## Eula Water Supply Corporation Receives Additional \$160,000 Loan

WASHINGTON — Congress- man Omar Bureson announced the approval of an additional \$160,000 to Eula Water Supply

Corporation, to help finance the completion of its water system. In February, 1973, Farmers Home had provided a loan of \$366,000 to help develop this water system to serve some 248 water users in Callahan County which included business establishments and a school in the community of Eula.

The loans is provided under the Rural Community Facilities program administered by Farmers Home Administration at an interest rate of 5 percent to be repaid in 40 years.

## Texas Baptist Child Care Ministries To Be Reviewed on T. V., April 3

DALLAS — A television special telling the story of Texas Baptist child care ministries — "Where There is Love" — is being readied for statewide showing April 3.

The special is scheduled to be shown on 22 stations across Texas from 6:30-7 p. m.

Where There Is Love is the story of Texas Baptist love in action. The filming was made possible through a grant from the Anvil Foundation in Fort Worth.

Texas Baptists operate four child care institutions; Buckner Baptist Benevolence, which has campuses in Dallas, Burnet,

Lubbock, San Antonio and Beaumont; Texas Baptist Children's Home in Round Rock; Mexican Children's Baptist Home in San Antonio and the South Texas Children's Home in Beville.

Last year, \$1.2 million in BGCT Cooperative Program funds were spent to operate the homes. Each home, however, has programs established to encourage individual gifts and develop resources for operational expenses.

The film is being made by Fred Miller Productions, Inc. of Austin. Executive producers is Texas Baptist Children's Home.

## Lone Star Gas To Invest \$98 Million In Construction & Exploration

DALLAS — Lone Star Gas Company and its wholly owned subsidiaries have announced plans to invest nearly \$98 million in construction and exploration projects in 1974, according to W. C. McCord, president.

McCord noted that a large portion of 1974's planned capital spending, \$51 million will be for exploration for oil and gas. "This is certainly proper," McCord said, "in light of the current energy crisis. We are working hard to expand proven energy reserves and to continue our program of further increasing gas supply for our utility operation."

Plans have been made by Lone Star to spend approximately \$33 million on additions to its utility system — \$11 million by its distribution divisions that serve over 1,080,000 customers in 574 cities and towns in Texas and Oklahoma — and \$22 million for pipeline construction and other projects associated

with increasing its gas supply capability.

Nipak, Inc., the chemical fertilizer and plastic pipe subsidiary of Lone Star Gas Co., will spend nearly \$4 million for increasing fertilizer production and for expanding production of polyethylene gas distribution pipe and fittings. These expansions include a new urea fertilizer plant in Pryor, Okla., and a fourth polyethylene pipe extruder which will be installed at Nipak's Corsicana plant.

Pool Company, which is one of the world's largest oil and gas production services organizations, plans to spend approximately \$5 million for expanded international and domestic new rig facilities.

Lone Star Energy Company, a subsidiary that provides various thermal energy devices, is budgeted to spend approximately \$5 million for expansion of its existing energy plants, subject to final contract agreement.

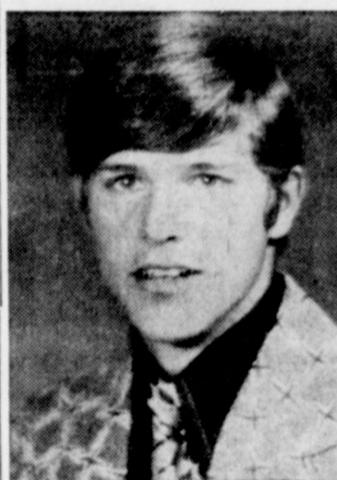

## Rural Route Mailings Should Also Include Box Numbers

BAIRD — Just as Zip Code has become a way of life in the Postal Service, so also is the need for box numbers on all rural and star routes to assure faster, more efficient mail deliveries from your correspondents.

Most people on rural and star route use their box numbers in their addresses, and this is good, but still some neglect this very important item, and thus expose their mail to possible delay.

By omitting box numbers, especially new customers on rural and star routes, may cause mail to be returned to the sender because of insufficient address. Lack of box numbers on mail is one major cause of duplicate mailings to rural and star route customers. This type of mail is usually third class matter.

Duplicate mailings serve no good cause either for the mailer, or for the one who receives the mailing. So the Postal Ser-

vice urges all customers, Post Office boxes, street numbers, and rural and star route customers, to use their correct addresses. The box number on rural and star routes are just as important as street addresses in the cities.

When you address is complete, you have the assurance of proper delivery within the standards set up by the Postal Service. Your cooperation in using box numbers on all your mail will be deeply appreciated by the Postal Service.

## Clyde English Class Has Varied Menu To Aid Cultural Studies

CLYDE — The following article was published in the Texas Outlook in November. The article was written about Mrs. Naoma Huff, High School English and Speech teacher, as follows:

### WHAT'S ON THE MENU FOR ENGLISH CLASS?

When it comes to giving students food for thought, Clyde High teacher Naoma Huff is the greatest!

She uses food as one way to get her senior English students to understand the cultural contributions made by groups of people.

Mrs. Huff first got interested in food lesson during a study unit on the Bible. Since there were no Jewish students in the community she thought it would be a good learning experience to celebrate Hanukkah — a Jewish Holiday, the Festival of Lights. It celebrates the rededication of the Temple of Jerusalem in 165 B. C. The festival usually occurs in December and lasts eight days.

Besides history reports and the lighting of eight Hanukkah candles, the class also made latkes, a kind of potato pancake which is appropriate for that holiday season.

"The reports were so-so, the candles OK, but the food was an immediate smash," said Mrs. Huff.

The class again was in for a surprise when the lesson switched to English literature. There

were so many allusions to food in the books, that the students decided they would make some of them: plum pudding, Banbury tarts, English muffins, mock turtle soup, Yorkshire pudding, lentils, kidney pie and "by Jove" hot tea.

Committees were formed to find recipes, buy food and prepare the dishes. Armed with electric skillets and table broilers, a feast was prepared by the seniors. "The kids were sporting," said Mrs. Huff, "and they had what English classes all often lack — a conversation piece."

The following year the British Isles Christmas spread included a roast suckling pig. A committee located a 20-pound pig, and spent hours cooking it before school. When the pork delicacy graced a table resting on a bed of greens, nibbling a red apple, and staring impudently with red cranberry eyes, it was worth all the effort.

What's cooking in Mrs. Huff's class this year? "Who knows. It will be open season on any food we find within the boundaries of our English assignments."

That completes the article in Texas Outlook, but more investigations found that the class added a variety with roast goose, mulligawny soup, and bubble and skeek. I'm sure any member of the Senior English class would be most happy to share any of their recipes with those wanting them.

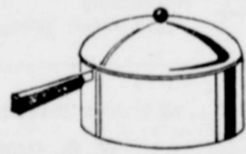

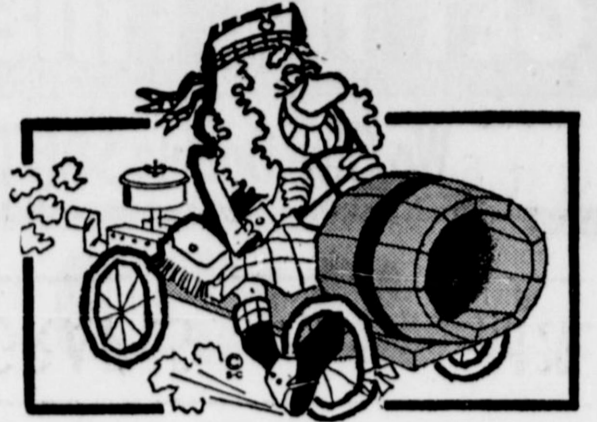
