PANTHERETTES TO PLAY JAYTON FOR BI-DISTRICT TUESDAY

The Quitaque Pantherettes representing District 7 - B in the playoffs, will meet Jayton for the bi-district championship at Lorenz next Tuesday night at 7:30. Winner of that game will advance to the regional tournament to be held at Levelland next weekend.

According to reports, the Pantherettes are currently rated No. 1 in the State. High Island is rated No. 1 and Klondike in second place.

The Pantherettes drove over to Clarendon Tuesday night and took a 44-41 win over Claude, who is coached this year by Don Johnson, former coach of the Pantherettes.

That win brought their record for this year to 27-4, and thus far have not been beaten by a Class B team.

NEW RULINGS GIVEN ON LANDLORD-TENANT AGREEMENT PROVISIONS

As all of you who participate in the diversion programs know, the landlord-tenant provisions of these programs are very important. Also, as you know, the regulations concerning the landlord-tenant relationship have teeth in them. The proper application of these rules to protect tenants and sharecroppers is one of the most difficult responsibilities of all County Committees. In spite of the efforts made, an occasional case arises where it is eventually determined that payments were not correctly divided between tenant/sharecroppers and landlord/operators. The seriousness of a matter such as this is usually compounded by the number of years the violation has been occurring.

Beginning with the current sign-up, additional efforts are being made to prevent cases such as these from arising in the future. Effective with the 1969 programs, the following provisions will apply.

1. No payment (including advance payment) will be made for any farm until all producers who are entitled to share in a crop or proceeds therefrom are shown on the program document with the applicable shares shown and signatures obtained.

2. No payment (including advance payment) will be made for a farm where the price support shares and diversion shares are not the same, unless a proper explanation is made to and approved by the County Committee.

3. The number of tenants and the shares received by those tenants in 1968 will be compared with the 1969 enrollment documents on all farms. No payment will be made when there are fewer tenants or the tenant's share is reduced until a proper explanation is made and approved by the County Committee.

4. Procedures also provide that without exception a refund will be required of any amount of payment erroneously made to a landlord which was earned by a tenant or sharecropper. In such case the correct payment will be made directly to the proper party even though the erroneous payment may have been credited to the proper payee's account.

All of this does not mean a landowner cannot replace an unsatisfactory tenant or that a tenant cannot voluntarily leave a farm without being replaced by another tenant. It does mean that a satisfactory explanation must be made and the County Committee must be satisfied that the landlord-tenant provisions have not been violated before the intentions to participate will be accepted.

Quitaque Teams Continue To Win

PANTHERETTES WIN OVER TURKETTES FOR DISTRICT TITLE

The Quitaque Pantherettes and the Turkey Turkettes shot it out in finals of the District 7-B girls basketball tournament at Silverton last Saturday, with the Pantherettes successfully defending their district championship 63-48 over a fine Turkey team.

For the Pantherettes, it marked the third district championship in succession.

Saturday night's action was a bit slow getting started. The Turkettes got on the board first with a free shot and it took the Pantherettes 3 minutes to score. The count was knotted at 3-3, then 5-5 before the Quitaque team put on a burst to run the count to 10-5 before the Turkettes could tally again. Turkey came on, however to trail by only 10-13 at the end of the first quarter.

The Pantherettes, however were shooting pretty hot and gradually pulled out of reach of the Turkettes, who batted all the way.

Sherry Stark topped the scoring parade with 34 points for the night.

Kathy Wedge scored 28 points for the Turkettes, including a perfect night at the free throw line: fifteen out of fifteen!

Barbara Chandler hit for 20 for the Pantherettes and Jackie Cheatham scored 9 points.

Sally Case Cace scored 6 points for Turkey and Lanita Farley added 4 points.

Matador took a 52-37 win over Flomot for third place in the tournament Saturday night.

Thursday night the Turkettes whipped Matador 58-33 to advance to the championship round of play on Saturday night and Flomot won over Estelina.

Sally Case won scoring honors in Thursday's game with 28 points. Kathy Wedge scored 22 and Lindy Ham 2 points.

In the only game played Friday night, Quitaque bested Flomot 82-48.

Scoring-wise for Quitaque it was Barbara Chandler leading the way with 30 points, Jackie Cheatham, 29, and Sherry Stark 24.

For Flomot Pam Morris was tops with 16. Susie Gilbert 13, Anita Hunter 11 and Kay Turbyfill 8 points.

PANTHERS KAYO McADOO FOR BI-DISTRICT CROWN

The Quitaque Panthers won their eighth consecutive bi-district title Monday night by taking a 77-59 win over the McAdoo Eagles, a game played in Plainview High school gym. And in the process, Quitaque scored a first—the first time ever to enjoy a perfect season against the Eagles, three wins and no losses. The two rivals usually manage to beat each other at least once each season but this was Quitaque's year.

The Eagles, a typical run and shoot team, had Panther supporters wondering again Monday night in the opening minutes of the game as they opened a 14-7 lead about midway of the first quarter. The Panthers came to play, however, and narrowed the gap to 19-20 at the end of the first quarter.

Quitaque took the second quarter tipoff and went into the lead, saw McAdoo regain the lead, tied the count at 23-23, then Quitaque went ahead and were never behind again. Quitaque led 43-32 at half-time and 57-46 at the end of three periods.

Lyn Payne was lost in the fourth period with about four minutes to go, but Stan Price, playing one of his better games, contributed 8 points to the cause.

The Brunson brothers, David and Perry, turned in very fine performances. It was a very fine team effort for the Panthers and a very satisfying win.

Roland Homilton scored 18 for the Panthers, David Brunson 17, Lyn Payne scored 14 before going out; Perry Brunson tallied 13, Stan Price 8, and Johnny Pointer, who also fouled out late in the game, scored 7 points.

The Panthers drew tough Meadow in the first round of play at the Regional Tournament, being played at Levelland this year.

Quitaque and Meadow square off at 8:15 p. m. Friday evening in the last game of the first round of action.

From The County Agent's Desk

CATTLE LICE
 It costs money to feed cattle

lice. These parasites are among the most damaging to beef cattle.

Cattle infested with lice spend a lot of time rubbing against fences, posts or other objects, due to the annoyance caused by the insects. Cattle on feed do not gain as they should and require more food.

Infested cows lose weight and their calves become prime targets for the pests. Reduced weaning weights of calves is another spot that hits the pocketbook.

Cattle lice are common over the

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entire state and include both the biting and sucking types. Their populations build up rapidly during cool weather and when cattle are kept in close quarters.

Sucking lice, short and long nosed, pierce the animal's skin and feed by sucking blood. They are usually found on the sides of the animal's neck, on the brisket, back, inner surface of the thighs, tail and around the nose, eyes and

ears. Chewing lice are smaller and are usually found on top of the shoulders and around the root of the tail but may also infest other parts of the animal's body.

Many chemicals are available for controlling lice as well as other external parasites of farm livestock. Among these are Lindane, Sevin, Toephene, Rullene 25 E, Methoeychlar, or Coral. These chemicals should be used only as directions indicate on the labels.



HOW'S THE HUMIDITY IN YOUR HOME?

Just by heating your home in the winter, you may be creating air conditions drier than the desert. And, according to W. S. Allen, Extension Agricultural Engineer at Texas A&M University, such dry conditions in a home can lead to respiratory problems, high heating bills, and extreme drying of furniture and floors.

When humidity is low—and it can drop as low as five or ten percent in your home—the moisture on your skin evaporates rapidly and you feel chilly. So you turn up the heat and the air gets even drier.

To solve this low humidity problem, Allen suggests these several solutions:

In homes with hot air heating systems, an automatic humidifier unit can be fitted into the furnace air ducts. These units must be cleaned occasionally and hard water can be a problem in some areas, but the result is better

health and more comfort at a reduction in heating costs.

Where there is no hot air system, free-standing humidifier units can be purchased. Some of these force water vapor into the air with a heating unit. But new, improved units now can put out moisture without heat by means of a centrifugal atomizing unit.

The engineer also suggests another less formal and more old-fashioned method of humidifying a house. It's a steaming tea kettle. Not only does it add considerable amounts of moisture to the air, but it's particularly good, he adds, when your family is suffering from colds.

SOAKING LAUNDRY—A TERRIFIC OLD IDEA

Consumers are being bombarded with so-called washday miracles—laundry products supercharged with enzymes.

Research proves enzyme products get rid of many stubborn stains, but the housewife may be able to achieve the same results at half the cost.

The idea of soaking clothes before laundering to make your wash significantly cleaner is not new.

Pre-soaking with detergent does a good job on most of the stains as does enzyme presoaks, tests have shown.

In the tests there was some very slight difference between the enzyme products and a detergent in their performance on blood and gravy stains, with the enzymes doing slightly better. But all three removed egg stains completely in 30 minutes of soaking and spaghetti sauce overnight.

None did well with the mustard stains. She suggests that housewives first try presoaking in a solution made up of whatever laundry detergent they now use. It may perform surprisingly well—and at half the cost of an enzyme presoak.

Promoting the new enzyme products is expected to boost the total budget for laundry products from \$70 million in the last 12

months to \$100 million in the next 12 months.

DRIED SKIM MILK WILL WHIP

A dried skim milk which can be whipped into a low-calorie dessert topping has been developed by U. S. Department of Agricultural scientists. The mixture needs no refrigeration or precooking of utensils, reports Extension Foods and Nutrition specialists. The experimental product can be stored without refrigeration. Skim milk which has been homogenized before drying and reconstituted with one part powder to two parts water will produce a foam if whipped for three minutes.

GRAPEFRUIT

Much of the grapefruit, the red-meat variety, now available is from the Rio Grande Valley. It is classed as seedless, although the fruit may have a few seeds.

Grapefruit is a bonus fruit: low in calories, rich in Vitamin C, versatile and economical.

To shop for grapefruit, select firm, well-shaped fruit that is heavy for its size. Heavy fruit is usually thin-skinned and juicy.

Thick skinned and puffy grapefruit usually is less juicy. A slightly pointed stem end on a grapefruit indicates thick skin.

Skin blemishes and discoloration on the outer skin do not affect eating quality.

Grapefruit is commonly sold by size such as 96's, 80's, 40's, 23's or 36's. The number refers to the number of fruit packed in the box
