First Annual Missionary Conference Closes at Clyde Methodist Church

Jack Brock will receive \$50.00 monthly, and Rev. Marvin Wolford will receive help in his ministry in Africa. A total of \$350.00 will be sent to provide travel expenses for an Indian girl to Asbury College, where she will prepare to teach in her home country. And the International Scholarship Fund will receive \$100.00 per month.

The far-reaching effects of

this move, to share Christ with the nations, will never be measured on earth, but the immediate evidence within the local body of Christ with a renewal of the covenant "to go into all the world and preach the gospel," is felt by each member. The theme has been "To The World With Love"; as a result, the members understand with renewed clarity the paradox: "Whosoever will lose his life for my sake, the same shall save it."

Proposed Callahan County Re-Districting Continues

Callahan County Commissioners and the Citizens Advisory Committee continue to work on the proposed re-districting of Callahan County. The Commissioners and Com-

mittee met in Baird Monday, Sept. 9, but didn't attempt to set precinct boundaries. The Commissioners and committee members are trying to get an accurate count on rural vot-

ers and population, as well as voter and resident counts from towns within the county. They will meet again on Sept. 23, to discuss these findings. County Judge A. E. Dyer, Jr. explained that an attempt is being made to set the lines of the four precincts according to both population and registered voter counts.

This would mean approximately 1,300 registered voters in each precinct and an estimated 2,000 to 2,500 persons in each subdivision, according to present figures.

Judge Dyer explains that new lines for Callahan County, will be based on both voters and population. He also stated that variance in the precincts must be under 10 percent of the population.

The Judge states, it is hoped that when population estimates are made in a few weeks that voter and population ratios will average, to an acceptable proportion.

The Commissioners and committee hope the lines will be divided into proportions so they will not have to be moved again for several years. But if the need should arise, they will be subject to adjustment.

The lines shown on the County map last week, at this time seem to be close to where the final lines will rest, but they still may have to be adjusted.

The Citizens Advisory Committee is composed of Jack Scott of Cross Plains, Frank Chram of Oplin, John D. Isehower of Putnam, and Weldon Edwards of Clyde.

The County is presently divided into the following precincts: Baird, Clyde and Eula; Precinct 1; Baird, Putnam, and parts of Admiral, Precinct 2; Cross Plains, Rowden, Cottonwood, Atwell and parts of Admiral, Precinct 3; and Oplin, Eula, Denton Valley, and Dudley, Precinct 4.

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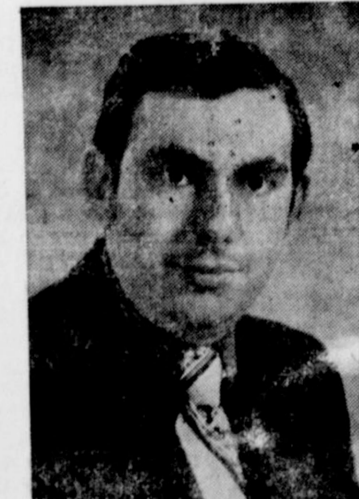
THE BIBLE AND IT'S ACCURACY!
