Turnout Light In Saturday's Elections

The turnout was very light in Quitaque and Turkey on May 1, 1993 in the election for a U.S. Senator, school trustees and city council members.

In Briscoe County, Senator Bob Krueger won the most votes with 161 to Kay Hutchison's 114 votes. Hall County gave Krueger 236 votes while giving Hutchison 203 votes. Hutchison carried Motley County with 111 votes to Krueger's 76. There will be a runoff between Krueger and Hutchison on June 5, 1993 for the position of U.S. Senator.

Proposition #1 in Briscoe County had 301 votes for and 138 against. Proposition #2 had 222 votes for and 210 against. Proposition #3 had 292 votes against and 138 votes for.

In Hall County voters gave 358 votes against Proposition #1 with 321 votes for. Proposition #2 lost with 334 against and 322 vote for. Proposition #3 carried with 337 votes for and 321 votes against.

Motley County voters went against Proposition #1 with 293 votes and only 60 votes for. Proposition #2 carried with 248 votes and 113 against. Voters chose to vote against Proposition #3 with 273 votes and only 73 votes for

Center as a vendor of compost

Sunday, May 9, 1993 is a day set aside to honor the mothers of the country. Have you given any thought to how you will honor your mother this year? Mothers are very special people to each and everyone of us because without them where would each of us be? Now I don't mean to say that mothers are perfect--no one is ever perfect, even tho some try very hard to accomplish this fact!

But mothers do give some of the most important ideas, background, help, encouragement, dreams, support, and understanding not only to their children but to their world at large. Mothers today are required to be on the go almost 24 hours a day.

The majority of them are not only mothers but full time employees as well as homemakers. Any one of the three jobs is a full time job but the young mothers seem to make it work doing all three and still have time left for husbands and occasionally a bit of time to do something for themselves. I personally think that they have a secret that I have never discovered! There is simply never enough hours in the day for me to accomplish what I want to do.

Motherhood is a never ending job. Mothers rock the little baby to sleep. Mothers chase the toddler through the neighborhood when he wanders off. Mothers cry when the baby they rocked starts to school. Mothers make ballgames, recitals, plays, programs and become room mothers for their children. Now all of this is done in the spare time that is left after the day on the job and the job of homemaking

Then comes the teen years and mothers again pitch in and do all the things that teens deem important for their being accepted by the group of their peers. Mothers usually lie awake until the last teen has shut the front door and is asleep in their bed. Then comes the day of graduation from high school. The child feels grown up and the mother feels lost because now that child that has been such an important part of the past 18 years is now moving out on their own--either to a job or a school perhaps far from the homefires and care of mom! So the tears flow again from mother but she does not try to clip the wings of the child that she has nourished for 18 years. Instead, she encourages that child to be all that it can be even if it means going far from home to accomplish the feat.

Then will come the day that the child is given up to a mate. This too is a traumatic time for a mother. Her baby is all grown up and now trying her or his wings in a new lifestyle. She must accept this and be glad for the happiness that the mate will give to her child. Someday, perhaps a tiny life will arrive on the scene and mother can once again rock a baby--this time the precious bundle is a grandchild. And so the cycle begins again. But still the mother will try to prevent her child heartache and problems if at all possible.

With a few of these thoughts in mind why don't you let your own mother know just how much you love her this coming Sunday?





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
