The 12th Annual Bob Wills Day Celebration is now past history, but will not soon be forgotten as it was "one of the best," it was reported. A huge crowd attended and the majority came for the purpose of hearing the large group of former Texas Playboys play all the good

old-time favorites.

The parade, narrated by Jack Tompkins of Amarillo, was colorful as usual and included a clown and a car with tractor tires on the back and regular tires on the front. It was equipped to go up and down similar to a slow-motion bucking horse that delighted the crowds.

First-place winner in the floats division was Security State Bank of Hedley; second place went to Shamrock Chamber of Commerce, and the 1983 Bob Wills Queen's float was third place winner.

In the riding clubs division, Donley County 4-H won first in the junior division. Lamb County Sheriff's Posse won first and the West Texas Raiders of Lubbock won second in the senior division.

Judges were Mike Hinkson of Turkey and Denny and Mitchie Fuston of Clarendon.

Mrs. Betty Wills Sheets rode in the parade in a little pink roadster with the top down, driven by Dr. Charles Townsend, professor at West Texas State University, who was master of ceremonies for the afternoon program of music by the former Bob Wills Texas Playboys.

Another feature of the parade was the 1969 Lincoln, the last car owned by Bob Wills. It is now owned by Jim and Billie Robison of Turkey and was driven by O. H. Majors in the parade.

The Texas Tech Red Raider, Jennifer Aufl of Lubbock, riding the beautiful black horse, a trademark of the school, was in the parade.

Free Health Clinic To Be Held At Flomot May 11

The public is invited to take advantage of a Free Health Clinic sponsored by the Do Gooders Club of Flomot to be held Wednesday, May 11, from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. at the Flomot Community Center.

The testing will be under the supervision of the Texas Department of Health, and will be performed by registered nurses. There will be screening for eyes, ears, lung function, blood pressure, blood analysis for hemoglobin for anemia or diabetes, and urinalysis.

A kit will be given each person taking the examination for further tests to be completed in the home.

Everyone is invited to take these tests.

Blood Pressure Clinic Is May 10

The Texas Department of Health will have a blood pressure clinic Tuesday, May 10, from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. at the First National Bank in Quitaque.

Rita Anderson, public health nurse, explained that the National Institute of High Blood Pressure Education Program has declared May the National High Blood Pressure Awareness Month.

High blood pressure is a disease without symptoms, a "silent executioner." It threatens the life and health of more persons than cancer. It is the nation's number one killer.

Alarming statistics, compiled by the National Institute of High Blood Pressure Education Program, show that of the people who have high blood pressure, only 29% successfully control it. Another 29% do not know they have the disease. About 19% are under treatment but do not yet have it under control, and 23% are not treating it at all.

Tenth Annual Palo Duro Ashram Scheduled

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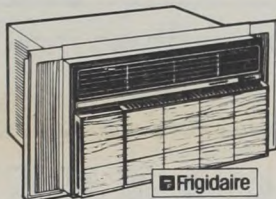
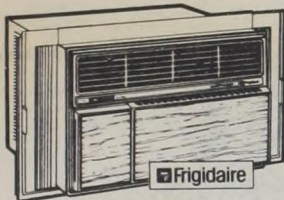

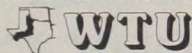
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Area Students Score High In Auditions

SOCIAL SECURITY NEWS

The automatic Social Security benefit increase based on the cost of living, previously effective each July, will be delayed for six months, to January 1984 under a new law designed to strengthen the Social Security system.

A related change has been made to the SSI program. The SSI federal benefit rate will increase effective July 1, 1983. The amount of increase will be \$20 for individuals and \$30 for couples. Cost of living adjustments will then be delayed until January 1, 1984 to correspond with Social Security adjustments under the new legislation.

The purpose of the cost of living adjustment delay for Social Security benefits is to save the system money and to help it regain its financial strength. Largely because of economic conditions in recent years, Social Security has had an increasingly severe financial problem.

The new law is designed to meet the problem both in the near-term and into the years after 2000. Other changes made by the new law provide additional income to the system. They include:

The Social Security tax rate increase scheduled under previous law for 1985 will go into effect in 1984. The new 1984 rate will be 7.0 percent each for employees and employers, up from the previous rate of 6.7 percent. But, employees will receive a tax credit against 1984 taxes of 0.3 percent, which will be given when taxes are deducted from wages. In effect, 1984 employee taxes will remain at the level set under previous law. Also, part of the tax rate increase scheduled for 1990 will go into effect in 1988.

Starting in 1984, the Social Security self-employment tax rate will be equal to the combined employee-employer tax on wages. This will be 14.0 percent for 1984. Previously, the rate for self-employed people was about 1 1/2 times the employee rate.

Under the new law, self-employed people will receive a self-employment tax credit of 2.7 percent of self-employment income for 1984; 2.3 percent for 1984, and 2.0 percent for 1986-89. After 1989, these credits will be replaced with deductions designed to treat the self-employed in much the same manner as employees and employers are

treated for Social Security and income tax purposes.

NEW ST. AUGUSTINE GRASS AVAILABLE

Texas homeowners can now select a new, semi-dwarf variety of St. Augustine grass for their lawns.

The new St. Augustine grass is called "Seville," says Dr. Richard Duple, turfgrass specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. It is a patented variety of St. Augustine grass produced by Pursley Turf Farms of Palmetto, Florida, and is sold through Texas nurseries and garden centers as rooted plugs in plastic trays.

"Seville is resistant to St. Augustine Decline virus, moderately shade tolerant, medium textured and as cold tolerant as other St. Augustine varieties," Duple points out. "But unlike Floratam, Seville is susceptible to chinch bugs, an insect that damages many St. Augustine lawns each year."

Seville's semi-dwarf character makes it one of the best looking varieties of St. Augustine, says Duple. However, the grass develops a dense turf that is subject to heavy thatch accumulation. This can be prevented with weekly mowing at a height of 1 1/2 inches and avoiding excessive nitrogen fertilization. The specialist recommends no more than three to four pounds of nitrogen per 1,000 square feet per year. With weekly mowing, grass clippings need not be removed.

Horse Short Course Slated May 26-27

Horse enthusiasts will be treated to a wide range of activities at the 1983 Horse Short Course at Texas A&M University May 26-27.

Among these will be a session on management recommendations, a tour of Brazos County horse farms, a cutting horse training clinic, a horse sale and open cutting horse contests.

"This year's short course deals in all facets of the horse industry—production, management, training and use," says Dr. Doug Householder, horse specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M

University System. The Extension Service is conducting the short course in conjunction with Texas A&M's Department of Animal Science.

"We are combining some key discussions on horse production with a training clinic and farm tours to see actual demonstrations and practical applications of various methods and techniques," adds Householder. "The sale the second day is designed to raise funds to complete the A&M Animal Science Department's N. W. (Dick) Freeman Arena. Mr. Freeman contributed immensely to Texas A&M's horse program as well as to the Texas horse industry."

Discussions during the opening session of the short course, which begins with registration at 7:30 a.m., include exercise physiology in horse training and conditioning, reproductive performance in broodmares, controlling flies on horse ranches, and an overview of horse research at Texas A&M.

The Brazos County Extension Horse Committee is hosting a tour of county horse farms that afternoon. Stops will include the Hank Bird Quarter Horses and the Windham Ranch.

Buster Welch of Merkel, a professional horse trainer, will conduct a cutting horse clinic the first evening at Texas A&M's

new livestock pavilion. The clinic will include live demonstrations on riding and training the cutting horse, notes Householder.

The special Freeman Arena Development Horse Sale will be featured the second day of the short course and will begin with registration at 7:30 a.m. at the livestock pavilion. The sale will offer a mixed set of about 60 yearlings, two- and three-year-olds, and pregnant mares of fashionable cutting, halter, race and performance breeding from the Texas A&M herd as well as from several prominent Texas horse producers.

The two-day program of activities will conclude with an NCHA (National Cutting Horse Association) Open Cutting Horse Contest beginning at 6:00 p.m. Friday.
