Sophomore Class Favorite, a two-time recipient of the campus leadership award, "Spinning Wheels," and was voted by her peers as Homecoming Queen last fall.

## Doug Seal Is Candidate For Congressional Seat

Doug Seal, Democratic candidate in the 13th Congressional District, said today that the trade deficit spills over on the U. S. economy to the extent that we will never balance the budget unless we take action now.

The trade deficit in 1980 was only \$22 billion. In 1982 it was \$42 billion, \$70 billion in 1983 and \$124 billion in 1984.

In 1985 the trade deficit was a staggering \$140 billion. "We should have an export policy that if of, by and for the American people, not an export policy of the Japanese, by the Europeans and for the Koreans," Seal said.

Seal said that he would support and work toward a bill that would

1) declare a trade emergency and grant the President broad powers to reduce trade deficits through negotiated agreements or unilateral actions.

2) establish a stand-by duty of 25% to be levied against countries with inequitable trade imbalances.

3) establish a special budget deficit reduction account in which all revenues from the stand-by duty would be deposited.

4) strengthen and expand the decision-making authority of the

Office of U. S. Trade Representative.

"With a strong export-import policy we can balance the budget and save the vital programs necessary to this district such as Social Security, Medicaid, Medicare, and veterans programs and we can keep our small, rural Post Offices," Seal said.

"The current administration seems to be saying that American businessmen, farmers and workers are inefficient and cannot compete in international markets. The truth is that the administration's irresponsible fiscal policy has run up billions in deficits in the past five years and resulted in an overwhelmingly strong dollar. That means that Americans have had to compete in an unfair economic environment because their products were priced artificially high," Seal said.

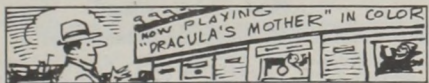

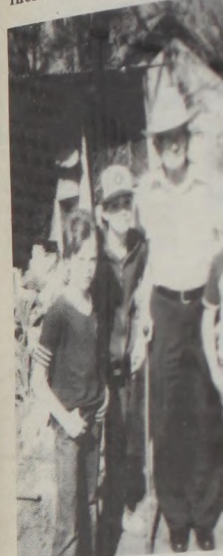
